A regular meeting of the Common Council of the City of Cedarburg, Wisconsin, was held on Monday, June 8, 2009 at City Hall, W63 N645 Washington Avenue, second floor, Council Chambers. Mayor Myers called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. The meeting began with a moment of silence followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

STATEMENT OF PUBLIC NOTICE

At Mayor Myers' request, Deputy City Clerk Kletzien verified that notice of this meeting was provided to the public by forwarding the agenda to the City's official newspaper, the *News Graphic*, to all news media and citizens who requested copies, and by posting in accordance with the Wisconsin Open Meetings Law. Citizens present were welcomed and encouraged to provide their input during the citizen comment portion of the meeting.

APPOINTMENTS

Motion made by Council Member Loomis, seconded by Council Member Kinzel, to approve Mayor Myers reappointment of Vonna Pitel and Debra Goeks to the Joint Library Board with terms to expire June 30, 2012. Motion carried without a negative vote.

Deputy City Clerk Kletzien administered the oaths of office.

PRESENTATION – 2008 POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT

Police Chief Frank presented a summary report of the Police Department for 2008. He acknowledged the Police and Fire Commission and their contributions. The following facts were presented:

- Violent crimes consisted of one robbery and eight aggravated assaults
- Property crimes decreased to 137 in 2008 compared to 154 in 2007

- Stolen property increased from \$90,269 in 2007 to \$138,529 in 2008
- 15 felonies and 76 misdemeanors occurred in 2008 compared to 33 felonies and 58 misdemeanors in 2007
- 1,040 reports were investigated in 2008 compared to 835 in 2007
- Calls for service decreased from 15,523 to 14,902
- 2,705 people were assisted in 2008 compared to 3,273 in 2007
- Citizens at the station increased from 7,692 in 2007 to 8,644 in 2008 (due to implementing off-site vehicle registration)
- Telephone calls increased from 16,106 to 16,688
- 911 calls increased from 871 in 2007 to 1,071 in 2008
- 166 alarms were received in 2008 compared to 135 in 2007
- Department activities included 506 non-traffic arrests (mostly under age drinking arrests) in 2008 compared to 368 in 2007
- Warnings for non-traffic offenses decreased from 594 in 2007 to 541 in 2008
- Traffic warnings decreased from 2,790 in 2007 to 2,616 in 2008
- 319 speeding tickets were issued in 2008 compared to 298 in 2007
- OAWI offenses decreased from 48 in 2007 to 40 in 2008
- Arrests for adult alcohol offenses increased to 70 in 2008 compared to 53 in 2007
- Juvenile alcohol arrests increased to 40 in 2008 compared to 15 in 2007
- 17 tobacco violations occurred in 2008 compared to 9 in 2007
- Drug offenses decreased from 30 in 2007 to 29 in 2008
- 78 bicycle/skateboard warnings were issued compared to 118 in 2007
- Worthless checks decreased from \$9,163 in 2007 to \$8,023 in 2008, with 93 investigations and \$2,316 recovered
- 225 accidents occurred in 2008 involving 31 injuries compared to 194 in 2007 involving 34 injuries
- Community policing included 107,947 checked doors with 137 open, 1,938 vacation checks, 230 vehicle lockouts, 750 rescue squad calls, 198 fire calls, D.A.R.E. program for 292 students, Safety Town and Safety Camp for 190 students, School Liaison Officer, child safety seat inspections (51), Safety Days, Website, Tele-care program, Hunter Safety (54 participants), Community Room (121), DMV vehicle registration program (429 transactions=\$4,212), and conducting the Citizens Police Academy

Chief Frank summarized the overtime and training hours, adding that Emergency Government helps with traffic control and parades/runs/walks which reduces overtime.

There were no changes in Department personnel in 2008.

The Cedarburg Police Department participates in Mutual Aid with three officers on the Ozaukee Special Response Team and two officers on the Ozaukee Drug Enforcement Unit. Assists to other departments totaled 184 in 2008.

There was a phone system upgrade to the PRI line and a video enhancement system was purchased with a grant.

The Police Department employs 15 school crossing guards for 10 intersections during the school year.

Pastor Randall Raasch and Pastor Ed Rafferty are the Department Chaplains that assist in high crisis situations.

In answer to Council Member C. Reimer's question, Chief Frank stated the City of Cedarburg has assisted the Town of Cedarburg approximately 61 times in 2008.

In answer to Council Member Loomis' question, Chief Frank stated that the purposes of the calls were most likely because there was not a sheriff's squad in the area or more officers were needed.

In answer to Council Member Loomis' question, Chief Frank stated that Jake is a great asset to the department and they are fortunate to have him.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Motion made by Council Member C. Reimer, seconded by Council Member Radtke, to approve the minutes of the May 11, 2009 meeting. Motion carried without a negative vote.

REPORTS OF BOARDS, COMMISSIONS & COMMITTEES - None

COMMENTS & SUGGESTIONS FROM CITIZENS – None

CONSIDER CERTIFIED SURVEY MAP (CSM) APPROVAL TO DIVIDE THE PARCEL LOCATED AT THE NORTHEAST CORNER OF EVERGREEN BLVD. AND PIONEER ROAD INTO THREE PARCELS; AND EXTENSION OF TIME PERIOD REQUIRED TO FILE THE CSM

Motion made by Council Member Filter, seconded by Council Member Radtke, to approve the Certified Survey Map to divide the parcel located at the northeast corner of Evergreen Blvd. and Pioneer Road into three parcels; and extension of the time period required to file the CSM. Motion carried without a negative vote.

CONSIDER 2008 COMPLIANCE MAINTENANCE ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE WASTEWATER TREATMENT PLANT AND RESOLUTION 2009-08 ACCEPTING THE REPORT

Wastewater Superintendent Clish stated the Compliance Maintenance Annual Report (CMAR) is a DNR summary report form used to determine the effectiveness of the sewerage system to meet DNR permit limits and to indicate areas of the system that may need improvement. In 2008, 20 points were deducted from the Collection System category due to excessive rain events. No action for improvement in the system is required.

Motion made by Council Member Filter, seconded by Council Member R. Reimer, to accept the 2008 Compliance Maintenance Annual Report for the Wastewater Treatment Plant and adopt Resolution No. 2009-08 accepting the report. Motion carried without a negative vote.

CONSIDER INCREASE TO MID-MORAINNE MUNICIPAL BOND SCHEDULE

Motion made by Council Member Loomis, seconded by Council Member R. Reimer, to approve the increase to the Mid-Moraine Municipal Bond Schedule.

Police Chief Frank stated that the Mid-Moraine Municipal Court Association is asking all member municipalities to raise most fines to become more compatible with other area municipal court bond schedules.

Motion carried without a negative vote.

CONSIDER REQUEST OF MANUEL EXPARZA OF POLLO LOCO, LLC TO AMEND THE PREMISE DESCRIPTION OF THE CEDARBURG FAMILY RESTAURANT LIQUOR LICENSE TO SELL/SERVE ALCOHOL IN THE PARKING SPACES IN FRONT OF THE RESTAURANT DURING STRAWBERRY AND WINE & HARVEST FESTIVALS

Council Member Filter stated that Chief Frank is not in favor of granting permission because of concerns about pedestrian safety and businesses setting up tables and tents and blocking pedestrian and vehicular traffic in this area.

Council Member R. Reimer opined that it is difficult to prohibit Pollo Loco from vending when the Stagecoach Inn, which is located directly next door, has already been granted approval to vend in front of their business during festivals.

Mayor Myers stated that the businesses south of Mill Street would like to be included in the festival footprint.

Chief Frank stated that Fire Chief Van Dinter wants to keep this area clear for emergency personnel.

Council Member Filter stated that he was not in favor of granting approval to Pollo Loco because of the heavy vehicular traffic in the street.

In answer to Council Member R. Reimer's question, Chief Frank stated that he is not aware of any problems near the Stagecoach Inn. Most of the problems in the last two years have been with intoxicated individuals.

Council Member Kinzel stated that there has been a dramatic increase in attendance at the festival, and by using the parking spaces to vend, it would free up space on the sidewalk.

Council Member R. Reimer requested that the Council specify that the opening of their tent face the sidewalk.

Council Member Radtke expressed concern for authorizing one business to vend outside in front of their business and not another. He suggested barricading the entire area between the two businesses.

Council Member C. Reimer stated that this may open the door to other businesses wanting to vend in the street.

Mayor Myers stated the item regarding the businesses in the block between Mill Street and Western Road being included in the festival footprint needs to be revisited in the near future.

Council Member Loomis stated he cannot support this action if Police Chief Frank and Fire Chief VanDinter are opposed.

In answer to Council Member R. Reimer's question, Chief Frank stated there have not been any problems with Stagecoach Inn vending outside their business during the festivals.

Chief Frank opined that each time a business is allowed to vend outside on this block it will add to the number of people going into the street.

Council Member C. Reimer opined that Council cannot deny this request because the Stagecoach Inn is allowed to vend outside.

City Attorney Vance stated that the concerns referenced regarding Chief Van Dinter's issue pertain to people encroaching in the street. Overall the increasing attendance has created safety and liability concerns that need to be addressed.

Council Member C. Reimer suggested tabling this decision or granting the amendment under the condition that it can be withdrawn if it creates a problem.

Mayor Myers stated that servers need to be aware of not selling to intoxicated people who may walk into traffic.

Motion made by Council Member Radtke, seconded by Council Member Kinzel, to approve the request to sell beer and wine only in the parking spaces in front of the Pollo Loco restaurant during Strawberry and Wine & Harvest Festivals subject to the tent opening facing the sidewalk and only selling on the open side and with the option of revisiting this item in the future if needed. Motion carried with Council Members C. Reimer, R. Reimer, Radtke, Maher and Kinzel in favor and Council Members Filter and Loomis opposed.

AUTHORIZE ISSUANCE OF A FESTIVAL CELEBRATION PERMIT TO FESTIVALS OF CEDARBURG, INC. FOR THE CEDARBURG BIKE CLASSIC TO BE HELD ON JULY 21, 2009 FROM 6:00 P.M. UNTIL 9:00 P.M. AND CONSIDER REQUEST FROM FESTIVALS OF CEDARBURG, INC. TO WAIVE THE FESTIVAL CELEBRATION PERMIT FEE AND ANY NON-MAINTENANCE FEES FOR THE EVENT

The Festivals Committee is requesting the City waive the \$300 permit fee for the Cedarburg Cycling Classic to be held on July 21, 2009. The request also includes a waiver of any non-maintenance fees, specifically the City Hall lawn rental fee in the amount of \$100.

Council Member Maher stated the City should charge for all events with no exceptions.

Council Member Filter stated the fee charged for the City Hall lawn rental pays for the restoration of the lawn after the event.

Council Member Loomis stated the event is good advertising and he was in favor of waiving the fee.

Council Member Maher argued the same logic could be used with the other festivals.

Council Member Loomis stated other festivals generate more revenue; whereas, the Cycling Classic only lasts a few hours.

Motion made by Council Member Loomis, seconded by Council Member Filter, to waive the \$300 Festival Permit fee only, as done the last three years.

Council Member Radtke agreed to continuing past practice for the Cycling Classic.

Motion carried without a negative vote.

CONSIDER ESTABLISHING A POLICY REGARDING THE PUBLISHING OF NEWSLETTER-TYPE INFORMATION GENERATED BY AND/OR IN THE NAME OF THE CITY

Council Member R. Reimer learned that there is no procedure relating to the issuance of City-related newsletters and news-type events such as calendars of events. He asked that the City launch a committee to write a procedure for using City resources in this manner.

Council Member Radtke stated that the Council Member's individual newsletters are not funded in anyway by the City.

Mayor Myers stated each official has the opportunity to send their own newsletters. The City has a newsletter with a certain format that is distributed twice per year.

Council Member Loomis suggested that the Personnel Committee review this topic.

Council Member C. Reimer asked if the Council Members may use the copier and City resources for their newsletters.

Mayor Myers stated that City resources cannot be used for individual political views. The City Newsletter only contains information about the City and he is not in favor of changing this practice.

In answer to Council Member R. Reimer's question, City Administrator/Treasurer Mertes stated all City Department Heads review the City Newsletter before it is published. City Attorney Vance does not review it.

Council Member C. Reimer suggested that City Attorney Vance review the City Newsletters before it is published because taxpayer money is involved.

It was the consensus of the Common Council to have City Attorney Vance and City Administrator/Treasurer Mertes draft a policy regarding the publishing of newsletter-type information generated by and/or in the name of the City for future review by the Common Council.

CONSIDER ISSUANCE OF TRANSIENT ENTERTAINMENT LICENSE TO RAINBOW VALLEY RIDES, INC. FOR THE OZAUKEE COUNTY FAIR FOR JULY 29 (4:00 P.M. TO 11:00 P.M.) JULY 30, 10:00 A.M. TO 11:00 P.M., JULY 31 AND AUGUST 1 (10:00 A.M. TO 11:00 P.M., AND AUGUST 2, 2009 (10:00 A.M. TO 7:00 P.M.) AND THE REQUEST TO WAIVE THE REQUIREMENT FOR A CLEAN UP BOND AS REQUESTED BY THE AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY

Council Member Filter stated Rainbow Valley Rides Inc. is a new vendor and was approved by the Police Department.

In answer to Council Member Radtke's question, Chief Frank stated that he called several County Sheriff's Departments where Rainbow Valley Rides has operated and he did not find any problems.

Council Member Loomis stated that a bigger concern is the possibility of child molestation as occurred in Beaver Dam some years ago.

In answer to Council Member Loomis' question, Chief Frank stated that a list of employees is submitted to the Police Department each day of the fair and background checks are completed on each employee.

In answer to Council Member C. Reimer's question, Chief Frank stated the officers do spot checks and interview several employees each day.

Council Member Loomis stated that officers watch for the selling of any inappropriate items and do ask vendors not to sell certain items.

Motion made by Council Member Loomis, seconded by Council Member C. Reimer, to issue a transient entertainment license to Rainbow Valley Rides, Inc. For the Ozaukee County Fair for July 29 (4:00 p.m. to 11:00 p.m.) July 30, 10:00 a.m. to 11:00 p.m., July 31 and August 1 (10:00 a.m. to 11:00 p.m., and August 2, 2009 (10:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.) and grant the request to waive the requirement for a clean up bond as requested by the agricultural society.

Council Member Filter stated he would abstain from voting because he serves on the Ozaukee County Fair Board. City Attorney Vance stated that it was okay for him to vote on the license.

Motion carried without a negative vote.

CONSIDER BUDGET CALENDAR FOR 2010

City Administrator/Treasurer Mertes explained that she is proposing the same schedule as last year, except two periods will be extended for review.

It was the consensus of the Common Council to approve the budget calendar for 2010.

REVIEW AND CERTIFY CODE OF ETHICS

Mayor Myers presented the Code of Ethics to the Common Council Members for review. It was confirmed that the Council Members read the Code of Ethics.

CONSIDER EXTENDING THE CREEK WALK THROUGH BOY SCOUT PARK

Director Hilvo stated that he received a request from Mal Hepburn to extend the Creek Walk through the Boy Scout Park. The funding would come from a local donor. The plan would be to resurface and widen the existing trail from Bridge Street to the Boy Scout House, remove two existing paths that are south of the Boy Scout House, and place a new path from the Boy Scout House to Riveredge Drive close to the creek. Many citizens from Georgetown walk through this right-of-way and it would be nice to have the path finished.

Council Member Kinzel expressed approval.

Council Member Maher stated that the Creek Walk has been a challenge and if this item is considered, he asked that the project not begin until the second phase of the current walk is started.

Council Member Loomis spoke in favor of the project and the efforts of a private donor.

Mayor Myers stated the project is being gifted and it should not wait.

Council Member Kinzel stated the improvement to this part of the walkway through Boy Scout Park has been discussed at the Park & Forestry Board meetings for awhile and has been on the radar.

In answer to Council Member Filter's question, Director Hilvo stated that it can easily be done under \$25,000. The DPW crew would do the removal of the 2 existing paths and parks crews would seed the area to provide additional green space.

In answer to Council Member Filter's question, Council Member Kinzel stated this item will not be brought back the Common Council in the future because the City is not funding the project.

In answer to Council Member Maher's question, Director Wiza stated this project is simple and does not require any DNR permits. It is essentially an extension of the current asphalt path.

Motion made by Council Member Kinzel, seconded by Council Member Loomis, to extend the Creek Walk through Boy Scout Park. Motion carried without a negative vote.

City Administrator/Treasurer Mertes stated that 35 employees and spouses participated in the Health Risk Assessments and will be eligible for a drawing on Wednesday for three \$100 Chamber of Commerce gift certificates.

ADJOURNMENT

Motion made by Council Member C. Reimer, seconded by Council Member Kinzel, to adjourn to closed session at 8:25 p.m. pursuant to Wisconsin State Statutes 19.85(1)(e) to deliberate or negotiate the purchase of public properties, the investing of public funds, or conducting other specified public business, whenever competitive or bargaining reasons require a closed session, specifically the Town of Cedarburg and Prochnow Landfill. Approval of closed session minutes of 4/27/09. Motion made by Council Member Filter, seconded by Council Member Radtke, to adjourn into open session at 9:20 p.m. Motion carried without a negative vote.

CONSIDER MATTERS RELATED TO THE AGREEMENTS WITH THE TOWN OF CEDARBURG

Mayor Myers stated the City received a proposal for settlement from the Town of Cedarburg of issues that involve the proposed boundary agreement and ancillary issues in that area, including water service and the Prochnow Landfill. The proposal was received on March 5 and the City has a counter proposal which is to be considered a public document because it addresses issues that are of public interest.

Council Member Loomis stated the following:

The City is making this offer to settle all differences with the Town. To this end, the City will enter into a Boundary Agreement that will accelerate the 5-Corners Sports Complex development and also extend City water utilities to the Town's 5-Corners area. The map of the Boundary Area is attached to the offer. The main points of the Offer are summarized below:

- The City supports the immediate transfer of the Prochnow properties to the Town for public park and recreational use. The Town will provide indemnity protection to the City to cover liability and cleanup costs.
- The City is willing to give up its interests in acreage included in both the developable and contaminated portions of the Prochnow properties.
- The City agrees to accept the Town's offer of 2 million dollars.
- The City will extend water to the 5-Corners Area in a manner that recoups City costs. This is the same procedure used when any developer receives City water.
- The Offer proposes a simple and efficient process with which to adopt the Boundary Agreement. This will speed up the ground breaking for the 5-Corners Sports Complex.
- The Offer also provides an umbrella agreement, assuring cooperative community use of the Cedarburg Fire Department, the pool, library, senior center, recreational facilities,

recycling and other services that are more economically provided if the costs are shared. Both communities have a long history of providing these beneficial and well used services on a shared fiscally responsible basis. The City believes that addressing these in a single document will ensure the continuation of the services, enhance cooperation and reduce the cost of negotiating these agreements.

- Both communities agree to work together to plan development that complements Cedarburg's treasured and historic Downtown and maintains the Town residents' desire to remain a rural community.
- The Agreement provides for the sharing of ideas between the City and Town on issues that affects both communities. This includes City input into the 5-Corners Sports Complex and increased Town input into services historically provided by the City.

With this proposal, the City is setting the stage to reestablish the cooperation that has been the norm for the vast majority of our history. The City of Cedarburg is committed to working with the Town for the mutual benefit of both communities.

Mayor Myers stated that Council Member Loomis' comments are based on the counter-proposal that is marked confidential; however, it is no longer confidential and is an open document.

Mayor Myers stated the City's offer is a very fair proposal that stems from discussions he had with the Town Chairman and agreements that they came to in their discussions. The Town did not respond in the same manner; however, the City's proposal is in the spirit of those discussions and agreements. He is hoping this proposal is received favorably by the Town Board because it is a document that works for the benefit of the entire Cedarburg community. Mayor Myers stated that this is what the Council and Town Board are here for, the City and Town are one community with shared interests, and the City and Town need to move forward in a progressive positive manner so that our citizens can fully enjoy the benefits of living in this community.

Council Member Kinzel stated this proposal is the first one that he fully agrees with. He has not always been a supporter of a boundary agreement, not knowing what the City of Cedarburg was gaining; however, both parties should receive what they are looking for in this agreement.
