CITY OF CEDARBURG COMMON COUNCIL NOVEMBER 26, 2018

A regular meeting of the Common Council of the City of Cedarburg, Wisconsin, was held on Monday, November 26, 2018, at City Hall, W63 N645 Washington Avenue, second floor, Council Chambers. Mayor O'Keefe called the meeting to order at 7:30 p.m.

STATEMENT OF PUBLIC NOTICE

At Mayor O'Keefe's request, City Clerk McHugh verified that notice of this meeting was provided to the public by forwarding the agenda to the City's official newspaper, the *News Graphic*, to all news media and citizens who requested copies, and by posting in accordance with the Wisconsin Open Meetings law. Citizens present were welcomed and encouraged to provide their input during the citizen comment portion of the meeting.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Council Member Verhaalen suggested the word "not" be inserted in the last sentence of paragraph six on page 5 of the November 12, 2018 Council minutes. The sentence should read: As far as the levy, the City is going to have to get used to <u>not</u> borrowing for streets because it is the City's obligation to maintain the streets.

Council Member Arnett suggested the word "use" in paragraph six of page 9 of the November 12, 2018 Council minutes be changed to "assistance". The sentence should read: Council Member Arnett suggested the City do the preconstruction pruning with the <u>assistance</u> of the new grapple truck.

Motion made by Council Member Thome, seconded by Council Member Galbraith, to approve the minutes of the November 12, 2018 meeting as amended. Motion carried unanimously.

CONSIDER ORDINANCE NO. 2018-21 LEVYING PROPERTY TAXES ON THE GENERAL, DEBT SERVICE, SPECIAL REVENUE, AND CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT FUNDS FOR FISCAL YEAR 2019

City Administrator/Treasurer Mertes said the following changes to the budget have been made since the last meeting:

- \$31,415 was added to the General Fund for one-third cost of a School District liaison officer (two-thirds intended to be funded by the Cedarburg School District);
- \$2,325 was added in the Capital Improvements budget for the lease-to-own grapple truck;
- Park improvements were reduced by \$11,000; park building roof replacements were moved to the 2020 Capital budget;
- Library impact fee use was increased by \$10,000 in Capital Improvements, which reduced the levy in Debt Service;
- Cable franchise fee revenue was increased by \$23,000 in the General Fund;
- The Contingency Reserve account in the General Fund was increased by \$30,000.

The changes resulted in a 4.9% increase in the tax levy and a \$0.28 increase in the tax rate. This equates to a \$77 increase on a home assessed at \$276,000.

Council Member Thome said she was surprised to learn that the \$2 per hour increase for the City Administrator/Treasurer, in addition to the 2% wage increase for all employees, is still in the budget. She said that while the salary for City Administrator/Treasurer Mertes is at a lower level compared to others in the area she is uncomfortable with the \$2 per hour increase based on a preliminary salary study done by Cedarburg Light and Water. She said the study has discrepancies and more work on the survey plans to be done next year.

City Administrator/Treasurer Mertes said the Light and Water study showed her salary to be \$10 less per hour than similar positions while a study done by the Wisconsin City/County Management Association shows her salary to be \$7 less per hour than similar positions. The amount of the increase for this in the General Fund budget is \$3,753. Her salary is 79% funded in the General Fund and 21% funded in the Water Recycling Center budget.

Council Member Arnett questioned why this discussion has not taken place at the Personnel Committee.

Council Member Thome said the Personnel Committee did discuss the salary survey. It was the consensus that the survey was preliminary in nature and the Committee needs to look at the broader picture in 2019.

Council Member Burkart said she agrees with Council Member Arnett that this should be discussed at a Personnel Committee meeting.

It was the consensus of the Council that Ordinance No. 2018-21 could be adopted as is with the understanding this matter will be discussed by the Personnel Committee in the future.

Motion made by Council Member von Bargen, seconded by Council Member Thome, to adopt Ordinance No. 2018-21 levying property taxes on the General, Debt Service, Special Revenue, and Capital Improvement Funds for fiscal year 2019, with the understanding that the \$2 per hour salary increase for the City Administrator/Treasurer be reviewed at a future Personnel Committee meeting.

Council Member Arnett said he has been frustrated with the budget process this year. He has tried to come up with several thoughts and ideas, and believes he has failed in getting them over the goal line. He thanked staff and City Administrator/Treasurer Mertes for their work on the budget,

adding that it is hard to be stuck in the middle. He said the following are good things in the 2019 budget:

- The General Fund levy is down 2.9%;
- The City is not borrowing for road or capital improvements;
- The City is funding the increased debt service;
- The City will continue to provide excellent services to constituents.

Council Member Arnett said at the last Council meeting resident Alan Clapp was in attendance to explain he and his neighbors are concerned about dead ash trees in the conservancy. Later in the meeting the Council approved a \$12,800 contract for preconstruction pruning. He wonders if everyone involved knows that the contract was for full structural pruning of trees; not just raising the canopy for the construction equipment. The City owns equipment to prune street trees. The City will own a new \$190,000 grapple truck to remove streets. But the City does not have any equipment to get into the conservancy and needs to contract that out. In his opinion the \$12,800 should have gone to the conservancy. He said he understands there were concerns about snow, but there are five and one-half months to trim the trees on 3-4 blocks.

In terms of the liaison officer, Council Member Arnett said the City has five school buildings and is looking for one officer. Some Council Members have extensive law enforcement experience but some of their ideas were rejected. The School District is made up of five communities. He questioned if anyone asked the neighboring communities in the Cedarburg School District to contribute to the costs of an officer. If not, why not? If the School District uses part of its \$60 million from the recently passed referendum to fund 100% of this officer, then that cost is spread proportionally among all five communities that will benefit. He said he supports the idea of the officer but why should his neighbors pay a higher tax bill to lower the tax bill from someone in Mequon or Grafton. These communities should be asked to contribute.

Council Member Arnett said there are other things in the area of duplication of services and cooperation with adjoining towns that he has spoken about before:

- Raising the weight limit on 1,000 feet of road in the Town of Cedarburg would save taxpayers over \$50,000 per year at the treatment plant; yet their fully loaded salt truck travels on Washington Avenue contributing to more and more potholes.
- The Friends of the Library is paying for a strategic plan. Part of this plan should explore seeking a Joint Library Agreement with the Town of Cedarburg.
- Hundreds of thousands of dollars are spent on maintaining the Fire Station. The City dispatches to the Town of Cedarburg from that station. No money is received from the Town for maintenance reimbursement. The same is true for the Senior Center.

Council Member Arnett concluded by saying the Council did okay on the budget, but can do better. Council Member von Bargen said he agrees with Council Member Arnett on these items.

Mayor O'Keefe said the schools are in Cedarburg and if there is not a school liaison officer the City will end up paying for investigative work that needs to be done.

Council Member Thome said the tree trimming contract amounts to \$89 per tree. She said the City could probably not do quality work for less than \$89.

Council Member Chivinski said he agrees with Council Member Arnett on most cases and agrees with comments made by Council Member Galbraith in recent meetings. He said the next budget will be very difficult as the Council needs to address the bigger issues.

Motion carried with Council Members von Bargen, Burkart, Verhaalen, Chivinski, and Thome voting aye and Council Members Arnett and Galbraith voting nay.

TITLE: Consider Ordinance No. 2018-26 amending Sec. 13-1-46(g) and 13-1-27(g) of the Zoning Code declaring existing homes in the Rs-5 and Rs-6 Residential Districts as legal conforming buildings; and action thereon (Plan Comm. 11/05/18)

ISSUE SUMMARY: At a recent meeting of the Plan Commission when considering an infill home request on Sheboygan Road it was noted that because the home lacked compliance with the setback requirement of the zoning district, it was classified as legal non-conforming. During that discussion it was also noted that since many homes in the City's older neighborhoods existed prior the adoption of the City's Zoning Code it is likely that they are noncompliant to setback requirements as well. Noting that the intent of the non-conforming law is to eventually faze such structures out of existence in favor of conformity, Commissioners asked staff to find a way to protect homes in those older neighborhoods.

Our research reveals that the older neighborhoods of Cedarburg are areas that are in close proximity to the Downtown Historic District and are within either Rs-5 Single-Family Residential or Rs-6 Single-Family/Two-Family Residential Districts. While these districts are intended to preserve the character of the City's original neighborhoods, they have setback requirements that are inconsistent with original development patterns. More specifically, the setback requirement in these districts would have all home located at the same distance of 25 feet back from the ultimate road right-of-way where the original development pattern provides a more staggered pattern. Accordingly, staff is of the opinion that the best way to protect these neighborhoods is to remove the cloud of non-conformity that hangs over these homes by adjusting the setback requirement.

Therefore, in order to preserve the original development patterns of Cedarburg's older residential neighborhoods, the intent of the attached Ordinance is to render all existing homes to a legal conforming status with respect to setback. This is accomplished by establishing the setback requirement for lots based on the existing location of the home. If the existing building is ever damaged or destroyed due to a calamity, the building will be restored to, or replaced at, the location it had immediately before the destruction occurred. All future building changes or additions will be based on the home's current location on the lot. New homes proposed for vacant lots within these districts shall be setback in accordance with current code requirements.

BOARD, COMMISSION OR COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION: At their November 5, 2018 meeting, the Plan Commission recommended approval by unanimous vote.

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ORDINANCE NO. 2018-26

An Ordinance Declaring Existing Homes in the RS-5 and RS-6 Residential Districts that are Non-Conforming due to Insufficient Front Yard, Side Yard or Rear Yard Setbacks to be Conforming

The Common Council of the City of Cedarburg, Wisconsin, hereby ordains as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 13-1-46(g) - Rs-5 Single-Family Residential District of the Zoning Code of the City of Cedarburg is hereby amended as follows:

SEC. 13-1-46 RS-5 SINGLE-FAMILY RESIDENTIAL DISTRICT.

(g) Setback and Yards

- (1) There shall be a minimum building setback of twenty-five (25) feet from the right-of-way of the street.
- (2) There shall be a side yard on each side of all principal buildings not less than four (4) feet in width.
- (3) There shall be a rear yard of not less than twenty-five (25) feet.
- (4) Buildings that existed prior to the adoption of this Ordinance that do not conform to the setback requirements listed above shall be classified as legal conforming buildings and therefore the front, side and rear yard requirement shall be based on the existing building location. If the existing building is damaged or destroyed by fire, explosion, wind, flood or other calamity the building will be restored to, or replaced at, location it had immediately before the destruction occurred.

SECTION 2. Section 13-1-47(g) - Rs-6 Single-Family/Two-Family Residential District of the Zoning Code of the City of Cedarburg is hereby amended as follows:

SEC. 13-1-47 RS-6 SINGLE-FAMILY/ TWO-FAMILY RESIDENTIAL DISTRICT.

(g) Setback and Yards

- (1) There shall be a minimum building setback of twenty-five (25) feet from the right-of-way of the street.
- (2) There shall be a side yard on each side of all principal buildings not less than four (4) feet in width.
- (3) There shall be a rear yard of not less than twenty-five (25) feet.
- (4) Buildings that existed prior to the adoption of this Ordinance that do not conform to the setback requirements listed above shall be classified as legal conforming buildings and therefore the front, side and rear yard requirement shall be based on the existing building location. If the existing building is damaged or destroyed by fire, explosion, wind, flood or other calamity the building will be restored to, or replaced at, location it had immediately before the destruction occurred.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage and publication as provided by law.



- 4. The unused sanitary sewer and water laterals must be abandoned at the main line.
- 5. If the green wall is not constructed, plans would need to be approved by the Plan Commission for the replacement wall construction, color and materials.

The motion was seconded by Council Member Thome and carried without a negative vote, with Commissioner Strautmanis excused.

ORDINANCE SUBDIVISION REGULATIONS CONSIDER TO AMEND TO ESTABLISH ULTIMATE RIGHT-OF-WAY WIDTHS AND AN ORDINANCE то RESIDENTIAL AMEND THE **RS-5** DISTRICTS AND RS-6 SETBACK **REQUIREMENTS – CITY OF CEDARBURG**

Planner Censky noted the road right-of-way dedication requirement was discussed when considering the Feider infill home request at W61 N839 Sheboygan Road and approved a variance to relieve the property owners of that requirement. It was then questioned whether there is the need for such an expansive right-of-way width in the older areas of Cedarburg. Staff was asked to look into the width requirement and consider making changes as necessary to establish more reasonable road right-of-way widths. In addition, staff was asked to identify other older neighborhoods of Cedarburg where existing homes have similar problems with setbacks as those along the east side of Sheboygan Road, and to then prepare relief for those neighborhoods either through the creation of a new zoning district or an amendment to an existing district.

The Subdivision Code currently establishes the ultimate road right-of-way based on the classification system of the road as follows:

- Local Streets: 60' (i.e. 30' from center line).
- Collector Streets: 80' (40' from center line).
- Major Arterials: 100' (50' from center line).

According to City Code, before any zoning permit can be issued, the ultimate road rightof-way must be dedicated to the City. These widths were set with the adoption of the Subdivision Code in 1989. After consulting with the City Engineering Department, the attached Ordinance proposes adjustments to the ultimate right-of-way widths that better reflect the City's needs for installing roadway surface and public utilities. Through their analysis, the Engineering Department determined that along certain sections of roadway, the ultimate road right-of-way width, established by the Subdivision Code, far exceeds our needs and reductions of certain right-of-way widths are recommended.

With respect to the issue of identifying homes in older neighborhoods in the City that are similarly situated to the Sheboygan Road homes, staff has been working with the City Attorney to address this through a Zoning Code amendment. Our research indicates that the majority of homes classified as legal nonconforming due to inadequate setback are located in either the Rs-5 Single-Family Residential District or the Rs-6 Single-Family/Two-Family Residential District. Instead of creating a new zoning district to render these homes conforming, it is recommended that a simple zoning text change to

those two districts will suffice. In order to preserve and protect the character of these older neighborhoods, an ordinance was drafted to render all existing homes as conforming structures. With this text amendment the setback requirement for those lots that contain an existing home shall be based on the existing building location and if the existing building is ever damaged or destroyed due to a calamity the building will be restored to, or replaced at, the location it had immediately before the destruction occurred. New homes proposed for vacant lots within these districts shall be setback in accordance with Code requirements.

Action:

A motion was made by Commissioner Cain, seconded by Council Member Thome, to recommend both proposed ordinances for adoption, with the addition of a bracket after Hamilton Road in Item 7 and Lincoln Boulevard in Item 8 in the Ultimate Road Right-of-Way Width ordinance. The motion carried without a negative vote, with Commissioner Strautmanis excused.

COMMENTS AND ANNOUNCEMENTS BY PLAN COMMISSIONERS

Plan Commission Review of Public Park Structures

Commissioners questioned why public park structures are constructed without Plan Commission approval. In order to preserve the historic character of Cedarburg, as many buildings as possible should require their review and as much citizen input as possible.

TITLE: Consider Ordinance No. 2018-27 amending Sec. 14-1-70 of the Code of Ordinances establishing the ultimate right-of-way width for certain sections of Cedarburg's street system; and action thereon (Plan Comm. 11/05/18)

ISSUE SUMMARY: This proposed change also came from a recent meeting of the Plan Commission when they were considering an infill residential home request on Sheboygan Road and were informed that before a building permit could be issued, dedication of the ultimate road right-of-way was required. Because the right-of-way dedication requirement for Sheboygan Road is substantial at 40 feet from center (80 feet total), that requirement couple with the limited buildable area of the site, rendered the site unbuildable. While the applicant did eventually secure a waiver to the dedication requirement from the Plan Commission, staff was asked to study the right-of-way widths of roads in the City's older neighborhoods and consider making changes as necessary to establish more reasonable widths.

The ultimate road right-of-way width requirement is set forth in the Subdivision Code and is based on the classification of the road as follows: local streets = 60' (i.e. 30' from center line), collector streets = 80' (40' from center line), and major arterials = 100' (50' from center line). After consulting with the City Engineer Tom Wiza on his needs for conducting work on public road/utility projects within the public right-of way it was determined that the current width requirement of certain older roads in the City far exceed his needs. Accordingly, Ordinance No. 2018-27 was drafted to reduce width requirement for Bridge Road, Columbia Road and sections of Washington Avenue and Sheboygan Road as shown in the attached Ordinance. These are the main roads that cut through the older neighborhood of the City this Ordinance will serve to further protect and preserve those historic neighborhoods..

BOARD, COMMISSION OR COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION: At their November 5, 2018 Meeting, the Plan Commission recommended approval of this Ordinance by unanimous vote.

ORDINANCE NO. 2018-27

An Ordinance Establishing the Ultimate Right-of-Way Width for Certain Sections of Cedarburg's Street System

The Common Council of the City of Cedarburg, Wisconsin, hereby ordains as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 14-1-70 (r) of the Subdivision Regulations of the City of Cedarburg is hereby amended as follows:

SEC 14-1-70 GENERAL STREET DESIGN STANDARDS.

(r) **Right-of-Way Width**

(1) The minimum right-of-way and railroad width of all proposed streets and alleys shall be as specified by the comprehensive, comprehensive plan component, official map, neighborhood development study, or jurisdictional highway system plan or, if no width is specified therein, the minimum widths shall be as shown in Table 1.



ORDINANCE NO. 2018-28

An Ordinance Updating Impact Fees

The Common Council of the City of Cedarburg, Wisconsin, hereby ordains as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 3-6-3 of the Municipal Code of the City of Cedarburg is hereby amended as follows:

SECTION 3-6-3 LIBRARY FACILITY

Any developer creating or constructing additional residential units within the City shall pay a fee to the City to provide for the capital costs necessary to accommodate the Library expansion needs of land development except as provided in subsection (8) below.

- (a) The amount of the fee shall be \$852.79 \$877.52 per single-family residential dwelling unit to be constructed or created by the proposed development.
- (b) The amount of the fee shall be <u>\$566.41</u> <u>\$582.84</u> per residential unit for a multi-family residential dwelling unit to be constructed or created by the proposed development. Multi-family includes Community Based Residential Treatment facilities.
- (c) The fee shall be imposed as a condition of the issuance of the building permit.
- (d) Such fees collected by the City shall be placed in a special fund which shall be separate from the General Fund of the City, and the special fund and all interest earned thereon shall be used exclusively for the capital costs of the library facilities within the City.
- (e) Such fees collected after December 10, 2008 shall be expended by the City for the aforesaid purpose within fifteen (15) years of the date of payment, or such fee amount paid shall be refunded to the then owner(s) of the property upon which such fee was collected.

SECTION 2. Section 3-6-4 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Cedarburg is hereby amended as follows:

SECTION 3-6-4 POLICE DEPARTMENT FACILITY

Any developer creating or constructing additional residential dwelling units or any commercial, industrial or institutional land development within the City shall pay a fee to the City to provide for the capital costs necessary to accommodate the Police Department Facility expansion needs of land development except as provided in subsection (8) below.

- (a) The amount of the fee shall be $\frac{975.59}{1,003.88}$ per single-family residential dwelling unit, and $\frac{647.97}{5666.76}$ per multifamily residential dwelling unit and CBRF at $\frac{2.48}{2.55}$ per 1,000 valuation for commercial, industrial or institutional development.
- (b) The fee shall be imposed as a condition of issuance of the building permit.
- (c) Such fees collected by the City shall be placed in a special fund which shall be separate from the General Fund of the City, and the special fund and all interest earned thereon shall be used exclusively for the capital costs of the police facilities within the City.
- (d) Such fees shall be expended by the City for the aforesaid purpose within fifteen (15) years of the date of payment, or such fee amount paid shall be refunded to the then

owner(s) of the property upon which such fee was collected.

SECTION 3. Section 3-6-5 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Cedarburg is hereby adopted as follows:

SEC 3-6-5 WATER SUPPLY FACILITIES

Any developer creating or constructing additional residential dwelling units or commercial, industrial, or institutional land development within the City or any owner of property in the City that has a change in use that results in the use of additional water capacity shall pay a fee to the City to provide for the capital costs necessary to accommodate water supply expansion needs of land development except as provided in subsection (8) below.

- (a) The water supply facilities impact fee shall be $\frac{1,917.68}{1,973.29}$ per single-family residential dwelling unit and $\frac{1,438.27}{1,479.98}$ per residential unit of a multi-family residential dwelling unit.
- (b) For all residential users of the water system, the following table shall be used to determine the number of residential equivalent connections (REC) per dwelling unit or building.

(d) The fee shall be imposed as a condition of the issuance of the building permit.

(e) Such fees collected by the Water Utility shall be placed in a special fund which shall be separate from the general fund of the Water Utility, and the special fund and all interest earned thereon shall be used exclusively for the capital costs of water supply facilities.

(f) Such fees collected after March 13, 2013 shall be expended by the Water Utility for the aforesaid purpose within twenty (20) years of the date of payment, or such fee amount paid shall be refunded to the then owner(s) of the property upon which such fee. Such fees collected before March 13, 2013 must be spent by March 13, 2016.

SECTION 4. Section 3-6-6 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Cedarburg is hereby amended as follows:

SECTION 3-6-6 PARK FACILITIES

Any developer creating or constructing additional residential units within the City shall pay a fee to the city to provide for the capital costs necessary to accommodate the Park facility expansion needs of land development except as provided in subsection (8) below.

- (a) The amount of the fee shall be $\frac{1,164.65}{1,198.42}$ per single-family residential dwelling unit to be constructed or created by the proposed development.
- (b) The amount of the fee shall be \$773.53 \$795.96 per residential unit for a multi-family residential dwelling unit to be constructed or created by the proposed development. Multi-family includes Community Based Residential Treatment facilities.
- (c) The fee shall be imposed as a condition of the issuance of the building permit.
- (d) Such fees collected by the City shall be placed in a special fund which shall be separate from the General Fund of the City, and the special fund and all interest earned thereon shall be used exclusively for the capital costs of the park facilities within the City.
- (e) Such fees shall be expended by the City for the aforesaid purpose within fifteen (15) years of the date of payment, or such fee amount paid shall be refunded to the then owner(s) of the property upon which such fee was collected

Any developer creating or constructing additional residential dwelling units, or any commercial, industrial or institutional land development within the City shall pay a fee to the City to provide for the capital costs necessary to accommodate the reserve capacity at the Wastewater Treatment Plant and for the capital costs necessary for expansion of the proposed biosolids management facility except as provided in subsection (8) below.

- (a) The amount of the fee shall be $\frac{657.15}{5676.21}$ per single-family residential dwelling unit to be constructed or created by the proposed development.
- (b) The amount of the fee shall be \$436.48 \$449.14 per multi-family residential dwelling unit to be constructed or created by the proposed development.
- (c) The amount of the fee shall be \$657.15 \$676.21per the number of residential equivalent flow of each industrial, commercial and institutional unit to be constructed or created by the proposed development.
- (d) The fee shall be imposed as a condition of the issuance of the building permit.
- (e) Such fees collected by the City shall be placed in a special fund which shall be separate from the general fund of the City, and the special fund and all interest earned thereon shall be used exclusively for the capital costs of the reserve capacity and expansion of the Wastewater Treatment Plant.
- (f) Such fees shall be expended by the City for the aforesaid purpose within ten (10) years of the date of payment, or such fee amount paid shall be refunded to the then owner(s) of the

property upon which such fee was collected.

SECTION 6. This ordinance shall take effect on January 1, 2019 upon publication as provided by law.

ORDINANCE NO. 2018-29

An Ordinance Updating and Adjusting the Amount of the Sanitary Sewer Connection Fee Imposed on New Development

SECTION 1. Section 9-2-6(c) of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Cedarburg is hereby amended as follows:

SEC. 9-2-6 SEWER SERVICE CHARGES.

(c) Sewer Connection Fee

A connection charge is imposed to fund collection system oversizing associated with new development and all newly annexed lots. This includes all lots created by land division, subdivision or condominium plats. The charge is not applicable to individual existing single vacant lots which are within the City. It does apply to newly annexed individual lots.

- (1) The Sewer Connection Fee Schedule is as follows: \$1,411.24 \$1,452.17 per single-family dwelling -\$937.30 \$964.48 per unit for multi-family \$1,411.24 \$1,452.17 per residential equivalent for commercial, industrial and institutional
- (2) The connection fee imposed under this section shall be adjusted annually each December, with any adjustment to be effective on January 1 of the following year. The annual adjustment will be based on the Construction Cost Index (CCI) published in the Engineering News Record. Said percentage shall be calculated on the ENR 20 city average. Periodic adjustments to reflect actual and planned development density corrections may be necessary.

SECTION 2. This ordinance shall take effect January 1, 2019 upon publication as provided by law.

ORDINANCE NO. 2018-30

An Ordinance Designating Fees in Lieu of Park Land

The Common Council of the City of Cedarburg, Wisconsin, does hereby ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 14-1-84 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Cedarburg is hereby amended as follows:

SEC. 14-1-84 FEES IN LIEU OF LAND.

If the proposed subdivision does not encompass a proposed public park, parkway or other open space lands, or if the Plan Commission requires the reservation of land as set forth in this Section, a fee for the acquisition of public sites to serve the future inhabitants of the proposed subdivision or certified survey map shall be paid to the City Clerk at the time of first application for approval of a final plat of said subdivision, or certified survey map, or part thereof, in the amount of \$864.29 \$889.35 for each proposed single-family dwelling unit within the plat and \$574.05 \$590.70 for each proposed multi-family dwelling unit. For Community Based Residential Facilities (CBRFs) the fee for acquisition of public sites shall be \$574.05 \$590.70 per unit. Public site fees collected by the City Treasurer under the provisions of this Article shall be placed in nonlapsing special funds for City parks and shall be separate from the General Fund of the City, and said special fund shall be used exclusively for the acquisition and development of park, recreation and other open space areas.

SECTION 2. Section 14-1-100(g) entitled **ADMINISTRATIVE AND OTHER FEES** of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended as follows:

(g) **Public Site Fee.** If the subdivision does not contain lands to be dedicated as required in this Chapter, the Common Council shall require a fee for the acquisition and development of public sites to serve the future inhabitants of the proposed subdivision. Said fee shall be paid to the City Clerk at the time of first application for approval of a final plat of said subdivision in the amount of \$864.29 \$889.35 for each single-family dwelling unit within the plat and \$574.05 \$590.70 for each multi-family dwelling unit. For Community Based Residential Facilities (CBRFs) the fee for acquisition and development of public sites shall be \$574.05 \$590.70 per unit. Public site fees shall be placed in a separate Service District Fund by the City Clerk to be used only for the acquisition and development of park sites which will serve the proposed subdivision. Said fund shall be established on the basis of the service area of existing or proposed park facilities.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall take effect on January 1, 2019 upon publication as provided by law.

CITY OF CEDARBURG POLICY/PROCEDURE MANUAL

SUBJECT: INVESTMENT POLICY

FC-4

General: The City needs to ensure continuous prudent deposits and investments of available City funds.

Procedures:

A. Public Deposits

- 1. The City shall designate one or more public depositories, organized and doing business under the laws of this state or federal law, and located in this state. Depositories to be designated shall be evaluated by the City Administrator/Treasurer and recommended to the Common Council for approval and formal designation via resolution.
- 2. As part of the evaluation and recommendation of public depositories, the City Administrator/Treasurer will obtain annual audited financial statements from depository institutions where City funds are being deposited or contemplated being deposited.
- 3. Deposits. The City Administrator/Treasurer shall deposit public monies upon receipt on a daily basis in the name of the City of Cedarburg in such public depository or depositories designated by the Common Council.

4. Collateralization. Deposits shall not exceed the maximum federal and/or state insurance coverages unless a) they are collateralized by federal government securities <u>or letter of credit</u> issued from the Federal Home Loan Bank at a rate of 110% of the investments; b) they are collateralized by local mortgages at a rate of 135% of the investments; or c) collateralization has been waived by the Common Council.

- B. Investments
 - 1. This policy is limited in its application to funds which are not immediately needed and are available for investment. Other funds, the investment of which is subject to special federal and/or state laws and regulations, shall be invested in accordance with such laws and regulations to the extent they may be inconsistent with the provisions of this policy.
 - 2. In investing City funds, the City Administrator/Treasurer should utilize a wise and prudent cash management system in such a manner to maximize investment earnings, while at the same time being able to respond promptly to authorized expenditures. When investing City

funds, the City Administrator/Treasurer should seek to maximize investment returns without taking undue risk as to liquidity or safety of principal.

- 3. In exercising investment responsibilities, the City Administrator/Treasurer shall exercise the care, skill, prudence and diligence under the circumstances then prevailing as would a prudent person acting in a similar capacity, with the same resources, and familiar with the like matters in the management of a similar activity, with a like purpose.
- 4. The investment of City funds shall be in accordance with the Wisconsin Statutes and as follows:
 - a. <u>Certificates of Deposit.</u> City funds may be invested in certificates of deposit maturing within three years or less from the date of investment issued by any bank, savings and loan association or credit union which is authorized to transact business in the State of Wisconsin. The financial institution must have been designated a public depository of the City by resolution of the Common Council.
 - b. <u>Money Market Deposit Accounts.</u> City funds may be invested in Money Market Deposit accounts at any bank, savings and loan association or credit union which is authorized to transact business in the State of Wisconsin. The financial institution must have been designated a public depository of the City by resolution of the Common Council.
 - Government Bonds & Securities. City funds may be invested C. in United States government bonds or securities with maturities less- than ten years from the date of investment. United States government securities are defined as bonds or securities issued or guaranteed as to principal and interest by the federal government, or by a commission, board or other instrumentality of the federal government. The securities must be accounted for separately in the books and records of the financial institution or securities broker-dealer from whom the securities are purchased. Such investments may also include securities of open-end management investment companies (or investment trusts) if the company does not charge a sales load and is registered under the Federal Investment Company Act of 1940 and if the investment portfolio of the company is limited to bonds and securities issued by the federal government, bonds guaranteed by the federal government and repurchase agreements fully collateralized by such investments with the average duration not to exceed 4 years.
 - d. Government Pool. City funds may be invested in the

Wisconsin local government pooled investment fund.

- e. <u>Repurchase Agreements.</u> City funds may be invested in repurchase agreements with financial institutions approved as a depository institution by the Common Council. Repurchase agreements can only be made in securities which are direct obligations of or guaranteed as to principal and interest by the federal government; and securities which are obligations of an agency, commission, board or other instrumentality of the federal government, where principal and interest are guaranteed by the federal government. Securities purchased by a repurchase agreement must be maintained in safekeeping by the financial institution. The City shall be informed of the specific collateral and investments in repurchase agreements shall be collateralized at 110% of the value of the City's investment.
- f. <u>Repurchase Agreements Collateralized by Local Mortgages</u> <u>Without a Federal Government Guarantee</u>. City funds may be invested in repurchase agreements with financial institutions approved as a depository institution by the Common Council. Securities purchased by a repurchase agreement must be maintained in safekeeping by the financial institution. The City shall be informed of the specific collateral and investments in these repurchase agreements shall be collateralized at 135% or more of the value of the City's investment.
- g. <u>Other Securities.</u> City funds may be invested in any fixed income security which matures or which may be tendered for purchase at the option of the holder within not more than 7 years from the date on which it is acquired, if that security has a rating which the highest or second highest rating category assigned by Standard & Poor's Corporation, Moody's Investors Service or other similar nationally recognized rating agency or if that security is senior to, or on parity with, a security of the same issuer which has such a rating.
- h. <u>City of Cedarburg Bond or Security.</u> Per Wisc. State Statutes Secs. 66.04(2)(9) 2,3,3m and (6), the City may also invest in bonds or securities issued by itself, or by other Wisconsin governmental units. Such transactions shall be developed as an "arms-length transaction", and shall be prepared in writing and approved by the Common Council.
- 5. Notwithstanding the above limitations, cemetery funds held by the City may be invested in any prudent investment in accordance with the provisions of Wisconsin Statutes Ch. 881. Investment of cemetery funds will be subject to the same oversight and reporting requirements as outlined in Section C below.

- a. When permitted by law, the City will pool cash from several different funds for investment purposes.
- 6. Investments in bonds and other securities will be made only from those financial institutions designated as public depositories and from a listing of securities brokers and dealers compiled by the City Administrator/Treasurer and approved by the Common Council.

C. Oversight and Reporting

- 1. Prior to investing in securities without fixed maturities (e.g., GNMA obligations or U.S. government securities mutual funds), the City Administrator/Treasurer shall report to the Common Council on his or her intention to make such investments. No such investments shall be made prior to the approval of the Common Council.
- 2. On a quarterly basis, the City Administrator/Treasurer will report to the Common Council on the composition of the City's investment portfolio and investment performance. The City Administrator/Treasurer will report investment activity as requested by the Mayor or Common Council.
- 3. The City will establish an ad hoc Debt/Investment Advisory Committee as comprised by the Mayor with representation of the Common Council and citizens with expertise in the investment and debt fields to be available on an as-needed basis to advise the City on specific investment and debt options and strategies.

D. Investment Advisor

- 1. Should the City deem it appropriate to retain an investment advisor, the following procedures will be followed with respect to the investment advisor relationship.
- 2. <u>Selection Process</u> The investment advisor will be selected by a competitive process whereby proposals will be requested from a listing of qualified advisors. The firm or individual from whom advisory services will be received will be selected by the City Administrator/Treasurer and the ad hoc Debt/Investment Advisory Committee and recommended to the Common Council for approval.
- 3. <u>Investment Procedures</u> Once an investment advisor is selected, the City will at all times be responsible for establishing the investment objectives to be accomplished. The investment advisor will be responsible for providing advice and developing and implementing strategies for carrying out such objectives. The investment advisor will have no authority to take possession of City monies or investment securities, nor to execute investments on behalf of the City until authorized by the City Administrator.
- 4. <u>Periodic Reporting</u> The investment advisor shall provide periodic

reports regarding the composition, performance level and accounting treatment of the City's investment portfolio. Such reports shall be made quarterly to the City Administrator/Treasurer and annually to the ad hoc Debt/Investment Advisory Committee and Common Council.

- 5. <u>Compensation and Term of Agreement</u> Investment advisory fees shall be established in advance. All compensation shall be disclosed in a written agreement. The relationship between the advisor and the City may be terminated at any time at the discretion of the City.
- E. Policy Review-The investment policy shall be reviewed annually by the ad hoc Debt/Investment Advisory Committee. Any changes shall be recommended to and approved by the Common Council.

Council Member Verhaalen acknowledged that the agenda for this meeting was posted and distributed in compliance with the Wisconsin Open Meetings Law.

ELECTION OF CHAIRPERSON, VICE-CHAIRPERSON AND SECRETARY, AND ACTION THEREON

Motion made by Council Member Galbraith, seconded by Council Member Verhaalen, to nominate Council Member von Bargen as Chairperson. Motion carried unanimously with Council Member von Bargen excused.

Motion made by Al Lorge, seconded by Bob Loomis, to nominate Council Member Verhaalen as Vice-Chairperson. Motion carried with Council Member Galbraith, Brian Thompson, Bob Loomis and Al Lorge voting aye; Council Member Verhaalen voting nay; and Council Member von Bargen excused.

Motion made by Al Lorge, seconded by Council Member Galbraith, to nominate City Administrator/Treasurer Mertes as Secretary for the Committee. Motion carried unanimously with Council Member von Bargen excused.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Motion made by Council Member Galbraith, seconded by Al Lorge, to approve the minutes of the May 2, 2017 meeting. Motion carried unanimously with Council Member von Bargen excused.

REPORTS

Update on Revolving Loan Fund Program

Kathleen Cady Schilling explained how the program originated from the State Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Federal funds. The Federal government doesn't like how the State program is run and wants to eliminate it. The State has come up with a close out proposal which is planned to happen on February 1, 2019. This close out program would eliminate the program.

There are two options in the proposal and one would be to de-federalize the funds and the CDBG fund would be closed. The City is on the list to have funds de-federalized but this could change before February because the Federal government has to approve the State proposal. With the de-federalization of funds the City would be able to keep the money and create a new program which could include loans for construction or retention, grants or any other areas of economic development. The new program could have fewer limitations.

In answer to Bob Loomis's question, Executive Director Schilling stated the City could start using the funds one week after the decision is made by the Federal government. The time frame to create the new program will be up to the City or be prompted by a new request that would come in during that time.

Executive Director Schilling stated she would work with staff and the Committee to help create the new program once the approval was given.

Currently the City has approximately \$920,000 on hand and three outstanding loans through the program.

Bob Loomis and Al Lorge volunteered to help staff with developing new program options for the Committee to review and recommend to the Common Council at a future meeting.

Update on US Bank Investments; and Action Thereon

Richard Romero expressed appreciation for their banking relationship with the City.

Wayne Sattler explained the interest rate market on various investments. He also referenced the City's Investment policy. Al Lorge asked if the City had loan limitations and Wayne Sattler and Bob Loomis discussed the possibility of a separate investment policy for the new loan program in 2019.

In response to Al Lorge's question, Wayne Sattler confirmed that the City's portfolio is laddered and investments are held until maturity. No new money has been invested so any change in value is due to maturities.

Bob Loomis asked if the seven year maximum maturity was comparable to other communities. Wayne Sattler stated it was, and very reasonable with a ladder approach.

The Committee thanked Wayne and Richard for the report and attending the meeting.

NEW BUSINESS

Consider Revision to the Investment Policy; and Action Thereon

Port Washington State Bank requested a letter of credit be used for collateralization. It was decided this was an appropriate coverage. The Committee recommended changes to section A.4. on collateralization. Under a) after federal government securities <u>or letter of credit issued from</u> the Federal Home Loan Bank at a rate of 110% of the investments was added to the policy.

Under section B.4.c. Bob Loomis suggested a change to restrict the length of maturity. At the end of the paragraph the following language was added: by such investments with an average duration not to exceed 4 years.

In response to Bob Loomis's question, City Administrator/Treasurer Mertes stated that yes; there have been internal investments/borrowing between the City and Light and Water.

Bob Loomis recognized Al Lorge as he was one of the original members to create this policy.

Motion made by Al Lorge, seconded by Bob Loomis, to recommend to the Common Council two revisions to the Investment Policy FC-4: adding a letter of credit issued from the Federal Home Loan Bank as an accepted option for collateralization and limiting the length of maturity of government bonds and securities to four years. Motion carried unanimously with Council Member von Bargen excused.

Review and Certify Code of Ethics; and Action Thereon

Members reviewed and certified the Code of Ethics.

Motion made by Bob Loomis, seconded by Council Member Galbraith, to adjourn the meeting at 8:00 p.m. Motion carried unanimously with Council Member von Bargen excused.
