COMMENTS & SUGGESTIONS FROM CITIZENS

Bill Hobbs, N47 W7034 Windwood Drive, stated that he is working with Dan Panetti to make Cedarburg a Bird City. The benefits of becoming a Bird City include communicating the City's current conservation successes, enabling outdoor educational and recreational opportunities for people of all ages, improving community pride, and improving the City's economy through ecotourism.

To achieve the Bird City certification the City needs to do the following:

- Create an education-based newsletter, published bi-monthly.
- Provide these educational links to the City website:
 - o Audubon at Home
 - o Cornell Lab or Ornithology
 - o University of Wisconsin Extension
 - o The Wisconsin Society of Ornithology
 - o The Natural Resource Conservation Service
 - o The Humane Society of the U.S.
 - o And Beyond the Birdfeeder: Creating a Bird-Friendly yard with Native Wisconsin Plants," an article by Mariette Nowak
- Be represented in one of the following events: Swift Night Out, Christmas Bird count (held in December); or Great Backyard Bird Count (held in February). Bill Hobbs would help organize a Swift Night Out to view birds roosting in a local smoke stack
- Put an educational program in place to control free-roaming cats

Director Hilvo is working with them to establish birding and nature paths in the parks. The Cedar Pointe Conservancy is a 13-acre park located on the south side of Lincoln Blvd. and the west side of Evergreen Blvd. where a new trail system will open scenic wetlands and woodlands to the public year-round and enable Cedarburg to qualify as a Bird City. Founders Park will also have designated bird trails.

Mr. Hobbs expressed appreciation for considering Resolution No. 2017-11 declaring May 13, 2017 as International Migratory Bird Day.

PRESENTATIONS

CONSIDER RESOLUTION NO. 2017-10 COMMENDING RETIRING DETECTIVE/SERGEANT JEFFREY VAHSHOLTZ FOR HIS YEARS OF SERVICE; AND ACTION THEREON

Motion made by Council Member O'Keefe, seconded by Council Member Thome, to adopt Resolution No. 2017-10 commending retiring Detective/Sergeant Jeffrey Vahsholtz for his years of service. Motion carried without a negative vote.

Jeff Vahsholtz thanked all those who helped him succeed, adding that it has been a fantastic 35 year career and he enjoyed his work immensely. He will continue as Fire Chief for the Cedarburg Fire Department.

PRESENTATION OF THE 2016 AUDIT REPORT; AND DIRECTION THEREON

Paul Frantz of Baker Tilly Virchow Krause, LLP presented the results of the 2016 City audit.

Audit Objective

The objective is to express an opinion on the financial statements of the City of Cedarburg as of December 31, 2016.

Financial Statements

o Audit Opinion

After tonight's review they will issue an opinion based on the Council's recommendation and approval. An unmodified opinion is the highest level of assurance that the City can receive from the external auditors. It means that the financial statement document has all accounting principles applied consistently between years, in allowance of generally accepted accounting principles. Also, the disclosures within the footnotes are consistent within the generally accepted accounting principles. They identified a number of restatements that were required under generally accepted accounting principles to bring the financial records into the appropriate shape. They also identified an investment vehicle that is not in compliance with Wisconsin State Statute. This does not affect the opinion of the audit other than bringing it to the Council's attention.

Management's Discussion and Analysis

This is a high level summary of the financial information. This explains the document and gives a comparison between 2015 and 2016.

Financial Highlights – Governmental Funds

- General Fund Revenues were \$7,874,191 compared to expenditures of \$8,457,378
- Other Sources Transfer of \$780,592
- Change in Fund Balance \$197,405
- End of Year Fund Balance \$2,445,980
 - o Fund Balance consists of Non-spendable (prepaid item) \$82,041, Assigned (for future years use) \$298,371, and Unassigned \$2,065,568
- Health of General Fund Reserves They recommend a range of unassigned fund balance of 10 25% of the budgeted expenditures of the subsequent year. The City has a healthy 23%
- Budgetary Compliance The City budgeted to use \$80,304 of fund balance. The City added \$197,405 for a positive difference of \$277,709.
- Capital Improvement Fund Balance \$1,884,513.
- Debt Service Fund Balance \$205,042.
- Non-major Government Funds (Consist of cemetery, room tax, recreation programs, CDBG, swimming pool, park impact fees, library, rescue and EMS, length of service award program, and TID #3) \$2,618,769.
- Proprietary Funds Unrestricted and Restricted Cash Balance (Light & Water Utility \$8,120,087, Sewer Utility \$5,741,265, and Internal Service Fund Risk \$898,307. These funds operate under a different method of accounting; therefore, the net position number is misleading. The City wants to look at what is available for use in these funds to determine if rates are appropriate).
- Long-Term Debt Between the City and the Utilities there is \$18,721,704 of outstanding general obligation debt. Statutory debt limits allow 5% of the equalized value. The City has the ability to borrow \$62,723,900 and the capacity to borrow an additional \$44,767,789.

Communication Letter

o Material weaknesses were identified: Internal controls over financial reporting (journal entries to bring financial statements into compliance with the required standards). This is

a very common material weakness that they give to their clients as 90-95% of Governments rely on their external auditors to prepare this document and the firm's standards require that they make you aware of this. (NOTE: working with City Administrator/Treasurer Mertes during the year has given them significant comfort in her level of expertise in the industry. Moving forward he suspects they will adjust the language of this material weakness to be more focused at the material adjusting journal entry level rather than not having someone on staff to prepare that financial statement document. City Administrator/Treasurer Mertes has the ability to read that document, understand what is required, and the City has made a decision that there is cost benefit to outsource this. If things continue, he suspects that is the direction they will move. It is not a reflection of Management's knowledge or skills; it is a learning curve between the two parties.) The other material weakness (will not continue in year two) – there were restatements necessary.

- Two way communication regarding the audit looking for feedback from the Common Council.
- Other comments and recommendations discusses departmental controls and states that they do not review the individual controls of each of department and ultimately there could be a gap in the evaluation. They noted that there is an advance between the General Fund and the TIF and that there is no resolution in place to allow the General Fund to charge interest on that advance. Interest is an allowable cost in the TIF when there is a borrowing between two funds that the City should be aware of and a resolution could be adopted.
- o Required communication to those charged with governance lists any new accounting policies that were adopted during the course of the year along with accounting estimates that were evaluated and used by management. This communication also indicates that they did not have any disagreements with Management during the audit. Lastly, they list the non- services that they provided for the City and declare their independence.

Mr. Frantz stated that it has been a pleasure to work with the City and he appreciated all of the time and effort that City Administrator/Treasurer Mertes and staff put into the process.

In answer to Council Member Dieffenbach's question, Mr. Frantz stated that the non-compliance investment involves the length of service agreement program for the Fire Department. UBS did not qualify under State Statute 66.0603(1) relating to the equity securities. City Administrator/Treasurer Mertes said they are investigating if they can prove that the Statute they operate under is okay or they will need to change the type of investments the funds are in.

In answer to Council Member Dieffenbach's questions, City Administrator/Treasurer Mertes stated that the City was unable to meet the expenditure restraint program for 2017 because as part of the budget process the City had to keep the expenditure increase at 2.7%. There was a change in the calculation that was done by the State; therefore, the City had to include all funds that were levied for, and as a result the City was not able to meet the parameters and lost \$160,000 in revenue for 2018. City Administrator/Treasurer Mertes confirmed that she told the Common Council numerous times during the budget process.

Mayor Kinzel stated that the City will be back on track to meet the expenditure restraint program in 2018 for 2019.

In answer to Council Member Dieffenbach's questions, Mr. Frantz stated that he spoke with the former auditing firm during the process to understand how an accounting standard was put into place. He said that they concurred with the \$700,000 reduction in the Fund Balance.

Council Member Dieffenbach stated that there were no uncorrected misstatements under the heading of Corrected and Uncorrected Misstatements on Page 13 and he asked Mr. Frantz to take the words "uncorrected misstatements" out. Mr. Frantz agreed to the change.

Council Member Dieffenbach confirmed with Mr. Frantz that their fees were in accordance with the agreement.

It was the consensus of the Common Council that there we no areas of concern.

PRESENTATION OF THE 2016 LIBRARY REPORT

Library Director Pierschalla presented the highlights of the 2016 Annual Library Report that is submitted to the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction and the Cedarburg Library Board.

The Mission Statement that was developed by the Library Board of Trustees is: The Cedarburg Public Library provides information and resources to all citizens of the community for their continuing recreational, educational, and cultural needs.

2016 was the Library's second full year in the new facility. They noted from the previous year, the demand for technology from the Library users. This prompted the Library to conduct a technology survey to best address patrons needs, as well as wants. They listened to the results and obtained funding (grants) from the Greater Cedarburg Foundation and the Cedarburg Friends of the Library totaling \$13,000 to purchase items that ranked high on the survey.

2016 Service Benchmarks

- 196,411 items were checked out in 2016, compared to 208,020 in 2015.
- 8,787 residents registered for Library cards, compared to 9,357 in 2015.
- 3,731 non-residents registered for a card, compared to 4,899 in 2015.
- Total Library card holders of 12,518 compared to 14,407 in 2015.
- 14,404 research questions were answered.
- 124,354 people entered the Library (actual gate count).
- 47,822 Wi-Fi logins, compared to 21,018 in 2015.
- The number of physical materials checked out decreased by 2% (less people are checking out DVDs), the number of digital materials checked out increased by 41%.
- Program attendance increased (Youth 49%, Adult 27%).

Director Pierschalla stated that the Library brings people to downtown Cedarburg and they consider the Library to be an economic anchor for the downtown.

Return on Investment

- The per capita expenditure for library service from the City budget is \$61.60.
- Average Cedarburg family of four pays \$246/year for library service.

• Average use by a family in one month of usage provided a savings of \$415.

Looking Forward

- The Library Board developed the following Technology Vision Statement:
 - o The CPL Board of Trustees is committed to supporting, updating, and funding technology in three broad areas:
 - Leading edge "innovative" technology that attracts current and new users and makes CPL an important part of the regional technology hub.
 - The behind-the-scenes "infrastructure" that staff rely on for library operations.
 - The practical "daily use" technology that enjoys frequent use and high levels of public engagement.

Implementation Plan for 2017-2018

- Microsoft Software classes are now being offered.
- Adobe Creative Cloud software will be installed and ready for use with additional programming with the first Expert in Residence by the summer of 2017.
- A Digital Conversion Lab will be up and running by the beginning of 2018.
- Virtual Reality equipment and software will be offered to the public during the fall of 2017.
- Coding and Design Classes will be revitalized and up and running with programs for all age groups and cover a variety of skills in calendar year 2018.
- Drone equipment, programs and classes will be available in 2018.
- The 3D Laser Cutter/Engraver initiative will be delayed until it can be proven to run effectively in a library setting.

Wisconsin's Digital Library

• Established in 2001 and is a shared, statewide collection of eBooks, audiobooks, magazines, and streaming video available for free to all Wisconsin public library card holders.

Monarch Library System

- 2017 brought the change from the two county Eastern Shores Library System to the current four county Monarch Library System that includes the 31 public libraries in Dodge, Ozaukee, Sheboygan and Washington counties and Lakeland College.
- Cedarburg residents have access via the Monarch Catalog to over one million items that are delivered five days a week. The Library System is an excellent example of resource sharing among four counties to reduce costs and increase services.

Budget

• The revenues and expenditures were \$18,000 over budget in 2016. The Library is working to cut costs in order to balance the revenues and expenditures for 2017.

In answer to Council Member Thome's question, Director Pierschalla stated that she has applied for all of the available grants to-date.

Council Member Dieffenbach stated that he is the Council representative on the Library Board. He congratulated the Board on running the Library like a business and making sure that the budget balances. He stated that the Library is a vibrant business and they probably have the second most visitors in a day, next to Olsen's Piggly Wiggly, at 372 visitors per day.

PRESENTATION OF THE ARRABELLE TRAFFIC STUDY; AND POSSIBLE ACTION THEREON

Tony DeRosa of HSI explained that one of the conditions for the approval of the Arabelle development was that a traffic study be conducted to determine the impact of traffic with the project. Along with Tony DeRosa was John Bieberitz of Traffic Analysis & Design to deliver the report.

John Bieberitz explained that a traffic study is not an approval of the development; it is a study of traffic and how the development impacts the street system and if any improvements are needed as a result of that increased traffic on the streets.

The analysis includes three scenarios:

- How does traffic operate on these streets today;
- How did traffic operate a few years ago with the school in operation;
- How would traffic be expected to operate in the future with Arabelle development.

The study area for the potential development included the following intersections:

- Washington Avenue and Hamilton Road (one-way stop control);
- Washington Avenue and Spring Street (one-way stop control); and
- Hamilton Road and Hilgen Avenue (two-way stop control).

When looking at these intersections they reviewed the 24 hour traffic volumes that are recorded by the Wisconsin Department of Transportation every three years. From a historical perspective, traffic volumes are stable with maybe a downward trend. For example, Hamilton Road in 2013 had 1,800 vehicles per day and a road this size has a capacity of 12,000 cars per day. This shows that a lot of growth can occur on this street. Likewise, Spring Street had approximately 1,100 vehicles per day in 2010 when school was in session.

At the intersections, they had staff in the field counting the vehicles and analyzing the data every 15 minutes on a weekday from 6:00 a.m. -9:00 a.m. and then 2:00 p.m. -6:00 p.m. to capture school

traffic and evening rush hour. This was done the week prior to spring break. A traffic gap study was also done to determine how easy it is turn right or left onto Washington Avenue from Hamilton Road. The gap study was done on a Friday and the Monday of spring break from 4:30 p.m. - 5:30 p.m. The results indicated that the typical rush hour is from 7:00 a.m. - 8:00 a.m. and from 4:30 p.m. - 5:30 p.m. The peak school traffic was from 3:00 p.m. - 4:00 p.m.

The existing conditions indicate that traffic operates at acceptable levels during the peak hours. The standards for waiting at a stop are graded from A-F. During the existing conditions the grade was C or better, which indicates that there is no need for any intersection improvements or safety concerns based on today's conditions.

Next they looked at the traffic generation for the proposed development compared to the traffic generation for the school. During the morning peak hour the school would generate about four times more traffic than the apartments would. Likewise, in the evening the school would generate over three times more traffic than the apartments would. In a total 24 hour period on a typical weekday with school in session, the school would generate 22% more traffic than the apartments would. Based on this comparison of numbers, the school had a greater impact on traffic than the proposed apartments.

The study showed that with the apartments in place, everything operates at the C grade, which may include some delays. This indicates that no improvements or traffic modifications are needed. When the school was in session the grade was also at C.

In summary, operationally based on standards set forth by the Wisconsin Department of Transportation everything operates at an acceptable level during the peak hours. Comparing this area to what it was five or ten years ago, the traffic impacts of the apartments vs. school, the apartments have less of a traffic impact than the school did at the time.

In answer to Mayor Kinzel's question, Mr. Bieberitz stated that the actual analysis was done the week prior to spring break on April 3, 5-7, and April 10.

In answer to Council Member Czarnecki's question, Mr. Bieberitz stated the industry standards are set forth by the Federal Highway Administration, which has been adopted by WisDOT, Ozaukee County, and the City.

In answer to Council Member Arnett's question, Mr. Bieberitz stated that Hamilton Road could handle as many as 12,000 vehicles based on planning guidelines from WisDOT and SEWRPC based on the 24 hour volume on a typical street with parking, sidewalks and curb and gutter of the same width. With these same guidelines applied to Washington Avenue, the vehicle traffic increases to 18,000- 20,000 a day.

In answer to Council Member O'Keefe's question, Mr. Bieberitz stated that the sequence of the traffic control signals will not be changed in this case, primarily because from the apartment's perspective the traffic pattern will be steady.

Council Member Verhaalen stated that the analysis that was done on April 10 was during spring break.

Mr. Bieberitz stated this was done between 4:30 p.m. – 5:30 p.m. after school would have been in session.

In answer to Council Member Dieffenbach's questions, Mr. Bieberitz stated that they only addressed traffic flow and not parking. He stated that the streets surrounding the proposed development are adequate based on the amount of traffic expected to be generated and they do not recommend any changes to the area.

In answer to Council Member Dieffenbach's question, Mr. DeRosa stated that they have not contemplated redirecting the Building C exit to Spring Street vs. Hamilton Road. That part of the site is planned for a single family home.

Plan Commissioner Zimmerschied asked what tools would be available if all of the smart growth areas were developed and there was increased traffic. Would one row of parking be able to be eliminated on Hamilton Road?

Director Wiza stated that the parking issues on Hamilton Road could be looked at as traffic develops. Occasionally the City runs into problems in the winter when there is a lot of snow, they have put up temporary no parking signs due to the encroachment of the snow banks. Over time parking restrictions can be reviewed. The addition of a traffic signal is very unlikely to be warranted at Washington Avenue and Hamilton Road. This may cause more problems than would be solved by adding more traffic signals. At 1,800 vehicles a day, you could incrementally double that amount and still not justify signals.

Planner Censky added that when the Weil pump site is reviewed, the intent is to extend a roadway system through from Jackson Street to Western Avenue.

Plan Commissioner Burgoyne asked if a no left turn option had been considered from Hamilton Road onto Washington Avenue.

Director Wiza stated that it could be prohibited; however, it would be better to monitor the area and possibly talk to the church to make some modifications to their vegetation or monument because it is a difficult corner to see around.

Planner Censky stated that there has been some discussion with the church regarding relocation of their sign.

In answer to Council Member Regenfuss' question, Director Wiza stated that traffic control is already established on Hanover with a two-way stop on Hilbert Avenue. Typically a very high threshold needs to be met for a four-way stop.

Mr. Bieberitz stated that you typically want an even traffic flow in both directions for a four-way stop.

Council Member Arnett stated that it appears that the traffic on Washington Avenue is declining over time. Mr. Bieberitz stated that from 1995 to 2000 the counts that he is looking at were not seasonally adjusted. Since 2000 they have been seasonally adjusted to account for various months

of the year. April and May would be perfect traffic months because school is in session and people are out biking and walking. Traffic Analysis & Design Inc. looked at the numbers statically and they actually increase the traffic rate by .5% to make it a more robust analysis.

In answer to a citizen's concern about the difficulty in turning left onto Washington Avenue from Jackson Street, Mr. Bieberitz stated that Jackson Street is equally spaced between two stop lights that create gaps. She stated that sometimes she needs to turn south to go north.

Aaron Schultz, W59 N370 Hilbert Avenue, heard that they did not consider any projections for parking needs or demands on Hamilton Road. He submitted a number of notes to the Common Council and Plan Commission regarding his observation of the corridor. It gets cramped when people are using both sides of the street. Any given morning when the church is in use, there are 8-10 parked cars on each side of the road and people commuting through the area need to take turns getting through. At a time when there was a dump truck on one side and a car on the other, a semi-truck came through and there was only room for one-way traffic. He asked what kind of street parking will be generated by the Townhouses and the reduction of parking from the Saint Francis Borgia parking lot (83 spots turned into 40 spots) and the apartments. This combination is going to create a number of pinch points. Has this been discussed?

Mr. DeRosa stated that they designed the plan to exceed what the City required from a parking standpoint. They have allowed for church parking to eliminate the need for street parking for the entire development.

In answer to Council Member Verhaalen's question, Director Wiza stated that there were some restrictions in place during school for the bus movement. There are some leftover parking and traffic regulations on Hamilton Road that will be addressed by the Public Works and Sewerage Commission. Director Wiza stated that there are issues with two-way traffic and parking on both sides of the street on 98% of the City streets. At 1,800 cars a day, this is manageable and is even seen on the new subdivision streets. The new streets are built 32 feet wide and Hamilton Road is 31 feet wide. They rely on the fact that there is not a steady stream of traffic, as on Washington Avenue.

Council Member Arnett asked if truck traffic could be eliminated on Hamilton Road. Director Wiza stated that there is a prohibition on through trucking; however, they are allowed on the road for deliveries. There is some increase in this traffic since the Town of Cedarburg has eliminated Green Bay Road as a haul route to the Wastewater Plant.

Planner Censky stated if the traffic study is acceptable to the Common Council then the developer can begin working on their architectural plans, detailed site plan, and landscaping.

As there were no disagreements to the study, the plan will move forward.

The Plan Commission was excused at 8:24 p.m.

NEW BUSINESS

CONSIDER APPROVAL OF A REVOLVING LOAN FUND LOAN FOR TEMPERATUREPRO; AND ACTION THEREON

City Administrator/Treasurer Mertes stated that the ad hoc Revolving Loan Fund Committee met on May 2 to review the request along with collateralization and income statement projections and have recommended approval of the loan.

Executive Director Kathleen Cady Schilling of the Ozaukee Economic Development (OED) has been working with TemperaturePro and provided a memorandum providing a summary and staff analysis of their request for a Revolving Loan Fund (RLF) loan for working capital as part of his start-up costs.

City Attorney Herbrand asked that the conditions of approval that were presented by OED be included in the motion to approve the loan, if the Council decides to do so.

Motion made by Council Member Dieffenbach, seconded by Council Member Thome, to approve a Revolving Loan Fund loan for TemperaturePro with the following conditions:

- That a \$70,000 RLF loan is provided to TemperaturePro. The loan would be used for working capital as part of its start-up costs.
- That an equity infusion of \$70,000 is provided to the Company by the owner.
- That the RLF loan is provided with a five-year term and amortization and an interest rate of 2 percent.
- That the RLF loan has a six month deferral of principal payments.
- That the loan is secured with the collateral identified above.
- That the Company creates two new full-time equivalent positions within 24 month of the closing on the RLF loan and that the new jobs are made available through the Ozaukee County Workforce Development Center. Additionally, the company agrees to hire 51% of its employees from low to moderate income households.
- That the Company provides to the City, or its designee, on an annual basis, semi-annual financial statements that are certified by the borrower, annual financial statements that are compiled by a certified public accountant, and signed copies of the corporate Federal income tax return.

Motion carried without a negative vote.

Council Member Thome stated that she was excited that the funds were being used because she was the administrator at one time and the funds were not used very often.

CONSIDER PROPOSAL FROM RUEKERT AND MIELKE FOR CEDARBURG TO PARTICIPATE IN THE MID MORAINE WATER QUALITY COLLECTIVE; AND ACTION THEREON

Director Wiza explained that the new storm water regulations have been evolving and to better address the new Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDL) some communities have banded together to attack the problem on more of a watershed basis. Ruekert & Mielke has teamed up with GRAEF to form the Mid Moraine Water Quality Collective. The group represents communities in Ozaukee

and Washington Counties, which presently includes Cedarburg, Mequon, West Bend, Campbellsport, Fredonia, Grafton, Jackson, Kewaskum, Newburg, Saukville, Thiensville, and the Town of Grafton.

Dave Arnott of Ruekert & Mielke and Matt Bednarski of GRAEF explained that the two main advantages of joining the collective is to save time and money, and for greater political clout. The DNR has a vision and prefers to work together on a watershed basis. There are two other groups in the area (North Shore and Menomonee). This group will work towards group compliance and group conditions in reporting rather than each community producing their own. They will be able to negotiate permit language and the timing of permits.

Mr. Arnott outlined the progress and activity for the Mid Moraine Water Quality Collective to-date and stated that they would like the City of Cedarburg to join them.

In answer to Council Member Dieffenbach's question, City Administrator/Treasurer Mertes stated that the \$5,000 is available in the stormwater budget. Director Wiza added that this is a worthwhile opportunity because stormwater regulations are evolving and the efforts have been positive from this group.

In answer to Mayor Kinzel's question, Mr. Bednarski stated that the City will see a return on their investment, as much as \$60,000.

In answer to Council Member Arnett's question, Mr. Arnott stated that 75% of the area communities are in the Collective.

Director Wiza stated that this collective would be working on a more global path and would be in a better position to disseminate and educate pertinent information.

In answer to Council Member O'Keefe's question, Superintendent Hackert stated that being a member of the Collective would help Cedarburg in their current permitting path for the Wastewater Plant.

Motion made by Council Member Arnett, seconded by Council Member Czarnecki, to approve the proposal from Ruekert and Mielke in the amount of \$5,000 for Cedarburg to participate in the Mid Moraine Water Quality Collective. Motion carried without a negative vote.

CONSIDER ENGINEERING PROPOSAL FORM GRAEF FOR ADDITIONAL TESTING AND ANALYSIS OF THE COLUMBIA MILLS DAM PER DNR REQUIREMENTS; AND ACTION THEREON

Director Wiza explained that GRAEF is currently preparing plans for various DNR mandated repairs to the Woolen Mills and Columbia Mills dams. As part of their review process, the DNR is requiring additional testing of the bedrock, as well as a stability analysis of the existing Columbia Mills Dam structure. This work is not included in the original engineering services proposal and GRAEF has requested a contract amendment in the amount of \$5,850 to complete the additional work.

In answer to Council Member Regenfuss' question, Director Wiza explained that if the City wants to argue that the Cedarburg dams should be treated differently by the DNR because they are built into the bedrock then the City needs to prove that the bedrock will not erode.

In answer to Council Member Thome's question, Director Wiza stated that this is a positive step forward and indicates openness on the part of the DNR.

In answer to Council Member Dieffenbach's question, City Administrator/Treasurer Mertes stated that the City budgets for environmental work every year for this purpose.

Motion made by Council Member O'Keefe, seconded by Council Member Thome, to approve the engineering proposal from GRAEF for additional testing and analysis of the Columbia Mills Dam per DNR requirements in an amount not to exceed \$5,850. Motion carried without a negative vote.

CONSIDER REQUEST FROM WE ENERGIES TO RENT THE FORMER REMOTE RECEIVING STATION AT N144 W5888 PIONEER ROAD FROM JUNE 1, 2017 TO APRIL 20, 2018 FOR OUTDOOR STORAGE OF POWER POLES, CABLE AND SWITCHGEAR; AND ACTION THEREON

City Planner Censky explained that WE Energies will be doing work in the area and in preparation for that work they are searching for a site to serve their temporary storage needs. Since they have been unsuccessful in working with private land owners in the area, they are requesting to use the City's former receiving station at N144 W5888 Pioneer Road. The site is not currently being used although the Police Department does use it periodically as an impound site. This site is approximately one acre in size, is secure by a six foot high chain link fence with vegetative screening around the periphery and is supported by a nine inch thick concrete drive. WE Energies proposes to rent the space for \$400 per month.

Council Member Czarnecki asked if there were any improvements on the property that could be damaged. Director Wiza stated that the site has heavy duty asphalt and a fence. They would caution WE Energies to not damage the fence.

In answer to Mayor Kinzel's question, City Attorney Herbrand stated that the City could ask for a month-to-month lease or a right to terminate; however, there is usually a six month lead time for any project to get started.

In answer to Council Member Thome's question, Director Wiza stated that WE Energies offered to pay \$400 per month and the rent will go to the Sewer Utility.

Council Member Czarnecki asked if there were any encumbrances on the property that would prohibit the City from renting the property to WE Energies. City Attorney Herbrand stated there were none at this time and the only risk would be if a developer comes forward with a potential use for the site. Also, WE Energies has been asked to share the site with the Police Department for impound purposes.

Motion made by Council Member Verhaalen, seconded by Council Member Czarnecki, to approve the request from WE Energies to rent the former remote receiving station at N144 W5888 Pioneer

Road from June 1, 2017 to April 20, 2018 for outdoor storage of power poles, cable and switchgear. Motion carried without a negative vote.

CONSIDER APPEAL OF THE WPDES PERMIT AND REQUEST FOR CONTESTED CASE HEARING; AND ACTION THEREON

Director Wiza explained that Attorney Art Harrington of Godfrey & Kahn and Jonathon Butt of Symbiont have assisted staff in preparing an appeal and request for a contested case hearing for the re-issuance of the new DNR permit for the Wastewater Treatment Plant. The permit sets forth a very restrictive effluent phosphorus limit and there are a number of technical issues that the City believes are worth challenging. The City was given 60 days to file an appeal or accept the permit as-is. By filing for a contested case hearing it will allow talking points between the City and the DNR. Any amount spent now will be well spent because the City may be looking at a \$7 million cost to be in compliance and is hopeful for a possible lessening in the restrictions.

Council Member O'Keefe stated that this is an emerging market area for consultants. Superintendent Hackert stated that this action should help in the interim and buy the City some time.

Motion made by Council Member Arnett, seconded by Council Member O'Keefe, to file an appeal of the WPDES permit and make a request for contested case hearing. Motion carried without a negative vote.

CONSIDER RESOLUTION NO. 2017-11 DECLARING MAY 13, 2017 AS INTERNATIONAL MIGRATORY BIRD DAY; AND ACTION THEREON

Motion made by Council Member O'Keefe, seconded by Council Member Arnett, to adopt Resolution No. 2017-11 declaring May 13, 2017 as International Migratory Bird Day. Motion carried with Council Members Arnett, Dieffenbach, Verhaalen, Regenfuss, Thome and O'Keefe voting in favor and Council Member Czarnecki opposed.

CONSIDER REQUEST FOR ADDITIONAL FUNDING FOR PURCAHSE OF A FRONT END LOADER; AND ACTION THEREON

Director Wiza explained that the City planned to purchase one front end loader this year; however, there has been an ongoing intermittent steering problem with an existing 2011 John Deere loader that is a safety hazard. In spite of John Deere's persistent effort's to service it, they have not been able to fully fix the problem. To resolve the issue, John Deere is offering to buy out the 2011 John Deere loader and replace this unit with a new one, provided the City purchase the loader we have in the budget from John Deere. This loader in the budget would replace the existing 2003 Case loader and plow. The offer proposed by John Deere would put the City approximately \$10,000 over the Public Works approved \$235,000 Capital budget. With this proposal the City would be getting two new front end loaders, close to the price of one. There are advantages in servicing and maintaining like units.

Superintendent Bublitz and Mechanic Hintz explained the ongoing issues and John Deere's attempts at trying their best to fix the loader. This will solve a safety issue for the Department and agreed that this purchase is a good value for the City.

In answer to Council Member Arnett's questions, Mechanic Hintz stated that John Deere's price is competitive and they have not charged the City over the last six years for service on the steering problem.

In answer to Council Member Dieffenbach's question, City Administrator/Treasurer Mertes explained that the Capital Improvements equipment replacement fund would cover the additional \$10,000 to replace the defective equipment.

Motion made by Council Member Dieffenbach, seconded by Council Member Czarnecki, to approve the request for an additional \$10,000 for the purchase of a front end loader. Motion carried without a negative vote.

Council Member Thome commended the Public Works Department for being creative in solving an ongoing problem.

Fiddlehead's rear yard is approximately 18 feet deep. Accordingly, the applicant is requesting a Zoning Code text amendment to allow the Landmarks and Plan Commissions to consider, on a case-by-case basis, outdoor patios enclosed by a pergola or similar fence structure in the rear yard setback area for sites in the B-3 Central Business District.

REQUEST FOR ZONING TEXT AMENDMENT TO CONSIDER ALLOWING ROOFED PERGOLA OR SIMILAR FENCE STRUCTURE WITHIN THE REAR YARD SETBACK ARE FOR SITES WITHIN THE B-3 DISTRICT – JOVANA CUBRIC/FIDDLEHEADS COFFEE

Planner Censky reported that Fiddleheads Coffee is proposing to install a seasonal patio enclosed by a pergola structure in the rear yard of their shop at W62 N605 Washington Avenue. The intent is to expand the outdoor seating area from the south side of the building to the area directly to the west and between the building and the adjacent building that fronts Turner Street. Review of their site; however, reveals that there is insufficient room in their rear yard for the proposed pergola enclosure to meet the required fifteen-foot rear yard setback. Fiddlehead's rear yard is approximately eighteen feet deep.

As a result, Fiddleheads Coffee is requesting a Zoning Code text amendment to allow the Landmarks and Plan Commissions to consider, on a case-by-case basis, outdoor patios enclosed by a pergola or similar fence structure in the rear yard setback area for sites in the B-3 Central Business District.

At their April 13th meeting, the Landmarks Commission voted unanimously to recommend approval.

City Staff feels that this request is in keeping with the policy of encouraging outdoor activity in the downtown area of Cedarburg and therefore recommend approval.

Jovana Cubric of Fiddleheads Coffee explained that the pergola was desired to make the patio more private for their customers and that it would be located two-feet away from the neighboring fence.

Council Member Czarnecki suggested that conflicts with residential neighbors to these outdoor patios be avoided by adding language that would not allow the use when the property is adjacent to residential properties or that permission must be received from the neighboring resident(s). He cited the complaints he has heard from the neighbors to the outdoor events held by the Cedarburg Art Museum.

Commissioner Cain pointed out that adjacent property owners are given notices when requests are reviewed by the Plan Commission and would have the opportunity to provide input at that time.

Commissioner Zimmerschied noted that the tables under the pergola could be pulled back further away from a lot line.

PLAN COMMISSION May 1, 2017

If recommended, the text amendment would be forwarded to the Common Council for a public hearing, and then the request for the pergola would be submitted to the Plan Commission for action.

Action:

Commissioner Zimmerschied moved to recommend approval of the text amendment as proposed. The motion was seconded by Council Member Czarnecki and carried without a negative vote, with Vice Chairperson Burgoyne and Commissioner von Bargen excused.

REVIEW SITE, ARCHITECTURAL, LANDSCAPING AND LIGHTING PLANS FOR PROPOSED NEW GARAGE AT W68 N563 EVERGREEN BOULEVARD; COMMUNITY METHODIST CHURCH

Planner Censky noted that Community Methodist Church is requesting approval to construct a garage off the Juniper Lane entrance to their parking lot. The proposed garage will be setback twenty-five feet from the Juniper Line right-of-way; twenty feet north of their south property line; and will measure 24' X 32' for a total of 768 square feet in size.

According to their plans, the garage will have two overhead doors and one pedestrian door on the north elevation and both the east and west elevations will include a 48" X 48" window on the lower portion and a 24" X 24" window on the upper. The south elevation will have no windows or doors. The building will be covered with Double 5 vertical Vinyl Siding with a Vinyl fake-brick base and an asphalt shingled roof.

Dave Blachmer of Community Methodist Church reported that they have a shed, but need more room for storage. The new garage would have room for lawn equipment etc., storage and shelving on one side, storage of Christmas trees and similar items above and then room for a workshop on the other side.

Carol Miracle of W69 N533 Margie Lane objected that the size of the garage would be more width than needed for three cars and eight feet deeper. The architecture has an industrial look. It will be an eyesore that will decrease neighboring property values and reduce the City's tax income. Ms. Miracle asked that a requirement of approval be to plant dense screening of arborvitae on two sides of the structure.

Ms. Miracle noted that Community Methodist Church showed concern for the neighbors during their renovation. However, before a building permit is issued, she proposed the Church come back with a landscaping plan and a garage plan with more of a green look to be more compatible with the residential neighborhood.

Mr. Blachmer stated that a garage cannot be hidden and the direct neighbor already has a heavy tree screen along the property line. The location of the new garage is pushed as far north as possible to be set away from the neighbor. The area closer to

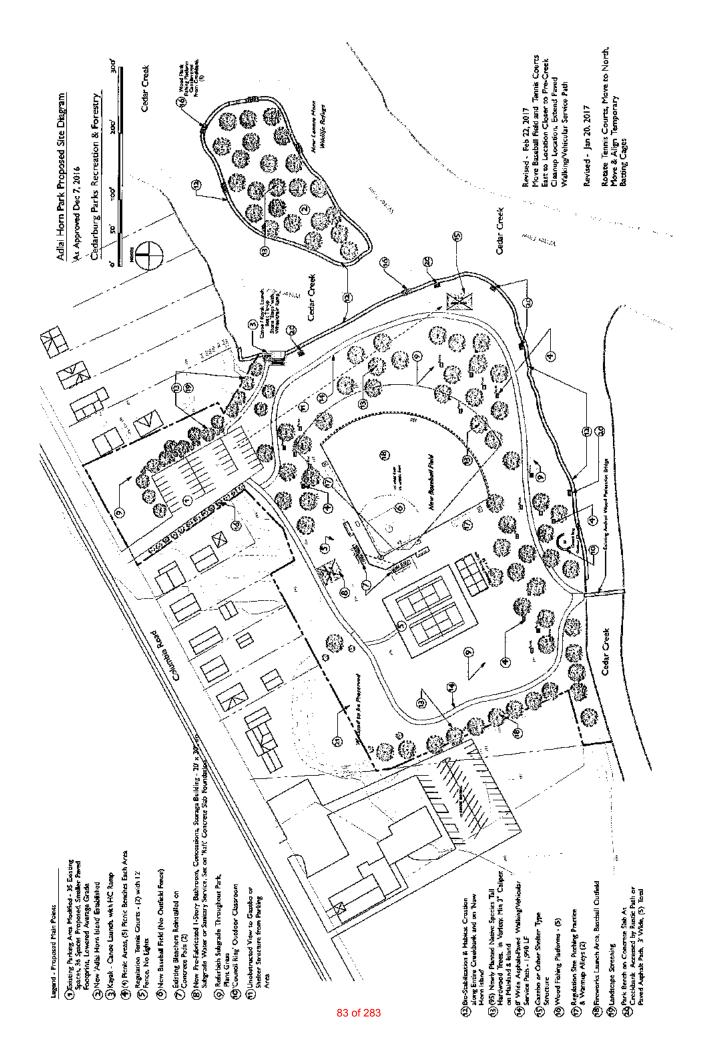

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Motion made by Glenn Herold, seconded by Dave Polacek, to approve the minutes of the October 5, 2016 meeting. Motion carried without a negative vote with Scott King excused.

REPORTS - None

<u>UNFINISHED BUSINESS</u>

Review Park and Open Space Plan (CORP); and Action Thereon

Director Hilvo explained that there is nothing new to report about the Plan and that he is still continually working on it. The section we are waiting on is Adlai Horn Park. Once the decision is made on what will be done at the park then we will finalize the CORP.

NEW BUSINESS

Review Park Survey; and Action Thereon

Director Hilvo explained that the park surveys were sent out and he received 268 responses. The majority of the respondents live within one mile of the park. He also mentioned that 55% of respondents stated that no additional parking is needed. In addition, the majority of the comments from the surveys were in regards to not wanting two ball diamonds in the park. Glenn Herold stated that he thought the survey response was good. Chairperson Schara then opened the floor to citizens for comments and suggestions. Citizens then expressed their concerns about the survey. Some were disappointed that it was not available in paper form and wants them mailed to residences next time. Other residents questioned the accuracy of the surveys and do not want to see any change in the park.

Discuss Adlai Horn Park Plan; and Action Thereon

Director Hilvo informed citizens that Mercury Marine has poorly informed the City about exactly when things would happen in the park. Trees have been marked, but we cannot control what Mercury Marine does. Director Hilvo said that there are two options for the park. Either leave it as status quo or use this opportunity to change or enhance the park. He then showed two field options for the park.

Jim Fitzpatrick and Chad King from Cedarburg Select Baseball then spoke about potential plans. These plans included keeping Grant Schoen Field the same, tweaking angles from the original plan, not hosting tournaments and not having an outfield fence. They also mentioned that their new plan was to enable the Recreation Department to utilize the fields for other recreational programming.

Director Hilvo mentioned that this clean-up is a unique situation and it is not something that tax money is being spent on, so the plan can be different. Glenn Herold asked if building a better parking lot to get cars off the street would make the neighbors happy, but the response was negative.

Simon Fast then presented a proposal. He stated that people come to Cedarburg for use of the parks and that we should not waste waterfront property with more ball diamonds. He was also questioning why Cedarburg Select Baseball has a say in this matter since they are a private, non-profit group.

Resident John Birkels stated that he faults the City Council for the destruction of the park. He also believes that Council Member Verhaalen should not have a say in this matter, due to a conflict of interest. Bob Schroeder then stated that the land was originally donated for public use and not just for a single sport. Another resident, Paul Hayes, gathered ninety-six signatures from Columbia Road residents who do not want the park changed. He also mentioned that if the parking lot size increases, then the park will have the fourth largest parking lot in the City.

Motion made by Paul Rushing, seconded by Terry Wagner, that the historic intent of Adlai Horn is to guide further planning by the Parks, Recreation, and Forestry Board to the effect of maintaining one improved baseball diamond, one improved baseball practice infield, with onsite parking remaining substantially the same and the remaining balance of the park restored to park open space defined as green areas with trees, paths, and creekbank improvements, details all of which will be refined during further planning. The tennis courts will be moved to Zeunert Park with the possibility of lighting. Motion carried without a negative vote with Scott King excused and Council Member Verhaalen abstaining.

Director Hilvo reported that he, Superintendent Bultman and Supervisor Friess attended the Wisconsin Park and Recreation Association's annual conference last week. Ms. Bultman and Mr. Friess were both awarded scholarships to help pay for conference registrations.

Ryan Yite is in favor of plan 3A and moveable batting cages, but against building a bridge to the island.

Paul Hayes wants to the see original vision of the park protected. He is in favor of a multi-use park and plan 3A without the foot bridge.

Eric Hofhine is in favor of plan 3A.

Council Member Patricia Thome thanked the Board for it's time on this issue. She is hearing that the residents would like a multi-use park with a single baseball field, tennis courts and open space.

Ed Rothwell doubts the sincerity of a practice diamond and does not want more parking added. He does not want a "vegastization" to happen to Cedarburg.

Greg Ellers mentioned that not having a batting cage would be a safety concern. If a practice field is not approved, he hopes that there is at least green space to use.

Jill Hepburn wants to see a multi-use park with green space.

Chad King, President of Cedarburg Baseball Club, said the current plan is not showing a useable baseball field because there are trees in the way. He also mentioned that if a useable field is not able to be built, Cedarburg Baseball Club will have no other choice, but to leave Cedarburg and find a playable field.

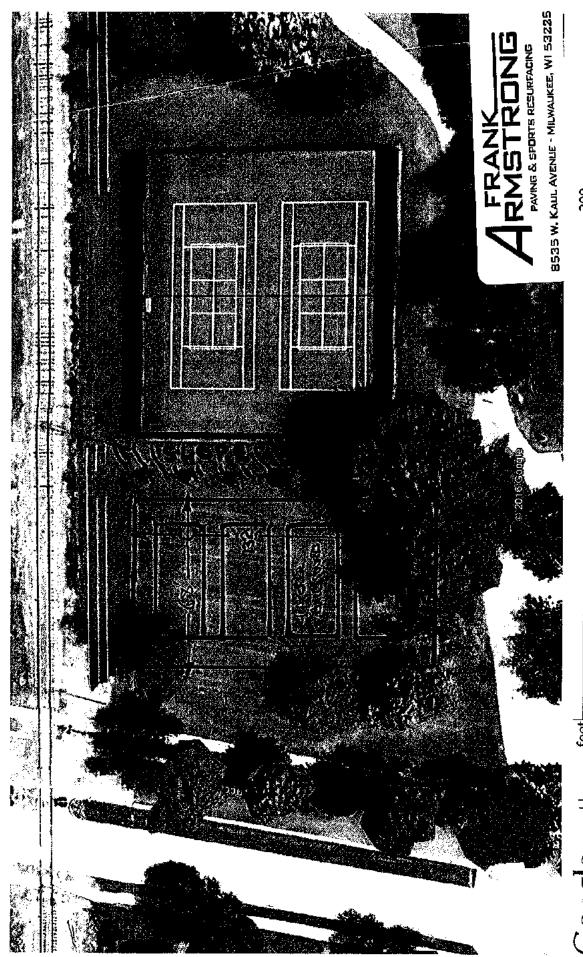
Attached is a proposal for future maintenance work on 2 existing tennis courts. We recolored them in 2014. There is not any long term crack repair for hard surface games, like tennis courts. The main reason is rubber or flexible crack sealers do not allow for proper ball bounce to play the game. Therefore, the industry really has only 3 options; a hard flush filler sanded flush and repeated often, a membrane to bridge the cracks and hide it for a longer period of time, or surface replacement. I address all of these in the attached proposal. I recommend the hard crack treatment be done in May/June, so you can get a season out of it. Most of structural cracks reopen, after winter freeze/thaw cycles.

I attached a sight plan for 4 pickleball courts. Two tennis courts are a tight fit. All those games have to have a north/south direction of play, because of the sun. For a Budget to build 4 pickleball court, including the grading (1% slope west), stone installation, paving, color surface and complete chain link fence, ready to play

Discuss Conversion of Zounert Tennis Courts to Pickleball Courts; and Action Thereon

Director Hilvo is recommending that the tennis courts at Zeunert Park be converted into Pickleball courts. There is a definite need for these courts. Counting the tennis courts at the Cedarburg High School, Webster Middle School and the courts at Adlai Horn Park there are a total of 12 tennis courts available for public play and no Pickleball Courts. The nets at the Zeunert Park tennis courts have been adapted to be used for Pickleball and tennis.

Larry Rehbaum, N95 W6520 Fieldcrest, gave a brief history of Pickleball. The City offers indoor Pickleball at the Community Gym twice a week. During the winter months it is held on Sunday evenings and Thursday afternoons, during the summer it is held on Tuesday evenings and Thursday afternoons. The Senior Center also offers a class on Friday mornings year-round. He estimates that the program has had revenue of over \$2,000 since starting at \$3 per time. The City would be able to convert the two tennis courts at Zeunert Park into six Pickleball courts. The courts could be used for classes, tournaments and regular play.

Bob Loomis, W75 N729 Tower Avenue, stated it would be a tremendous asset to the City to convert the tennis courts. Even though he is a tennis player he has enjoyed playing Pickleball, which is the fastest growing sport for those over 50. There is a short learning curve compared to tennis. Also, there is no shortage of tennis courts in the City even if these two courts were converted.

Director Hilvo advised he placed \$60,000 in the 2014 budget for the resurfacing of the Zeunert Park and Adlai Horn Park tennis courts in 2014. The cost would be less if we converted the courts at Zeunert Park. Pickleball courts are 44 feet by 20 feet at a cost of about \$80 per court. Six courts could be constructed within the Zeunert tennis courts with a five-foot fence between each court.

Board Members Dieffenbach and Schara asked that this item be continued until the next meeting at which time additional information could be gathered and it would give tennis players time to respond to the possible conversion.

<u>Discuss 2014 Parks</u>, <u>Recreation & Forestry Preliminary Budget</u>; <u>and action thereon</u>
Director Hilvo reviewed the proposed 2014 Parks and Forestry and Recreation budgets. This is the first draft of the budget which will be submitted to the Common Council early in September.

Discuss 2014 Parks, Recreation & Forestry Capital Improvement Budget; and action thereon Director Hilvo reviewed the proposed 2014 Parks, Recreation and Forestry Capital Improvement Budget.

Discuss 2014 Celebrations Budget; and action thereon

Director Hilvo reviewed the proposed 2014 Celebrations Budget, which includes expenses for the 4th of July Celebration fireworks, watering of the flower baskets and set-up for Festivals and Summer Sounds.

Gonsider Painting Permanent Pickle Ball Court Lines on Zeunert Tennis Courts; and Action Thereon

Larry Rehbaum, N95 W6520 Fieldcrest, gave a brief history of Pickle Ball. Currently, there are three open sessions of Pickle Ball being played at the Community Center Gym during the year.

Director Hilvo advised in the winter there is Sunday evening from 6:30 – 8:30 p.m.; Thursday afternoons from 1:30 – 3:30 p.m. and Friday mornings from 9:30 – 11:00 a.m. Starting June 7 the times will be Tuesday evenings from 7:00 – 9:00 p.m.; Thursday afternoons from 1:00 – 3:00 p.m. and Friday mornings will stay the same. There is a charge of \$3 per time. Last summer tape was used to mark the tennis courts at Zeunert Park for Pickle Ball. It is time-consuming and had to be done more than once as the tape was removed by some unknown person or persons. Also, there is a possibility of utilizing the former Skate Park facility for Pickle Ball courts. Once the weather gets micer Director Hilvo will meet with some of the neighbors with several Pickle Ball players playing on the courts to see of the noise level bothers them. If not courts can be set-up on that location.

Motion made by John Lerand, seconded by Dave Polacek, to paint lines on the tennis courts at Zeunert Park for Pickle Ball. Motion carried without a negative vote with Council Member O'Keefe and James Schara not in attendance.

Discuss Plans for Playground Equipment Replacement at Cedar Creek Park; and Action Thereon

Director Hilvo advised that the wooden structure at Cedar Creek Park needs to be replaced. This item is not in the 2013 budget; however, if the Board can agree on a design for the structures staff would have something in place for any interested donors with the possibility of naming rights for the playground. The structures would be for 2 to 5 year olds and 5 to 12 year olds. The Board reviewed six different designs and recommended the two designs from Miller and Associates. The cost for the structure, installation and a poured in place surface would be about \$70,000.

Discuss Removal of Metal Slide at Cedar Creek Park; and Action Thereon

Director Hilvo stated that the City's Insurance Company, CVMIC, has several issues with the metal slide at Cedar Creek Park and has recommended several times that it be removed as it is a hazard and a liability. In 2011 a child fell off the slide and broke his arm. The City is on notice of the potential risk. With today's safety standards the slide really can't be sold as a piece of play equipment so he is recommending the slide be removed as scrap metal.

Motion made by Glen Herold, seconded by Dave Polacek, to recommend that staff remove the metal slide at Cedar Creek Park as soon as possible. Motion carried without a negative vote, with Council Member O'Keefe and James Schara not in attendance.

Discuss Shelter Design at Prairie View Park; and Action Thereon

Director Hilvo presented a proposal for the shelter at Prairie View Park. The proposed shelter is the same design as the one Zeunert Park. However, this building would include a concession area and restrooms. The total cost of the Gothic style shelter including a concrete pad, stainless steel plumbing and four ADA accessible restroom bays would be about \$200,000. The shelter and park

Motion made by Council Member O'Keefe, seconded by Dick Dieffenbach, to approve the minutes of the August 7, 2013 meeting. Motion carried without a negative vote, with Glenn Herold abstaining as he was not at the meeting and with John Lerand and Scott King not in attendance.

COMMENTS AND SUGGESTIONS FROM CITIZENS - None

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

Director Hilvo advised that since the August meeting he had publicly noticed the meeting regarding the conversion of the tennis courts to Pickleball courts in the News Graphic. He also contacted the Cedarburg School District and Dawn Seltrecht with Buildings and Grounds. Dawn advised that the School District courts are available for rent by the public and anyone wishing to use them need to contact her to arrange for a time. Currently there are a total of 16 tennis courts, 6 at the Cedarburg High School, 6 at Webster Middle School, two at Adlai Horn Park and two at Zeunert Park. In the proposed 2014 Budget there is \$60,000 for the conversion of the tennis courts at Zeunert Park into six Pickleball courts plus the resurfacing of the Adlai Horn courts. The cost to build brand new Pickleball courts would be \$130,000. So with the \$60,000 in the proposed budget for the resurfacing of Adlai Horn and the conversion of Zeunert Courts, being less than what it would cost to construct new courts, this would be the time to construct the Pickleball courts. There are restrooms at Zeunert Park and during the summer months a Port-A-John is at Adlai Horn Park at a cost of \$67 per month.

Pickleball has become a very popular and growing sport in Cedarburg and there are no outdoor courts in the area.

The meeting was then opened for public comments.

Maria Loomis, W75 N729 Tower Avenue, stated that she is a tennis player and a Pickleball player and has never had a problem getting on a court. Pickleball has become a family sport and they would enjoy being able to play anytime they wanted to, not just at the twice a week allotted time at the Community Gym.

Al Cesario, W74 N875 Poplar Avenue, stated he also plays both tennis and Pickleball. The senior tennis league plays at the Zeunert courts on Friday mornings and there are many times when they also have to utilize the Adlai Horn courts as they need all four courts. He feels that outdoor Pickleball courts are not needed as there is time allotted at the Community Gym for indoor play. He pointed out that in the 2010 Comprehensive Park and Open Space Master Plan there was no mention of needing Pickleball courts; however, it did mention that there was a deficiency of tennis courts. He has only seen adults playing Pickleball and not teens at the Community Gym. If the City needs to have outdoor Pickleball courts it should be addressed in the future Comprehensive Park and Open Space Master Plan and then new courts should be built, not just converting tennis courts. He also requested that the Pickleball markings on the Zeunert Courts be removed and the tennis courts raised back up to tennis height. If the City feels they need outdoor Pickleball courts they can be placed at the old skateboard park location.

Jason Loomis, W75 N729 Tower Avenue, stated that when he was in high school Pickleball was one of the classes offered as part of the physical education class, so kids are being exposed to the sport. Unfortunately, because of the times offered for indoor Pickleball kids aren't playing. When he gets a chance he looks forward to playing Pickleball on the outdoor courts.

Bob Loomis, W75 N729 Tower Avenue, stated as a tennis and Pickleball player he hasn't had difficulty in getting on a court to play either sport. During the school year it is difficult to get on the school courts having to work around physical education classes and tennis leagues. The City courts do need resurfacing. No one in the area has outdoor Pickleball courts and he feels that the City should provide separate courts. It is hard to play both tennis and Pickleball on the same courts as the lining and net heights are different. With having to lower and higher the nets you could go through 3 sets of nets in a summer. Pickleball is growing in popularity and outdoor courts would be a benefit to the City.

Sandy Schara, N41 W7401 West Pointe Court, stated that tennis can only be played outdoors in the summer; Pickleball can be played indoors all year round. Please do not get rid of the tennis courts.

Mary Chemotti, N94 W6539 Fieldcrest, stated that as a member of the Ozaukee County tennis league they usually have 12 to 16 players during the week and use both the Zeunert and Adlai Horn courts when then play during the day. It is fine to add Pickleball courts but not at the expense of the tennis players. The City needs to protect the assets they have.

use of the courts. With the 12 courts at the school district and the two courts then at Adlai Horn there would be 14 courts available for public play, if the two courts at Zeunert Park were converted to six Pickleball courts. As there are no outdoor Pickleball courts in the area this would be another offering for the public giving them something new to use. The Department hears that people have trouble getting on the tennis courts; however, groups are not renting or reserving the courts as they are supposed to.

Council Member O'Keefe opined that we would have enough tennis courts available in the area even if we were to convert the two courts at Zeunert Park.

Motion made by Council Member O'Keefe, seconded by Dave Polacek, to recommend to the Common Council that the two tennis courts at Zeunert Park be converted into six Pickleball courts. Motion carried with Council Member O'Keefe, Dave Polacek and Glenn Herold voting in favor and Dick Dieffenbach and James Schara voting against, with Scott King and John Lerand not in attendance.

Director of Parks and Recreation - Update on Projects

Director Hilvo reported that at the Wisconsin Parks and Recreation Association Fall Conference last week in Green Bay the Department along with the Recreation Departments from Grafton and Port Washington were awarded the Silver Star Award for the Polar Express activity.

Director Hilvo reported several other updates on department activities:

- Youth Basketball held their skills testing on Saturday, November 9. Teams are being drafted this week and practices start at the end of November. We have 91 children registered for the 4th and 5th grade coed league; 48 for the Boy's 6th, 7th, 8th grade league; and 37 in the Girl's 6th, 7th, 8th grade league.
 - He has been working on getting the Santa House erected in front of the Community Gym. The parking lot at Prairie View Park has been paved, utilities have been stumped in, water laterals installed and the grassy area has been leveled and seeded. All of this work was completed by the developer and contractor. With this work completed we are \$30,000 under budget for completion of the park. The Board will revisit plans for the Park in January.
- The Flag Football program ended on October 17.
- The Ice rink will be installed at Cedar Creek Park within the next week.
- The Polar Express will be held at the Community Gym on December 14 from 9:00 a.m. –
 1:00 p.m. Tickets go on sale November 18 at the Department office, and at the Grafton and Port Washington Recreation Departments along with Port Washington State Bank.
- Updated the Board on registration numbers for the fall and winter programs.

In early 2014 the Board will be discussing playground equipment for Wegmann Park and Cedar Greek Park.

In response to a question from John Derand, Council Member O'Keefe advised that the Common Council denied the conversion of the Zeunert Park tennis courts into Pickleball courts on a four-two vote. The Council wanted to wait and see if Pickleball became a popular sport and that in the future they would consider building Pickleball Courts.

Superintendent of Parks and Forestry - Update on Projects

Superintendent Westphal reported on the following Forestry projects:

- 158 stumps have been removed this year.
- 141 trees need to be replaced, including service requests and 11 sites that had never had a
- 152 trees needs to be planted in 2014, there are still 400 sites that have never had a tree; the Common Council restored \$20,000 for trees.
- Working on service request and storm damage tree pruning.
- Post construction pruning was completed along Madison.
- \$1,300 in repairs to trees damaged by the construction along Madison.
- Routine pruning starting in Willowbrooke Subdivision, 1,000 trees need to be pruned. In a

designated route for the day through the City. Director LaFontaine advised the Board that the Senior Center is in favor of repairing the tennis courts at Zeunert Park as they have a league that utilizes the courts on Friday mornings.

Consider Repairs to Zeunert Park Tennis Couris; and Action Thereon

Director Hilvo reported that when staff went to install the nets at the Zeunert Park tennis courts in spring they found the courts to be not playable due to extreme cracking of the surface. Quotes were received from Munson Fence in the amount of \$16,000 for a full repair or \$7,645 for just repairing the cracks. Munson stated the repairs should last about two to three years, however, the work is not warrantied due to the winter weather and the thawing and freezing of the ground. The courts were fully resurfaced in 2007. Once the work is completed it takes about a week for the Redi-crete to cure and then the courts could be reopened. The damage is too extensive for staff to attempt the repairs and it will need to be done by a contractor.

Council Member Radtke stated that he is in favor of repairing the courts at this time and that total replacement of the courts should be included as a future budget item. He noted that the courts at Adlai Horn are also cracking and should be included for replacement in the near future.

Several local tennis players spoke in favor of repairing the courts as tennis is a popular sport and with only the four courts at Adlai Horn and Zeunert Parks the courts are used heavily. The Cedarburg High School Courts are only available on a limited basis during the months of Mid-June to August 1. Also the Zeunert Courts are also being used by Pickle Ball players and that is becoming very popular.

Council Member Radtke referenced an article that had appeared in the *News Graphic* in which a Council Member suggested the courts be closed; this was based on a financial decision and not based on all the facts. He would like the Common Council to reconsider and find the money to repair the courts.

Director Hilvo advised that there was a savings of \$5,000 on the recent purchase of bleachers and that he received \$2,000 for the sale of the old bleachers. Therefore, he would have \$7,000 to use towards the repairs of Zeunert Park tennis courts.

Motion made by Susan Mongoven, seconded by James Schara, to repair the courts at Zeunert Park in the amount of \$7,645 and to recommend to the Common Council that they look at setting aside money for the eventual replacement of the courts at Adlai Horn and Zeunert Parks. Motion carried without a negative vote with Mike O'Keefe and Kristofor Hanson not in attendance.

Discuss Closing Skate Park at the Department of Public Works Garage Site; and Action Thereon

Director Hilvo reported that there have been several issues recently where neighbors have had to contact the Cedarburg Police at 2:00 a.m. due to excessive noise coming from the skate park. Also, some of the equipment is showing signs of wear and tear and either needs to be removed and/or replaced. There is a possibility of combining with Grafton and developing a joint Grafton/Cedarburg

CONSIDER CONVERSION OF THE ZEUNERT TENNIS COURTS TO PICKLEBALL COURTS

Parks, Recreation & Forestry Director Hilvo stated that the Department is looking to convert the Zeunert tennis courts from two tennis courts to six pickleball courts and resurface Zeunert as well as Adlai Horn tennis courts for \$60,000 from the capital budget in 2014. Pickleball is a growing sport with a large following in the community.

There are currently 14 school tennis courts and four City tennis courts available. There is a temporary pickleball court at the former skateboard park near the DPW garage. This surface is not ideal for playing pickleball because it is rough. They have also drawn temporary pickleball lines on the Zeunert courts to create four pickleball courts.

Director Hilvo met with the School District to discuss the tennis courts and learned that their courts are available to leagues on Monday – Sunday by reservation from mid-June to Labor Day and during the school year they can be reserved after school and on weekends.

(Council Member R. Reimer left the Council meeting from 8:07 p.m. - 8:12 p.m.)

Council Member Maher stated that the tennis courts are used heavily and it may be hard to convert the tennis players to pickleball.

Council Member O'Keefe asked how many people play indoor pickleball.

Larry Rehbaum, pickleball coordinator, stated that 16 - 18 people play on average on any given night when it is available indoors at the Community Gym.

Council Member Filter stated that the DPW garage will not be built for another two years and he suggested that those courts be used for pickleball until the new garage is built.

Council Member Radtke stated that he understood there is a rise in pickleball players; however, every household has a tennis racket and understands the game of tennis. Pickleball is not as popular and he does not want to destroy one asset to create another. The Zeunert tennis courts was the proposed site for the skateboard park when it was first introduced and failed to be built on the site.

In answer to Council Member Yip's questions, Director Hilvo stated that the dual set of lines makes it difficult to play either sport and the nets need to be lowered from 36 inches for tennis to 34 inches for pickleball when players use the tennis courts. This is accomplished by setting weight on the nets.

Alexi Loomis, W75 N729 Tower Avenue, stated that she plays tennis for Cardinal Stritch University and she has never had a problem finding a court to use in Cedarburg over the years. She began playing pickleball last year and finds that it is enjoyable and easier on her joints because you play on a smaller court. She stated that Zeunert Park is not used often and should be used for the upcoming sport of pickleball.

In answer to Council Member O'Keefe's question, Director Hilvo stated that it would cost approximately \$120,000 to create six brand new pickleball courts.

Recreation Supervisor Bultman stated that pickleball lines can be used for youth tennis.

Director Hilvo stated that new courts would allow more programming options.

Rita Bakalars, W73 N906 Poplar Avenue, expressed concern for the noise that is created while playing pickleball with a wooden paddle and a plastic ball. An internet search provided information and cases where people were suing over the extreme noise. She questioned the noise that six courts would create next to a rehabilitation center. Ms. Bakalars has played tennis for 50 years and is in favor of sharing the courts.

Larry Rehbaum, N95 W6520 Fieldcrest Street, stated that the Webster courts are beautiful courts to play on. Webster Transitional School does not have a current tennis program and are not used unless there is a tennis tournament at the school.

Mr. Rehbaum stated that pickleball began six years ago in the United States and Canada and people have been playing in Cedarburg for three years. It has also become popular in surrounding communities. Right now, Cedarburg offers indoor times on Sunday and Thursday evenings and Friday mornings for \$3 per person. It is a 12 minute game that has generated \$360 in a two week period for the Recreation Department and \$4,400 in fees for the year. There are national pickleball tournaments and it is played for the Senior Olympics. Mr. Rehbaum stated that converting the Zeunert tennis courts to pickleball courts would expand the program beyond the six hours a week that are offered indoors. Pickleball is being taught in the schools and is generating a lot of interest. The Zeunert location would be ideal for any noise that is created by the plastic ball and wooden paddle. Wind screens and trees could always be added as additional noise barriers. He stated that the City spends \$35,000 - \$50,000 on playground sets and that an investment in pickleball courts would be used by ages 8 - 90. Mr. Rehbaum invited the Common Council Members to try the sport.

In answer to Council Member O'Keefe's question, Mr. Rehbaum stated that there have not been any noise complaints from the former skate park courts. The courts are a benefit to Cedarburg.

Rex Bitner, W53 N598 Birch Street, stated that the indoor pickleball courts in the Gym are played on a clear wood floor surface and it would be nice to be able to play outside.

Al Cesario, W74 N875 Poplar Avenue, stated that he has been a resident of Cedarburg for 42 years and has played with a senior tennis group at Zeunert Park for 26 years. He went through this similar situation when the City wanted to build the skateboard park on the Zeunert tennis courts and he is asking the City to preserve these courts once again. The senior league requires four courts and they use both Adlai Horn Park and Zeunert Park courts. The School courts are not always available and parking is difficult. Mr. Cesario stated that the City's 2010 Master Plan does not consider the High School tennis courts because the City does not have any control over them. There has been community support to add an additional court in the City. He asked the City to keep the Zeunert Park tennis courts and to possibly include pickleball courts in the 2015 Master Plan for the City. He recommended that the City analyze the need for pickleball courts near the Department of Public Works garage and to base any decision on the Master Plan.

Jason Loomis, W75 N729 Tower Avenue, stated that he is 27 and has knee problems. He converted to pickleball from tennis because it is easier on his joints. He stated that it is not a loud sport. Jason

COMMON COUNCIL October 14, 2013

Loomis stated that he understands that the City does not want to lose one asset for another. He stated that the lines on pickleball courts can be used for youth tennis. Pickleball is less frustrating than tennis and youth pickleball leagues would make money for the City.

Jim Schara, N41 W7401 West Pointe Ct, stated that he was a Phy Ed teacher for 35 years and pickleball was never picked up as intermural sport. He stated that as a Park, Recreation and Forestry Board Member, he is in the minority for not wanting to take one asset for another. Mr. Schara stated that fads such as racquetball die out and you cannot make a pickleball court into a tennis court later.

Mary Chemotti, N94 W6539 Fieldcrest Street, stated that she has been a taxpayer and tennis player for 35 years. Her tennis group uses the Webster courts in the summer; however, they discourage use during the school year. The parking lot closest to the courts is used for a playground and is not open for parking and the service drive is blocked. She suggested that the City use a registration system for using the Zeunert courts for pickleball and tennis. She has never been able to reserve the courts at \$10.00/hour, per court, and she suggested revamping the system without a fee. Very few communities charge players to use Municipal courts. Ms. Chemotti has friends come from out of town to play tennis and they spend money when they come to Cedarburg. This is an important aspect to consider and she does not recommend taking this asset away. If the two sports need to coexist on the Zeunert courts she suggested that a medium paint color be used for the pickleball lines.

John Kuerschner, N30 W6078 Lincoln Blvd, advocated for the Zeunert courts to remain tennis courts. He gave four reasons for respectfully asking the Council to deny or take no action on this item tonight:

- 1. Solid factual data should be obtained regarding the frequency of use.
- 2. The tennis players should not feel like their program is being marginalized.
- 3. It would be sound public policy to schedule a noticed public hearing on this matter.
- 4. The sound factor seems to be an issue.

Mr. Kuerschner recommended that this be sent back to the Parks, Recreation and Forestry Board to quantify the use of the courts.

Larry Rehbaum, N95 W6520 Fieldcrest Street, stated that he plays pickleball on the Zeunert courts because there is an elevation problem on the temporary courts near the DPW garage. Those courts are best used by beginners.

Director Hilvo stated that he favors both programs and he suggested this option to use the Zeunert courts for pickleball as a savings to the taxpayers. He would much rather build new courts for pickleball.

In answer to Council Member O'Keefe's question, Director Hilvo stated that pickleball courts could be constructed in front of the Zeunert tennis courts.

Council Member Radtke stated that it makes no financial sense to tear down a well-used asset to make another.

Council Member Filter asked if it was feasible to improve the temporary courts at the DPW garage for two years and monitor the play during that time period.

Council Member O'Keefe stated that he was in favor of converting the Zeunert tennis courts(2) to pickleball courts(6).

Motion made by Council Member O'Keefe to convert the Zeunert tennis courts to pickleball courts. Motion was seconded by Council Member R. Reimer.

Council Member Yip suggested that the City monitor the use of the temporary pickleball courts. There have been other trends such as rocking climbing and racquetball that were short lived activities. He suggested that the players continue sharing the Zeunert courts and to talk to the schools to make some pickleball courts available. He would be open to building pickleball courts in the future if the trend remains strong. Council Member Yip also asked if there was an indoor facility available, possibly at the fairgrounds, for year-round indoor play.

Motion failed with Council Members Filter, Maher, Yip and Radtke opposed, Council Members R. Reimer and O'Keefe in favor, and Council Member C. Reimer excused.

Motion made by Council Member Filter, seconded by Council Member Radtke, to upgrade the DPW courts. Motion carried without a negative vote with Council Member C. Reimer excused.

The Common Council took a break from 9:10 p.m. – 9:17 p.m.

CONSIDER PROPOSED 2014 BUDGET; DEPARTMENT PRESENTATIONS, DISCUSSION; AND DIRECTION THEREON

Overview of the Proposed 2014 Budget & Tax Levy

City Administrator/Treasurer Mertes highlighted the major changes in the proposed fiscal year 2014 budget for the City of Cedarburg.

- New format and changes to content.
- Because the City has kept the tax rate down for the last five years or more, reserve accounts
 are not sufficient to fund the 2014-2016 projects. Borrowings are being proposed to cover
 these costs.
- There is a proposed salary increase of 2% across the board for all employees except for the Police Officers. The officer's increase is 3.5%, with a 2% increase into their retirement for a total of 5.9% payroll deduction. The remaining employees will see an increase of .035% in their retirement payroll deduction. The lowest health insurance premium to-date is included in the budget.
- The health savings account contribution was eliminated for 2014 and the deductibles will increase from \$1,500/\$3,000 to \$2,000/\$4,000.
- The City's growth in assessed value for 2013 would allow for a levy increase of \$121,401. The amount of changes from the 2013 budget to the 2014 budget is \$526,829; thereby, the reason for the tax rate increase currently being proposed in this draft of the budget.
- There is also an unfunded list and for every \$11,829 added to the budget, it will increase the tax rate .01/\$1,000 of assessed value.

Oct. 3, 2007 – CSB (Jeff Gylland) requests permission to add practice diamond behind tennis courts. (Used for infield practice only). Approved by 3-1 vote.

Apr 7, 2010 – Cedarburg Youth Baseball, CYB (Tom Grimm) request putting up outfield fence at Adlai Horn. Club will pay for installation & removal of fence. Approved without negative vote.

Other "Private" Organizations

Girls Softball (Formerly Maxwell's, now Crush)

Dec. 7, 2011 – City rec. will no longer offer girls softball because Maxwells partners with Town of Cedarburg to offer Girls fastpitch.

July 10, 2013 – P&R approves forming agreement with Maxwells Softball to form a continuing partnership to have them use Willowbrook Park. They would maintain field and make financial contributions to make improvements to field and facilities. Approved without negative vote.

Mar. 5, 2015 – Discussed field fees. Cost of field prep depends on size. Softball group and adult Mercs prep own fields. Terry Wagner suggested city should tier rates for City and non-City use. No action taken.

Mar. 5, 2014 – Gedarburg Girls Fastpitch club (Terry Wagner) seeks to make improvements to Willowbrook, replace side fences and open dugouts. Request temporary outfield fence. 5-year lease for \$1 per year. P&R board recommends unanimously to enter into lease with Cedarburg Girls Fastpitch.

Apr. 2, 2014- Common Council approves naming rights for Grant Schoen field and approves \$1/yr. lease for Willowbrook Park with Cedarburg Girls Fastpitch.

Praire View

Oct. 11, 2006 – Common Council approves plat approval 10/9. Towne Realty agrees to 5 acre park, 2.67 acres as parkland in lieu of fees. Park amenities should include shelter, parking lot, play structure leaving rest open for Flag Football. P&R board recommends question if baseball should be included in plans.

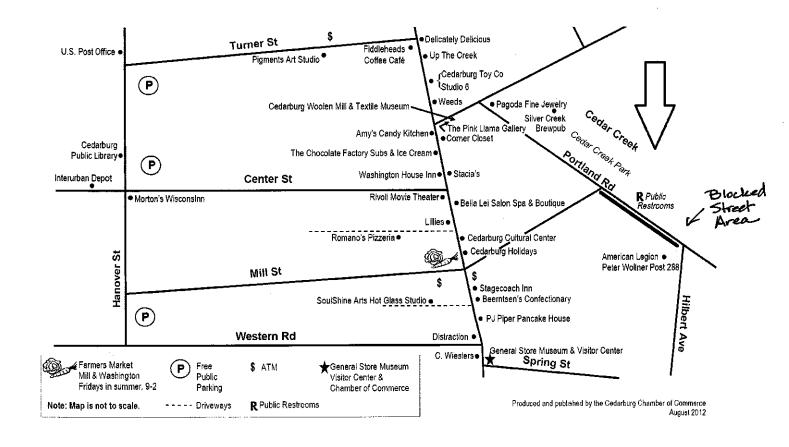

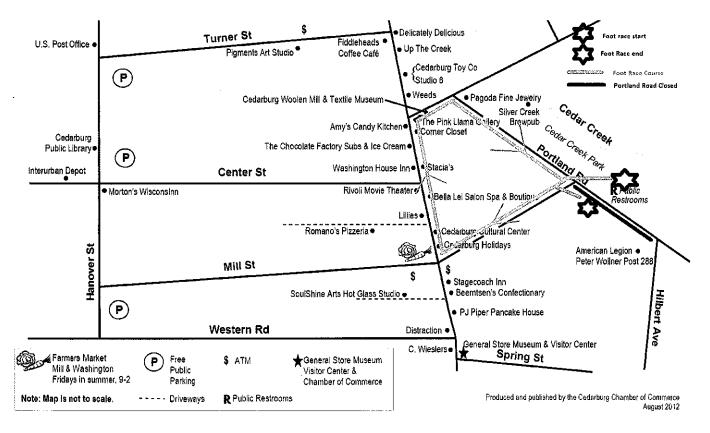

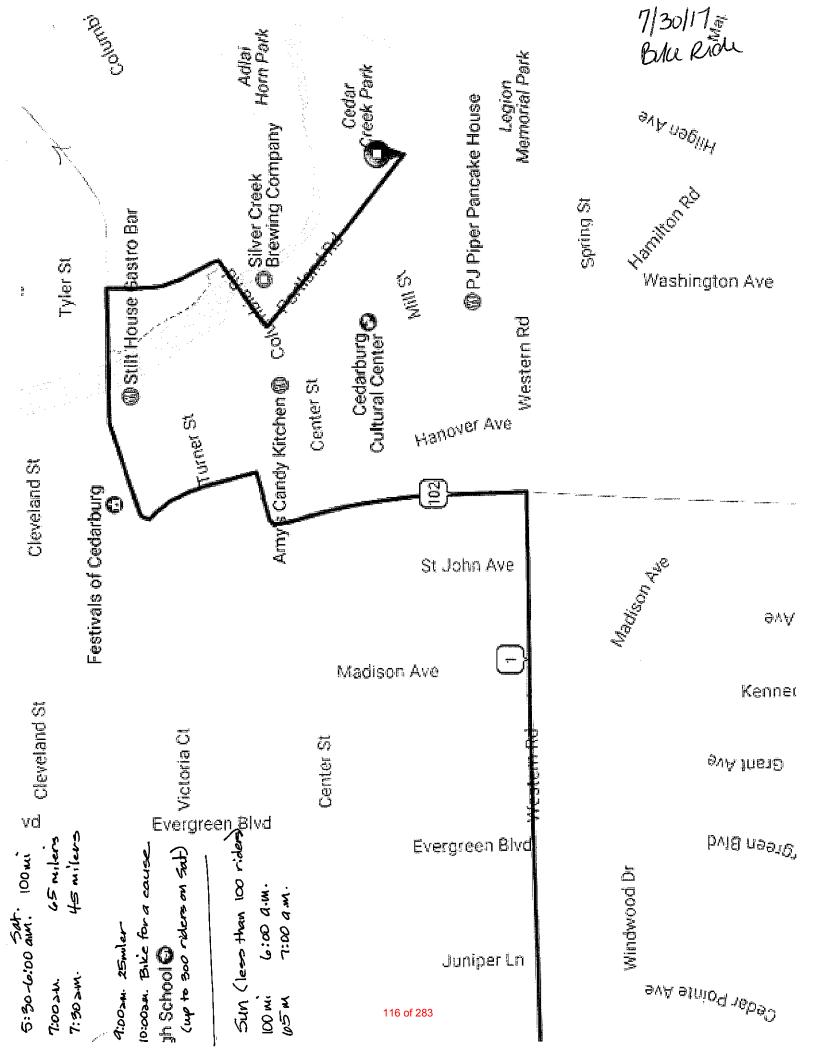

ISSUE SUMMARY: The owners The Shinery are seeking permission to alter their "Class A" liquor license premise description to be able to sell their products outside on the patio connected to the building they are located in at Strawberry Fest and Wine and Harvest Festival. Specifically, they would like to sell moonshine cocktails in half gallon jugs.

The Shinery does not have the type of license that allows them to do this. The business has a "Class A" liquor license. According to State Statutes Sec. 125.51(2) "Class A" licenses may sell intoxicating liquor to consumers only in original packages or containers for off-premises consumption. "Class A" licensees may also provide persons of legal drinking age no more than one taste sample not exceeding 0.5 fluid ounces of intoxicating liquor other than wine for consumption on premises between the hours of 11 a.m. and 7 p.m. A call to Tom Ourada of the Department of Revenue confirms this. The Shinery is not allowed to sell cocktails; anything they sell must be in original packages or containers for off-premise consumption, with the exception of limited sampling.

After being informed of this, the owners of The Shinery have amended their request to sell wine and other products that are typically sold in the store on the second floor on the attached deck on the lower level of the building for off-premise consumption, and to do sampling of wine as permitted by State Statutes (two free samples of wine per person of not more than three fluid ounces each, for consumption on the premises between the hours of 11:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.)

ISSUE SUMMARY: As part of our NR216 storm water permit, the DNR requires an on-going Illicit Discharge Detection program to test for storm water pollutants in various outfalls. The program involves dry weather flow sampling and lab testing to search for specific pollutants. If the test readings come back positive, a follow-up investigation to determine the source is required.

In previous years AECOM has provided this service for the City, and they have also compiled the required comprehensive annual report. At the request of the Common Council, I have obtained a second proposal this year from Ruekert and Mielke.

Ruekert and Mielke's price was \$7,225 and AECOM was at \$8,425. However, when I inquired about the required storm sewer mapping and exhibits, Ruekert and Mielke advised this would add another \$3,000 to their proposal.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION: Based on the total cost to complete the reports required by DNR, staff is recommending we award the contract to AECOM for \$8425.

BUDGETARY IMPACT: \$40,000 is budgeted for NR216 Storm Water Compliance. Part of that will be used to fund the 50% matching share of the DNR storm water modelling grant.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide services to perform illicit discharge inspections, preparation of the City's Annual NR 216 Compliance Report, and support of the storm water permit re-application for the City of Cedarburg.

The City of Cedarburg is currently regulated under a Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (WDNR) Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4) permit which covers all storm water discharges within the City. The City is also located within the Milwaukee River watershed, meaning it is to be regulated by the pollutant allocations derived from the impending Milwaukee River Basin Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDL).

Ruekert & Mielke, Inc. (R/M) is actively involved in the Mid Moraine Water Quality Collective (MMWQC). We have intimate knowledge on the potential re-application for a group MS4 permit. This knowledge would be of great benefit to the City of Cedarburg moving forward. We feel there are significant synergies to be realized by the City working with one consultant for its MS4 work and the MMWQC.

We understand the storm sewer illicit discharge inspections and NR 216 Compliance Report project to consist of the following scope of services:

Illicit Discharge Outfall Inspection Where No Flow is Present

- Inspect each outfall as requested by the City during dry weather conditions (no precipitation within a 72-hour period prior to the inspection).
- Measure the outfall size.
- Complete the field screening report based on visual observation at the end of the pipe.

Illicit Discharge Outfall Inspection Where Flow is Present

- Inspect each outfall as requested by the City during dry weather conditions (no precipitation within a 72-hour period prior to the inspection).

- Gather a 250 milliliter grab sample of the discharge in a polyethylene bottle.

• If a test parameter is detected above WDNR's action levels, a desktop review and analysis of the storm sewer system map will be completed to identify potential sources of the illicit discharge. A brief narrative report will be completed identifying the illicit discharge occurrence and possible causes.

Illicit Discharge Outfall Inspection Summary Report

- Prepare a summary report at the completion of the testing program.
- The report will include a written summary of the testing program for the four (4) identified outfalls, an exhibit documenting the location of the completed inspections, full color printouts of each inspection form and graphs for each outfall to summarize the test results.
- Provide five bound copies and one digital copy of the report to the City.

Preparation of the Annual NR 216 Compliance Report

• Prepare the Annual NR 216 Compliance Report on behalf of the City for submission to the WDNR. The report will be predicated on City-provided data and information and shall be updated to account for changes to the MS4 program in 2017. It is anticipated that all maps, attachments, previously completed reports, and programs and procedures will be provided by the City. If additional maps, attachments, reports, and programs and procedures, and updates to the programs and procedures are desired for the NR 216 Compliance Report, this additional work will be completed at our standard hourly rates. It is recommended that one or two of the programs and procedures be evaluated annually to ensure continuous compliance with the MS4 permit.

WPDES MS4 Permit Re-Application Support

 Provide technical assistance to the City of Cedarburg to support the re-application of their WPDES MS4 permit. The level of effort for the re-application of the permit is undefined, therefore, this effort will be completed on an allowance basis using our standard hourly rates at the direction of the City.

The City has requested that a total of four (4) outfalls be inspected this year. We propose to complete each outfall inspection where no flow is present for a lump sum cost of \$150 per outfall, and each outfall inspection where flow is present for a lump sum cost of \$325 per outfall. Due to the unknown of flow being present at the time of inspection, we feel that this method is fair to both the City and Ruekert & Mielke, Inc. If a follow-up investigation is necessary based upon a discovery of an illicit discharge a brief narrative report will be completed as an hourly time and material with a not to exceed amount of \$900.

We propose to complete the Illicit Discharge Inspection summary report as an hourly time and material with a not-to-exceed amount of \$1,200 and to prepare the Annual NR 216 Compliance Report as an hourly time and material with a not-to-exceed amount of \$3,000.

We also propose to provide technical assistance to the City of Cedarburg to support the re-application of their WPDES MS4 permit based on a \$1,000 allowance basis using our standard hourly rates at the direction of the City.

This scope of work does not include agency or resident coordination, preparation of additional reports or figures, hazardous waste coordination, hazardous sample disposal, or updating or evaluating the City's MS4 programs or procedures. If desired, these services may be performed at our standard hourly rates. This scope of work is also predicated on the City



obtaining appropriate access for Ruekert & Mielke, Inc. field personnel to all discharge locations.

A. Standards of Performance

The standard of care for all professional engineering and related services performed or furnished by Engineer under this Agreement will be the care and skill ordinarily used by members of the subject profession practicing under similar circumstances at the same time and in the same locality. Engineer makes no warranties, express or implied, under this Agreement or otherwise, in connection with any services performed or furnished by Engineer.

B. Authorized Representative

With the execution of this Agreement, Engineer and Owner shall designate specific individuals to act as Engineer's and Owner's representatives with respect to the services to be performed or furnished by Engineer and duties and responsibilities of Owner under this Agreement. Such individuals shall have authority to transmit instructions, receive information, and render decisions relative to the Assignment on behalf of the respective party whom the individual represents.

C. Payments to Engineer

Invoices will be prepared in accordance with Engineer's standard invoicing practices and will be submitted to Owner by Engineer monthly, unless otherwise agreed. Invoices are due and payable within 30 days of receipt. If Owner fails to make any payment due Engineer for services and expenses within 30 days after receipt of Engineer's invoice therefore, the amounts due Engineer will be increased at the rate of 1.0% per month (or the maximum rate of interest permitted by law, if less) from said thirtieth day. In addition, Engineer may, after giving seven days written notice to Owner, suspend services under this Agreement until Engineer has been paid in full all amounts due for services, expenses, and other related charges.

D. Ownership and Reuse of Documents

All documents prepared or furnished by Engineer pursuant to this Agreement are instruments of service, and Engineer shall retain an ownership and property interest therein (including the copyright and the right of reuse at the discretion of the Engineer) whether or not the Project is completed. Engineer grants Owner a limited license to use the documents on the Project, extensions of the Project, and for related uses of the Owner, subject to receipt by Engineer of full payment due and owing for all services relating to preparation of the documents. Such limited license shall not create any rights in third parties. Reuse of any documents pertaining to this Agreement by Owner shall be at Owner's sole risk; and Owner agrees to indemnify, defend, and hold Engineer harmless from all claims, damages, and expenses including reasonable attorney's fees arising out of such reuse of documents by Owner or by others acting through Owner.

E. Construction Review

Engineer will observe the work as agreed to for general compliance with the construction documents. Engineer shall not at any time supervise, direct, control, or have authority over any contractor's work, nor shall Engineer have authority over or be responsible for the means, methods, techniques, sequences, or procedures of construction selected or used by any contractor, or the safety precautions and programs incident thereto, for security or safety at the Project site, nor for any failure of a contractor to comply with Laws and Regulations applicable to that contractor's furnishing and performing of its work. Engineer shall not be responsible for the acts or omissions of any contractor. Engineer has no stop work authority.

F. Environmental

Engineer assumes no liability for the detection or removal of any hazardous substances found at or adjacent to the Project site.

G. Owner Provided Information

Engineer shall have the right to rely on the accuracy of any information provided by Owner. Engineer will not review this information for accuracy.

H. Permits and Approvals

It is the responsibility of the Owner to obtain all necessary permits and approvals for the Project. Engineer will assist the Owner in obtaining permits and approvals as mutually agreed to in writing.

I. Access

Owner shall arrange for safe access to and make all provisions for Engineer and Engineer's consultants to enter upon public and private property as required for Engineer to perform services under this Agreement.

J. Limit of Liability

To the fullest extent permitted by law, the total liability, in the aggregate, of Engineer and Engineer's officers, directors, partners, employees, agents, and consultants, or any of them to Owner and anyone claiming by, through, or under Owner, for any and all injuries, losses, damages and expenses, whatsoever arising out of, resulting from, or in any way related to this Agreement from any cause or causes including but not limited to the negligence, professional errors or omissions, strict liability or breach of contract or warranty, express or implied, of Engineer or Engineer's officers, directors, partners, employees, agents, and consultants, or any of them, shall not exceed the total amount of \$2,000,000.

K. Insurance

Engineer will maintain insurance coverage for Workers' Compensation, General Liability, and Automobile Liability and will provide certificates of insurance to Owner upon request.

L. Termination of Contract

Either party may at any time terminate this Agreement with 7 days written notice for cause in the event of substantial failure by the other party to perform in accordance with the terms hereof through no fault of the terminating party. Owner may terminate this Agreement for convenience with 30 days written notice, or the Project may be suspended by Owner with 30 days written notice. In the event of suspension or cancellation for convenience by Owner, Owner shall pay to Engineer all amounts owing to Engineer under this Agreement, for all work performed up to the effective date of notice.

M. Indemnification and Allocation of Risk

- 1. To the fullest extent permitted by law, Engineer shall indemnify and hold harmless Owner, Owner's officers, directors, partners, and employees from and against costs, losses, and damages (including but not limited to reasonable fees and charges of engineers, architects, attorneys, and other professionals, and reasonable court or arbitration or other dispute resolution costs) caused solely by the negligent acts or omissions of Engineer's officers, directors, partners, employees, and consultants in the performance of Engineer's services under this Agreement.
- 2. To the fullest extent permitted by law, Owner shall indemnify and hold harmless Engineer, Engineer's officers, directors, partners, employees, and consultants from and against costs, losses, and damages (including but not limited to reasonable fees and charges of engineers, architects, attorneys, and other professionals, and reasonable court or arbitration or other dispute resolution costs) caused solely by the negligent acts or omissions of Owner or Owner's officers, directors, partners, employees, and consultants with respect to this Agreement.
- 3. To the fullest extent permitted by law, Engineer's total liability to Owner and anyone claiming by, through, or under Owner for any injuries, losses, damages and expenses caused in part by the negligence of Engineer and in part by the negligence of Owner or any other negligent entity or individual, shall not exceed the percentage share that Engineer's negligence bears to the total negligence of Owner, Engineer, and all other negligent entities and individuals.
- 4. The indeminification provision of paragraph M.1. is subject to and limited by the provisions agreed to by Owner and Engineer in paragraph J. "Limit of Liability," of this Agreement.

N. Independent Contractor

All duties and responsibilities undertaken pursuant to this Agreement will be for the sole and exclusive benefit of Owner and Engineer and not for the benefit of any other party. Nothing contained in this Agreement shall create a contractual relationship with or a cause of action in favor of a third party against either Owner or the Engineer. Engineer's services under this Agreement are being performed solely for the Owner's benefit, and no other entity shall have any claim against Engineer because of this Agreement or the performance or nonperformance of services hereunder. Owner agrees to include a provision in all contracts with contractors and other entities involved in this Project to carry out the intent of this paragraph.

O. Force Majure

Engineer shall not be liable for any loss or damage due to failure or delay in rendering any service called for under this Agreement resulting from any cause beyond Engineer's reasonable control.

P. Severability and Waiver of Provisions

Any provision or part of the Agreement held to be void or unenforceable under any Laws or Regulations shall be deemed stricken, and all remaining provisions shall continue to be valid and binding upon Owner and Engineer, who agree that the Agreement shall be reformed to replace such stricken provision or part thereof with a valid and enforceable provision that comes as close as possible to expressing the intention of the stricken provision. Non-enforcement of any provision by either party shall not constitute a waiver of that provision, nor shall it affect the enforceability of that provision or of the remainder of this Agreement.

Q Dispute Resolution

Owner and Engineer agree that they shall first submit any and all unsettled claims, counterclaims, disputes, and other matters in questions between them arising out or relating to this Agreement or the breach thereof ("disputes") to mediation as a condition precedent to litigation.

R. Public Records

Engineer agrees to comply with the requirements of Wisconsin Statutes Sections 19.32 to 19.39 and Sections 19.81 to 19.98 – Wisconsin Public Records Law and Open Meetings Law.

Tom,

If we use the GIS with annotations for the MS4 map in the annual report, we feel we could lose a significant amount of accuracy. There is also the possibility that some data may be lost from previous annual reports.

You should be able to request the digital map with the background data from AECOM. The data would be the basin boundaries, outfalls, permitted facilities, ponds, etc. This is your data. We suspect R/M gave them the storm sewer information originally for them to make this map as it relates closely to what is currently in your GIS. After we get this information, it would be an additional \$3,000 worth of R/M effort to create a new exhibit. However, as part of this, these layers would then be available on your GIS system. You could eventually start recording information and inspection data on outfalls, ponds, and other features of your GIS using a tablet. Future updates to the MS4 map would be linked to your GIS, making updates very easy.

When you request this information from AECOM, you could say it is for your GIS system.

Please let me know if you have any other questions.

Scope of Services 2017 NR 216 Storm Water Discharge Permit Compliance Assistance City of Cedarburg May 23, 2017

Project Background

The City of Cedarburg operates its municipal separate storm sewer system (MS4) under a WPDES municipal storm water discharge permit from the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (WDNR), often referred to as a NR 216 Permit. This permit allows discharges of storm water from all portions of the City of Cedarburg's MS4.

The following items are included in this scope of services:

- 1) Annual Illicit Discharge Detection and Elimination (IDDE) Screening Program
- 2) IDDE Follow-up Investigations
- 3) Annual WDNR Report for 2017 Activities

1.0 Annual Illicit Discharge Detection and Elimination (IDDE) Screening Program

The City of Cedarburg's NR 216 Storm Water Discharge Permit requires the City to identify and remove illicit discharges and improper disposal of wastes into the municipal separate storm sewer system. Sampling will be conducted at each identified outfall. If flow is present in sufficient quantities to sample, chemical testing will be conducted. If elevated chemical results are present, follow-up investigations will take place.

1.1 Annual Field Screening

- 1.1.1 Conduct field screening at each of the three ongoing first priority major outfalls as identified in the Recommendations Section 4.0 of the 2016 IDDE Program report (Outfalls 1, 2, and 5).
- 1.1.2 Conduct field screening of one additional (minor) outfall, based on a requirement of the permit to identify and screen outfalls other than those identified as major outfalls based on a probability to contain potential illicit discharges.

For the annual field screening tasks, where flow is observed in sufficient quantity to sample, provide additional information on the Visual Inspection Form including field analysis chemical testing on grab samples using portable test kits. Chemical test parameters include Ammonia, Detergents (Surfactants), Fluoride, and Potassium. Outfalls that are active and exceed the Follow-up levels noted in Table B (see page 2-4) of the 2016 IDDE Report will require follow-up Investigations as explained under task 2.0. This effort estimates initial field screening of up to 4 total outfalls, with up to 3 expected to be active and require chemical sampling.



1.2 Report/Meetings

Meet with, or otherwise communicate with, the City once to review the results of the field screening. Outfalls where flow was observed and chemical testing indicates potential discharges and required follow-up investigation will be focused on. Results will be summarized in a format acceptable for inclusion in the City's annual NR 216 report. No follow-up efforts to identify potential illicit discharges/connections are included in this proposal beyond what is outlined in Task 2.0.

2.0 IDDE Follow-up Investigations

The goal of this effort is to be prepared to conduct follow-up investigations on a rapid basis for outfalls that, based on past screening and following the 2017 screening effort identified in Task 1.0, indicate the potential for containing illicit discharges by following a standard set of procedures in an attempt to isolate the source(s) of the pollutant(s) of interest. It is assumed that Outfall 1 will be screened at least two times upstream in the system, even if the outfall is not active, because of past experience with a suspect area of the system near Garfield Street and Lincoln Boulevard. It is further assumed that no confined space entry will be required for any field screening.

If necessary, City staff will be contacted during field investigations, in particular if an active/suspected illicit discharge is discovered, in an attempt to conduct timely follow-up investigations on private property or to obtain concurrence on follow-up actions.

2.1 Field Screening for Pollutant(s) of Interest

If an outfall tests positive for one or more parameters exceeding the Follow-up Levels and approach in Table B on Page 2-4 of the 2016 IDDE Report, the AECOM field crew will conduct follow-up investigations. The field crew will test locations throughout the drainage system associated with the subject outfall(s) following the development of a drainage system review (detailed look at each tributary subbasin and junction points to field screen) that will be conducted prior to field work implementation and based on past efforts and existing city sewer system mapping. For the purposes of this scope of services, it is estimated that up to six (6) total locations may require additional field screening. The goal is to isolate the pollutant(s) of interest to a single location and move on to subsequent steps, if possible. If the pollutant(s) of interest appears to be from a diffuse source, test data results will be reviewed for patterning prior to taking any additional steps.

2.2 "Windshield Survey"

For a drainage system associated with a follow-up investigation where field screening for parameters of interest resulted in isolating the parameters to a single pipe or ditch segment or general area, the field crew will conduct a "windshield survey" of the surrounding area. The survey includes photographing the surrounding area including buildings and other items of interest.

Other items of interest in the survey may include, but are not limited to, outdoor storage areas, staining, or other potential signs of illicit discharges or dumping. Catch basins and inlets in the area will be visually inspected and may also be chemically screened if standing or flowing water is present. No internal entry of any home or business is included in this effort and field staff will remain on public property unless authorized by the City or owner.



The results of the survey will be shared with City staff at a meeting for discussion of potential sources and recommended next steps. Discussion with building owners and review of building plans, if applicable, may result. For the purposes of estimating the level of effort for this task, it is assumed that a single windshield survey will be conducted for this project.

3.0 Annual WDNR Report for 2017 Activities

The City of Cedarburg NR 216 Storm Water Discharge Permit requires the City to submit an annual report by March 31, 2018 to provide the WDNR information on the progress towards implementation of the City's storm water management program and compliance with the City's permit.

AECOM will review and update the items required in the City's annual report and submit a draft to the City for review and input of required reporting metrics and programs.

The process for supporting the City with the annual report will follow that of recent years. Based on the draft report and comments obtained from the City, AECOM will complete the final report and it will be submitted to the municipality and the WDNR on or before March 31, 2018.

4.0 Storm Water Permit Re-application Support

The City of Cedarburg's NR 216 Storm Water Discharge Permit expires June 11, 2018. The permit requires the City to submit a re-application 180 days prior to the expiration date of the current permit (December 13, 2017). AECOM will assist the city with the re-application if requested by the city and has established a \$1,000 contingency for this support.

Schedule

AECOM will begin the project upon receiving a signed agreement and notice to proceed. Screening project elements require dry weather and cannot be conducted until approximately 72 hours without precipitation. Field work must be completed in FY 2017 and the entire scope of services, including reporting will be completed prior to March 31, 2018.

CITY OF CEDARBURG FUND BALANCE POLICY

SUBJECT: FUND BALANCE POLICY FC-10

General:

The GOVERNMENT of The City of Cedarburg, organized the accounting systems on a "fund" basis. A fund is a separate set of accounting records, segregated for purposes of carrying on an activity. A fund is established for accountability purposes to demonstrate that financial resources are being used only for permitted purposes. A fund will have "balance sheet" accounts consisting of "assets", "liabilities" and "fund balance," and a series of "revenue" and "expenditure" accounts. A "fund balance" is created or increased when fund expenditures exceed fund revenues. The balance sheet accounts identify the assets that belong to a fund, such as cash or a grant payment receivable; and what liabilities it owes, such as accounts payable to a supplier. The difference between the fund's assets and liabilities equals the "fund balance." A positive fund balance represents a financial resource available to finance expenditures of a following fiscal period.

Procedure:

The GOVERNMENT of The City of Cedarburg has 5 different fund balance classifications as outline in GASB Statement 54 as follows:

- 1. Nonspendable Fund Balance: The nonspendable fund balance classification includes amounts that cannot be spent because they are either (a) not in spendable form or (b) legally or contractually required to be maintained intact. The "not in spendable form" criterion includes items that are not expected to be converted to cash, for example, inventories and prepaid amounts. It also includes the long-term amount of loans and notes receivable, as well as property acquired for resale. However, if the use of the proceeds from the collection of those receivables or from the sale of those properties is restricted, committed, or assigned, then they should be included in the appropriate fund balance classifications (restricted, committed, or assigned), rather than nonspendable fund balance.
- **Restricted Fund Balance**: The restricted fund balance classifications should be reported as restricted when constraints placed on the use of resources are either:
 - Externally imposed by creditors (such as through debt covenants), grantors, contributors, or laws or regulations of other governments; or
 - b. Imposed by law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation. *Enabling legislation*, as the term is used in this Statement, authorizes the government to assess, levy, charge, or otherwise mandate payment of resources (from external resource providers) and includes a legally enforceable requirement that

those resources be used only for the specific purposes stipulated in the legislation. Legal enforceability means that a government can be compelled by an external party- such as citizens, public interest groups, or the judiciary- to use resources created by enabling legislation only for the purposes specified by the legislation.

3. Committed Fund Balance: The committed fund balance classification are amounts that can only be used for specific purposes pursuant to constraints imposed by formal action of the Common Council to be reported as committed fund balance. Those committed amounts cannot be used for any other purpose unless the City removes or changes the specified use by taking the same type of action it employed to previously commit those amounts. Committed fund balance also should incorporate contractual obligations to the extent that existing resources in the fund have been specifically committed for use in satisfying those contractual requirements.

In contrast to fund balance that is restricted by enabling legislation amounts in the committed fund balance, classification may be redeployed for other purposes with appropriate due process. Constraints imposed on the use of committed amounts are imposed by the government, separate from the authorization to raise the underlying revenue. Therefore, compliance with constraints imposed by the City that commit amounts to specific purposes is not considered to be legally enforceable.

The formal action of the Common Council that commits fund balance to a specific purpose should occur prior to the end of the reporting period, but the amount, if any, which will be subject to the constraint, may be determined in the subsequent period.

Committed fund balances include Capital Improvement Fund and Special Revenue Funds – Cemetery, Room Tax, Recreation Programs, Swimming Pool, Library and Rescue/EMS.

Assigned Fund Balance: The assigned fund balance classification are amounts that are constrained by the City's intent to be used for specific purposes, but are neither restricted nor committed, should be reported as assigned fund balance, except for stabilization arrangements. Intent should be expressed by (a) the Common Council or (b) The Administrator/Treasurer.

Assigned fund balance includes (a) all remaining amounts (except for negative balances) that are reported in governmental funds, other than the general fund, that are not classified as nonspendable and are neither restricted nor committed and (b) amounts in the general fund that are intended to be used for a specific purpose. By reporting particular amounts that are not restricted or committed in a special revenue, capital projects, debt service, or permanent fund, the City has assigned those

amounts to the purposes of the respective funds. Assignment within the general fund conveys that the intended use of those amounts is for a specific purpose that is narrower than the general purposes of the City itself.

An appropriation of existing fund balance to eliminate a projected budgetary deficit in the subsequent year's budget in an amount no greater than the projected excess of expected expenditures over expected revenues satisfies the criteria to be classified as an assignment of fund balance. Assignments should not cause a deficit in unassigned fund balance to occur.

5. <u>Unassigned Fund Balance</u>: The unassigned fund balance classification is the residual classification for the general fund. The classification represents fund balance that has not been assigned to other funds and that has not been restricted, committed, or assigned to specific purposes within the general fund. The general fund should be the only fund that reports a positive unassigned fund balance amount. In other governmental funds, if expenditures incurred for specific purposes exceeded the amounts restricted, committed, or assigned to those purposes, it may be necessary to report a negative unassigned fund balance.

CITY OF CEDARBURG POLICY/PROCEDURE MANUAL

SUBJECT: CONTACTING THE CITY ATTORNEY

General:

This policy details the procedures to be followed when it is necessary for the Mayor, Council, and Department Heads to contact the Municipal Attorney/Municipal Attorney's Office. It is in the best interest of the City to control the number of contacts and questions posed to the Municipal Attorney as his/her Office is paid on an hourly basis.

Procedures:

The City Administrator shall supervise the use of and monitor the costs of the City Attorney in order to control costs and avoid duplication while receiving necessary services.

The following steps shall be taken to research questions raised before the Municipal Attorney or his/her Office is contacted:

- Council Members and Department Heads seeking guidance, advice, or opinions from the Municipal Attorney shall first contact the City Administrator or Department Head for answers or background information and determine if the matter has already been addressed.
- 2. In the event the Department Head cannot answer a question, the Department Head shall consult with the City Administrator.
- 3. If the City Administrator cannot properly respond to the question and deems it requires additional interpretation or professional advice, the City Administrator or the Mayor may contact the City Attorney or authorize the Council Member or Department Head to do the same. The City Administrator or authorized Elected Official or Department Head may ask that the answer or advice be conveyed in writing. Staff, other than the City Administrator or Department Heads shall not contact the Municipal Attorney, without the prior approval of the Mayor or the City Administrator. Prior authorization is not required when employees of the Police Department contact the Municipal Attorney's office for court related or prosecution matters. Members of City Boards, Committees, Commissions shall not contact the Municipal Attorney, without the prior approval of the Mayor or the City Administrator.
- 4. The Office of the City Attorney represents the City, not the individual.
- Private Citizens shall not contact the Municipal Attorney's Office for information or legal advice on matters related to the City, and such information or legal advice shall not be

CONSIDER POSSIBLE POLICY REGARDING CONTACTING THE MUNICIPAL ATTORNEY(S)

City Administrator/Treasurer Mertes said Council Member Czarnecki expressed interest in the development of policy as to who can contact the Municipal Attorney. She said that the Mayor, Council Members, and Department Heads are able to contact the Municipal Attorney; however, it is best to contact her prior to determine if the matter has already been addressed or if the question can be answered by someone else. This will help to cut down on legal bills.

Council Member Czarnecki said a policy will ensure the Municipal Attorney is clear as to who can contact his/her office. He said there have been instances of residents contacting the Municipal Attorney for legal advice.

Assistant City Attorney Tim Schoonenberg said his office prefers a chain of command. He said it is more efficient if the City Administrator aggregates the questions and issues and forwards them to his office. When his office is contacted by a resident, Council Member, or Department Head it is made known that the office is representing the City, not the individual.

The Council directed City Administrator/Treasurer Mertes and the City Attorney's office to draft a policy regarding the contacting of the Municipal Attorney(s) for review and adoption at a future meeting.

NOTICE OF CLAIM continued:

FALL – Washington Avenue, Cedarburg February 17, 2017

On Friday, February 17th, I had a doctor's appointment with Dr. Dean Ziegler at Creekside Center. This appointment was a follow-up examination for shoulder replacement surgery received in November 2016.

I met Mary Mueller from Mueller Funeral home at the Coffee Roastery. This was at approximately 10 a.m. We proceeded to walk north on the west side of Washington Avenue. I am an avid walker, runner and biker. When we reached the driveway between the Edward Jones office on W64 N717 Washington Avenue and just before the Gem Shop on W64 N717 Washington Avenue, the sidewalk is buckled and I tripped on a 2" raised concrete. I fell twisting my body with my knees hitting the pavement and my head/face hitting the concrete. When my head hit the concrete, my sunglasses pressed against my eye and eye socket causing the area surrounding the eye to become swollen, painful and black and blue. The corner of my eye was scratched and my left knee was scraped ripping a hole in my running pants.

Upon returning home, I place cold compresses on the eye and continued for several days. The eye became worst and more painful so I made an appointment with my internist, Dr. Kevin Goniu at Cedar Mills to examine. X-rays were taking. The shoulder that was replaced was injured and additional pain was experienced for several months slowing overall healing process.

A google map photograph of the exact area I fell was taken in October 2016 highlighting many areas of sideway that need to be repaired. In February 2017, yet nothing had been repaired. The uneven concrete is difficult to notice upon a casual walk yet significant enough to trip and seriously hurt someone.

My medical bills totaled \$846 (I have a \$5700 deductible and an HSA account which have been debited); my sunglasses are \$184.80 and my running pants are \$75. Additionally, I am seeking \$7500 for pain and suffering for my head, eye, eye socket/orbit, knee and shoulder. I feel this is a fair and responsible request. In addition, I am asking the City to address the uneven concrete so no one else has to experiences a similar accident. I have spoken with city workers who confirmed that other complaints have been made and the city is slow and reluctant to spend the money to make necessary repairs. I further urge the City to address these issues before anyone else is also seriously injured.

I have enclosed a photograph of my eye and surrounding area, my knee, the unleveled concrete, and google map of location and city markings. I have further enclosed a copy of medical bills and an estimate of new sunglasses.

I am in receipt of the above claim that has been filed against the City of Cedarburg in the amount of 7,500 for damages as a result of the claimant tripping and falling on a city sidewalk.

I would recommend that you check with the Street Department to see if there were prior problems or complaints that were filed with the City regarding this area. I would also check to see when the last time this area was inspected. I would also try and confirm statements made by the claimant about city employees confirming other complaints and that the city is slow and reluctant to spend money to make necessary repairs.

If there were no prior problems or complaints and the city does sidewalk inspections, it would be my recommendation that this claim be formally denied. As you are aware, municipalities are held to a standard of reasonable care and the courts have determined that reasonable care is to take corrective action (If needed) within a reasonable amount of time once notice has been given of a problem. The courts have also indicated that municipalities should do some type of inspections. If there were no problems or complaints and the city does inspections, it is my opinion that the city is meeting the standard of care required.

The courts have ruled that how often a municipality inspects their sidewalks is a discretionary decision and municipalities have immunity under Wis. Stat. 893.80(4) for discretionary decisions and actions.

I would assume that since Washington Avenue is the main street in Cedarburg that the city does some type of inspections on the sidewalks on this street.

In addition, a person walking on city sidewalks has an obligation to keep a proper lookout and control of where they are walking. An argument could be made that this claimant should have kept a proper lookout to have noticed the devation in the sidewalk to have avoided tripping over it.

SEC. 2-5-1 DECLARATION OF POLICY.

The proper operation of democratic government requires that public officials and employees be independent, impartial and responsible to the people; that government decisions and policy be made in proper channels of the governmental structure; that public office is not to be used for personal gain; and that the public have confidence in the integrity of its government. In recognition of these goals, there is established in this Chapter a code of ethics for all City of Cedarburg officials and employees whether elected or appointed, paid or unpaid, including members of Council as well as boards, committees and commissions of the City (City agencies). The purpose of this Ethics Code is to establish guidelines for ethical standards of conduct for all such officials and employees by setting forth those acts or actions that are incompatible with the best interests of the City of Cedarburg and by directing disclosure by such officials and employees of private financial or other interests in matters affecting the City.

SEC. 2-5-2 RESPONSIBILITY OF PUBLIC OFFICE.

Public officials and employees are agents of public purpose and hold office for the benefit of the public. They are bound to uphold the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution of this State and carry out impartially the laws of the nation, state and municipality, to observe in their official acts the highest standards of morality and to discharge faithfully the duties of their office regardless of personal considerations, recognizing that the public interest must be their prime concern.

SEC. 2-5-3 DEDICATED SERVICE.

- (a) Officials and employees should adhere to the rules of work, professionalism and performance established as the standard for their positions by the appropriate authority.
- (b) Officials and employees should not exceed their authority or breach the law or ask others to do so, and they should work in full cooperation with other public officials and employees unless prohibited from so doing by law or by officially recognized confidentiality of their

work.

SEC. 2-5-4 FAIR AND EQUAL TREATMENT.

- (a) **Use of Public Property.** No official or employee shall request or permit the unauthorized use of City-owned vehicles, equipment, materials or property for personal convenience or profit.
- (b) **Fundraising.** With the exception of fundraising for purposes of raising money for City departmental programming, equipment, or capital projects, which may occur subject to Council approval and all provisions of this Code and the State Statutes, the following shall be prohibited:
 - (1) No official or employee shall request or permit the use of city resources, city time or city equipment for the purpose of fundraising.
 - (2) No official or employee shall use his or her position, authority or influence, whether possessed or anticipated, to represent themselves as a city official or employee for private or public fundraising. (Ord. 2015-13)
- (b) **Obligations to Citizens.** No official or employee shall grant any special consideration, treatment or advantage to any citizen beyond that which is available to every other citizen.

SEC. 2-5-5 CONFLICT OF INTEREST.

(a) **Financial and Personal Interest Prohibited.** No official or employee, whether paid or unpaid, shall engage in any business or transaction or shall act in regard to financial or other personal interest, direct or indirect, which is incompatible with the proper discharge of official duties in the public interest contrary to the provisions of this Chapter or which would tend to impair independence of or action in the performance of official duties.

(b) Definitions.

- (1) <u>Financial Interest</u>. Any interest which shall yield, directly or indirectly, a monetary or other material benefit to the officer or employee or to any person employing or retaining the services of the officer or employee.
- (2) <u>Personal Interest</u>. Any interest arising from blood or marriage relationships or from close business or political associations, whether or not any financial interest is involved.
- (3) <u>Person</u>. Any individual or legal entity.

(c) Specific Conflicts Enumerated.

- (1) <u>Incompatible Employment</u>. No official or employee shall engage in or accept private employment or render service for private interest when such employment or service is incompatible with the proper discharge of official duties or would tend to impair independence of judgment or action in the performance of official duties, unless otherwise permitted by law.
- (2) <u>Disclosure of Confidential Information</u>. No official or employee shall, without proper legal authorization, disclose confidential information concerning the property, government or affairs of the City, nor shall such information be used to advance the financial or other private interests of the official or employee or others.

(3) Gifts and Favors.

- a. No public official or employee may use his or her public office to "obtain financial gain" or "anything of value" for the private benefit of himself or herself, for his or her immediate family, or for an organization with which he or she is associated.
- b. No person may directly or indirectly offer or give "anything of value" to a local public official or employee if it could reasonably be expected to affect that official's vote, official action or judgment, or if it could be construed as a reward for any official action or inaction on the part of the local public official or employee. No local public official or employee may accept "anything of value" tendered under such circumstances. "Anything of value" is defined as "money or property, favor, service, payment, advance, forbearance, loan or promise of future employment". Legal campaign contributions are exempt from the definitions. An official or employee is not to accept hospitality if, after consideration of the surrounding circumstances. it could reasonably be concluded that such hospitality would not be extended were it not for the fact that the guest, or a member of the guest's immediate family, was a City official or employee. This includes any discount on the price of admission, parking, or use of a box at a stadium that is tax exempt from general property taxes. Participation in celebrations, grand openings. open houses, informational meetings and similar events are excluded from this prohibition. This paragraph further shall not be construed to prevent candidates for elective office from accepting hospitality from citizens for the purpose of supporting the candidate's campaign.
- c. No local public official or employee may take any official action that affects a matter in which the public official or employee, a member of his or her immediate family, or an organization with which the official or employee is associated has a substantial financial interest.
- d. No local public official or employee may use his or her office or position in any way that produces or assists in producing a substantial benefit, either directly or indirectly, for the official or employee, any members of his or her immediate family, or an organization with which the official or employee is associated.
- (4) Representing Private Interests Before City Agencies or Courts. No officer or employee shall appear on behalf of any private person (other than him or herself, his or her spouse or minor children) before any City agency. However, members of the Common Council may appear before City agencies on behalf of constituents in the course of their duties as representatives of the electorate or in the performance of public or civic obligations.
- (d) Contracts with the City. No City officer or employee who, in his capacity as such officer or employee, participates in the making of a contract in which he has a private pecuniary interest, direct or indirect, or performs in regard to that contract with some function requiring the exercise of discretion on his part shall enter into any contract with the City unless it is within the confines of Sec. 946.13

(e) Disclosure of Interest in Legislation.

- (1) Any member of the Common Council who has a financial interest or personal interest in any proposed legislation before the Common Council shall disclose on the records of the Common Council or the Ethics Board created by this Chapter the nature and extent of such interest.
- (2) Any other official or employee who has a financial interest or personal interest in any proposed legislative action of the Common Council or who serves on a board or committee, shall disclose the nature and extent of such interest.
- (3) If there is a conflict of interest for any official or employee, he or she must refrain from participating in any way including discussion, deliberations or action on the item.

SEC. 2-5-6 ADVISORY OPINION.

Any questions as to the interpretation of any provisions of this Code of Ethics Chapter shall be referred to the Personnel Committee serving as the Ethics Board or the City Attorney. The fact that a person seeks an advisory opinion and abides by the material facts as stated, is evidence of intent to comply with the Ethics Code.

SEC. 2-5-7 JURISDICTION AND APPLICATION.

- (a) The Personnel Committee shall have administrative jurisdiction over this Code of Ethics Chapter and shall be deemed the Ethics Board pursuant to Section 19.59 (3)(d) Wis. Stats. for that purpose. An individual may request an advisory opinion on the propriety of any matter to which he or she is or may become a party. However, the Personnel Committee has complete discretion as to whether to issue such an opinion. All requests and advisory opinions to the Ethics Board must be in writing.
- (b) The Personnel Committee may make recommendations with respect to amendments to this Code of Ethics Chapter.
- (c) Upon the sworn complaint of any person alleging facts which, if true, would constitute improper conduct under the provisions of this Chapter, the Personnel Committee shall conduct an investigation of the facts of the complaint; if the investigation indicates there may be a reasonable basis for the complaint justifying further investigation, the Committee shall conduct a public hearing in accordance with the common law requirements of due process, including notice, an opportunity to be heard, an opportunity to cross-examine witnesses and to present testimony and other evidence in support of the accused's position and an opportunity to be represented by counsel or other representatives at the expense of the accused. The Committee shall make written findings of fact and issue a written decision concerning the propriety of the conduct of the subject official or employee and shall refer the matter to the Common Council for final disposition.
- (d) In the event a member of the Personnel Committee is allegedly involved in an Ethics Code violation, the Mayor, subject to the confirmation of the Common Council, shall appoint another Council Member to temporarily replace the member of the Committee who is under investigation.

SEC. 2-5-8 SANCTIONS.

A determination that an official's or employee's actions constitute improper conduct under the provisions of this Chapter may constitute a cause of suspension, removal from office or employment or other action permitted by law.

SEC. 2-5-9 DISTRIBUTION OF ETHICS CODE.

- (a) The City Clerk shall cause a copy of this Code of Ethics to be distributed to every public official and employee of the City of Cedarburg within thirty (30) days after enactment of this Chapter. Each public official and employee elected, appointed or engaged thereafter shall be furnished a copy before entering upon his duties.
- (b) Each public official, the Mayor, the Chairman of each Board, Commission or Committee and, through the City Administrator, the Head of each Department shall, between May 1 and May 31 each year, review the provisions of this Code with his fellow Council, Board, Commission, Committee members or subordinates as the case may be and certify to the City Clerk by June 15 that such annual review had been undertaken. A copy of this Ethics Code Chapter shall be continuously posted on each department bulletin board wherever situated.

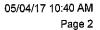

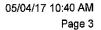

City Administrator's Report

June 8, 2017

Department News

The following information is provided to keep the Common Council and staff informed on some of the activities and events of the City. Points of clarification may be addressed during the City Administrator's Report portion of the agenda; however, if discussion of any of these items is necessary, placement on a future Council agenda should be directed.

Engineering & Public Works— All the utility work is complete and the new crushed stone road base is in place on Hillcrest Avenue. Pine Street work will start, once school ends at Parkview for the summer. It is projected that the entire 2017 Street and Utility project should be completed by the end of July. An Open House for the new Public Works Facility is scheduled for Saturday, June 10, from noon-2:00 p.m.

The Public Works crew is working on crack sealing and street sweeping. A 60 foot section of concrete will be replaced near the former Mutual Bank building on the south end of the City this month.

Parks, Recreation & Forestry— The Cedarburg Community Pool opened on Saturday, June 3. The recreation programs will begin the week of June 12. The Youth Soccer program has 110 participants.

The Parks and Forestry crews worked on grass cutting and ball diamonds including the installation of a snow fence at Behling Field. The downtown flower baskets were planted last week. Work continues to have Cedarburg designated as a Bird City.

Wastewater— Paving was done at the Sheboygan Road lift station on Monday, June 5. The Department has received ten applications to-date for the maintenance position at the plant. The Department will receive the new JetVac vehicle in July. An emergency repair was done at the plant to relocate a broken pipe in the basement wall.

Police—Detective/Juvenile Officer Michael McNerney has been selected as the new Detective Sergeant upon confirmation by the Police & Fire Commission in July. The School District is involved in the interviewing process to fill the Detective/Juvenile officer position. The Department has received 40 applications to-date for the entry level police officer position that closes next week.

Senior Center - Three hundred tickets were sold for the Ozaukee Senior Conference event to be held on June 13 at Grafton High School. The Senior Center will be closed on Friday, June 23 for the Strawberry Festival setup in the parking lot.

Library-The Summer Reading program "Build a Better World," begins today. The Build A Better World lecture series will include four sponsored discussions: The Paradox of being a Black Police Officer in Today's Society, Human Trafficking in Wisconsin, Everything you Wanted to Know about Immigration but were Afraid to Ask, and Vertical Gardening. The Cedarburg Library has added a video game collection. Computer classes this month include: Online Health Information (Medline Plus) and Presenting with PowerPoint. Gems of Hope meet each month to make gifts of jewelry mounted on inspirational cards to give to cancer patients.

Light & Water—The Utility's second recycling event was well attended with 400 cars passing through within in a two hour period. A building project will begin next week that will involve closing the drive-thru window until it is completed. Bids were opened last week for a water main project (between Redeemer Lutheran Church and Western Road) that will add this area to the high level pressure zone. One month into the meter replacement project, 1,000 of the 6,000 meters are done with focus on the electric portion.

Administrator The City received an additional invoice for \$6,750 for six necessary restatements that were identified in the City's financial records to bring them into compliance with generally accepted accounting principles and governmental accounting standards followed by their firm. These took a lot of time and will not carry forward into future years. Watch for more information on a two hour Team building training that will be offered on July 26 (7:30) a.m.), August 16 (1:00 p.m.) and September 20 (8:00 a.m.) for all City employees.

General Fund First Quarter Financial Report March 31, 2017

Operations at the end of the quarter were in line with budget for revenues and expenditures. The comments below highlight some of the significant accounts and fluctuations from the budget.

Revenues

At the end of the quarter revenues totaled \$6,531,864; 76% realized.

Property taxes were 100% realized in January. **Property tax equivalent** from Light & Water is accrued and paid monthly. The amount changes with infrastructure improvements and the assessment ratio. As the assessment ratio goes down so does the payment from the utility when calculating the taxes.

The **Intergovernmental Revenues** at the end of the quarter totaled \$193,042; 20% realized. Included in this budget are State Computer Aids, Shared Revenues and Expenditure Restraint revenues. These revenues are received through installments or a one-time only payment. To date only the fire insurance dues and first quarter transportation aids have been received.

Regulation and Compliance Revenues at quarter end totaled \$62,402; 13% realized. Licenses are only 5% realized at the end of March due to the liquor license renewals being due July 1. The majority of the fees collected were building, electrical, plumbing and HVAC permits; 19% realized. The permits are down slightly from March 2016. Court penalties and costs are 19% realized for the quarter. Parking violations are 47% realized and almost \$3,000 over March 2016. This account is for all traffic violations and other ordinance violations. The amount is under expected budget for the quarter and approximately \$4,000 less than 2016. Cable franchise fees are received quarterly; payments for the first quarter are due by April 30.

Public Charges for Services are 41% realized at the end of March; in the amount of \$31,313. General Government Charges include the Treasurer's and Assessor's Office fees that are 17% realized. Police Department fees at the end of the quarter are \$5,607; 41% realized. Also included in this category are the alarm permit and Public Works' fees; 41 % and 45% realized respectively. The alarm fees are due at the beginning of the year and the false alarm fees are collected periodically throughout the year. Included in Public Works fees account are the recycling cart upgrades, appliance pick up fees and the reimbursement of the crew's time for set up and take down of festivals. Park rental fees to date total \$1,136; 17% realized.

Intergovernmental Charges are \$7,938 or 4% realized at the end of the quarter. Included in this category are the quarterly billings to the Town for the Fire and EMS shared services and the Cedarburg School District payments for the crossing guards' payroll expenditures. The actual Fire and EMS expenditures are charged out to the Town for reimbursement based on a formula. The first quarter bill was not recorded until May.

Interdepartmental Charges are \$489 at quarter end; 3% realized. Fees charged are for Sewer, room tax, TIF, and CDBG administrative services. Room tax administrative fees are collected the month after the quarter end when the funds are distributed to the Chamber of Commerce Tourism, Promotion and Development Committee.

General Fund

First Quarter Financial Report 2017

Commercial Revenues includes interest, rent, donations and the sale of City property. These revenues total \$115,064 as of March 31; 59% realized. The water tower rent is received in full for the year from the cell carriers and donations to date are over budget due to moving donations previously recorded in the Trust & Agency Fund to the General Fund for the K-9 unit, Police Department and Senior Center.

Expenditures

At the end of the quarter expenditures are expected to be 25% expended. As of March 31 expenditures are \$2,336,720 and 26% expended. The budget amounts include the 2016 encumbrances for goods or services that were "carried over" to 2017. The Council approved these changes to the budget at the April 24th meeting. Expenditures were budgeted \$155,743 over revenues for the purchase of tactical medical supplies, handguns and holsters for the Police Department, repair and painting of a fence at the Police Department, along with transfers to the swimming pool and Capital Improvements for a pool heater and street improvements respectively. The adjusted budgeted expenditures are \$181,422 over revenues. The difference, \$25,679, is due to the encumbrances. Encumbrances included purchases for Elections, Parks, City Hall, Assessor and Public Works that were not completed in 2016. The City Hall encumbrance is the largest in the amount of \$11,134 for carpeting the first floor of City Hall. The next largest purchase is crack sealing supplies for street maintenance by Public Works.

General Government expenditures to date total \$301,413; 27% expended. General Government includes the Council, Mayor, Clerk, Treasurer, audit, legal, Assessor, and City Hall Departments. The Council is 41% expended at the end of the first quarter because dues are paid in full at the beginning of the year. Property and Liability Insurance is 100% expended due to premiums for the year paid in full in January.

Public Safety expenditures are \$1,166,324; 29% expended, at the end of the first quarter. The departments are all in line with their budget for the year except for the Fire Department. The Fire Department actual expenditures have been added to the City's financials as suggested by the auditors. The revenues for the Department are over budget to offset their expenditures.

Public Works expenditures are \$632,984; 25% expended at quarter end. The Garage budget is 42% expended because of the time the crew put in to get the garage set up for operations. Other departments are under budget due to the change in priorities in the first quarter.

The Parks, Forestry & Recreation Department expenditures total \$219,905; 24% expended, at quarter end. The Senior Center expenditures will exceed budget for 2017 due to the accounting change for the Senior Van and tours. The Senior Van expenditures were moved from the Trust & Agency Fund to the General Fund and all tour revenue and expenditures will be recorded in full rather than just the net profit. None of these expenditures were budgeted for 2017. The Celebrations account includes the DPW expenditures for set up, take down and clean up after the Strawberry Festival, Wine & Harvest Festival, Ozaukee County Fair and Maxwell St. Days. The flower basket watering salaries are also charged to this department. The Festivals reimburse the City for their events.

Conservation and Development expenditures totaled \$16,094 at quarter end, 18% expended, for City planning and economic development services.

Transfers to Other Funds budgeted are \$139,700. One transfer for \$1,000 will be made to the Recreation Programs Fund for the Civic Band, one to Capital Improvements in the amount of \$100,000 for street improvements and \$38,700 to the Swimming Pool for a new heater.

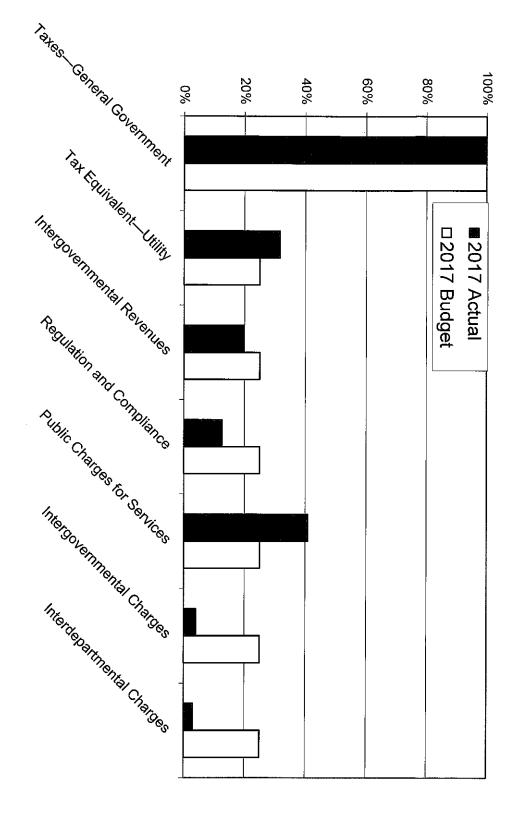

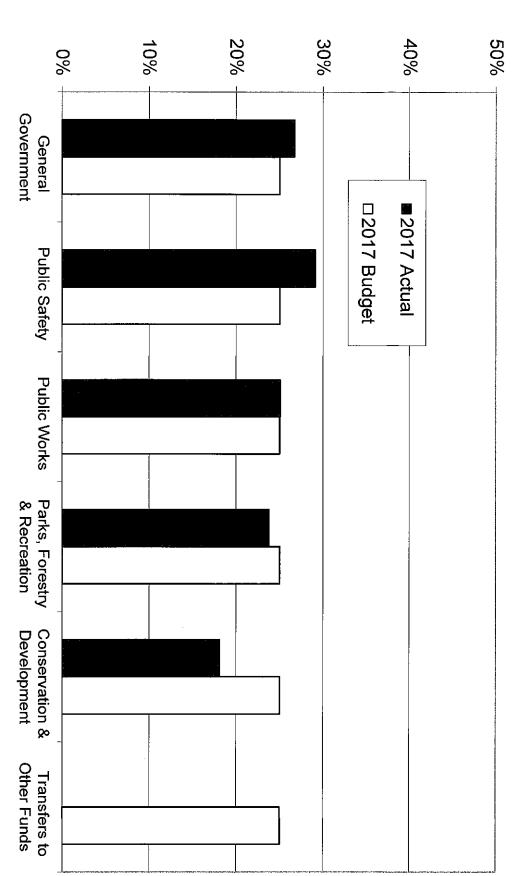

Revenues

The Cemetery fund revenues at the end of the quarter total \$6,274.02; which was from the rent of the house at Immanuel Cemetery, the sale of cemetery lots, monument and marker fees and interest income. Three lots were sold during the first quarter. Interest income is from investments at the State Local Government Investment Pool and money market accounts.

From every lot sale, \$75 is set aside for perpetual care of the cemetery. At the end of the quarter, the fund had a balance of \$104,700.00.

Expenditures

The Cemetery fund expenditures include salaries and benefits for the employees maintaining the grounds and the repair and maintenance to the grounds and equipment. Workers' compensation and property insurance are paid in full in January.

At the end of the quarter, total expenditures are expected to be 25% expended. Actual expenditures were 13% expended, under budget.

The Swimming Pool is funded by user fees along with subsidizing from the City.

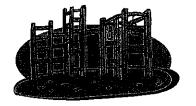
Revenues

City of Cedarburg Capital Improvement Fund Quarterly Financial Report March 31, 2017

The report that follows compares the annual adjusted budget to the actual revenues and expenditures for the quarter ending March 31, 2017. The last column shows the percent of revenues recognized and the percent of the budget expended. The comments below highlight some of the activity for the fund.

Revenues

Revenues totaled \$1,198,114; 70% realized at the end of the quarter.

The property taxes are the largest revenue at \$1,192,000; 70% of total revenues. Real estate taxes were recognized in full the first quarter.

Library impact fees of \$1,651 were collected.

Interest income of \$3,713 was earned to date and donations totaling \$750 were received in January for youth baseball.

Transfers from General Fund is budgeted for street improvements and will be completed later in the year.

Expenditures

There were two budget adjustments in 2017 for encumbrances carried over from 2016. The purchase of the propane tanks for the DPW garage was not completed until 2017. The Parks & Forestry Department is also completing the purchase of their aerial truck in 2017 in the amount of \$174,251.

Total expenditures for the year are negative \$23,128 due to the reversal of the retainage booked in 2016 for the building project; therefore, the fund is at 101% unexpended.

The \$50,000 budget for City Hall is for the replacement of the boiler at the Community Center Gym. The expenditures to date are for the monopole feasibility study.

The \$3,255 in expenditures for the Police Department are due to the final purchases of officers' equipment from the 2016 budget.

To date \$5,223 has been expended on the replacement of the emergency management siren.

DPW expenditures are negative due to the reversal of the retainage entry at the end of 2016.

The Parks & Forestry equipment purchased to date is for warning lights on a lift truck.

The Transfer to Debt Service will be made later in the year to offset the library debt payment. The transfer to the Library was completed in the first quarter of the residual funds from the sale of the old library building.

Revenues

Revenues at the end of the quarter are just below budget. In total, revenues are expected to be 25% earned. The actual percentage was 24.64% received.

Interest for the quarter reflects revenue for monies invested in the state pool, plus investment earnings from investments at US Bank.

Expenditures

Expenses are below budget at the end of the quarter with 21.44% expended.

Gallons Billed

The report shows gallons billed for 2016 and the current year. The graph shows the monthly variances for the current year and for the past three years.

Status of Capital Projects

This schedule lists the current capital projects budget amounts along with the cost for the year to date. The replacement funds used for the projects are also listed on the schedule.

Replacement Fund Investment Activity

This schedule shows the investments by fund. It also shows the monthly allocations for the collection system and wastewater treatment plant replacements. It also reflects interest earned and any transfers that were made.

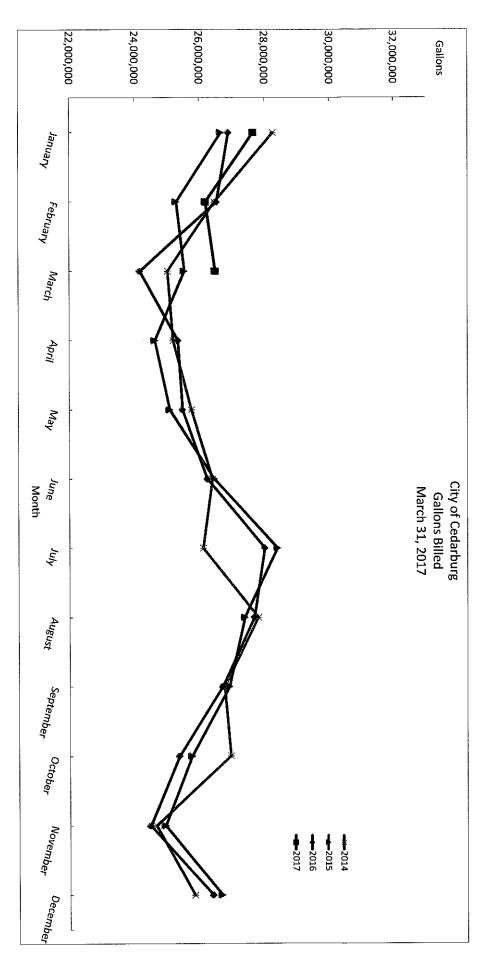

City of Cedarburg Salaries and Benefits Quarter Ended March 31, 2017

This report exhibits total salary and benefit expenses by department for the quarter ended March 31, 2017. Included are General Fund, Special Revenue Funds and Wastewater Treatment Plant salaries. Benefit expenses include FICA, pension, sick payout, health insurance, life insurance, longevity and workers' compensation insurance amounts.

At the end of the quarter, departments are expected to be 25% expended. The total salary and benefit expense is \$1,837,436.50, 21.98% expended. In total, salaries and benefits are below the budget level for the quarter due to the number of payrolls.

The amount expended for the Fire Department was for a part-time employee and their retirement and workers' compensation.

The Public Works accounts need to be looked at as a whole, with the exception of Engineering/Public Works Administration. Along with the Parks and Forestry maintenance salaries and benefits, these represent the entire Public Works/Parks & Forestry staff. While some accounts are showing over budget, others are under budget depending on where the man hours were spent, such as snow plowing.

There was one worker compensation claim filed during the first quarter. It did not result in any time lost.

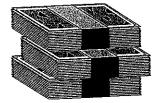

City of Cedarburg Cash and Investments Summary

As of March 31, 2017

Attached is the report of cash and investments for the City of Cedarburg as of March 31, 2017. Included on the schedule of investments are the financial institutions where bank deposits have been placed or brokers from whom securities were purchased; the maturity date of the security, where applicable; the yield of the particular deposit account or investment; and the balance or cost of the account or investment.



City monies are placed in several types of investments, including the State of Wisconsin Local Government Investment Pool (LGIP), U.S. Treasury securities, U.S. Government Agency notes, commercial paper and bank deposits, including certificates of deposit. A variety of investment types are utilized to balance safety, liquidity and risk, as well as providing diversification.

Most of the City's idle monies, especially in the General Fund, are needed to finance the operating activities of the City, as well as debt service and therefore are placed in short-term investments which are highly liquid, such as the local bank money market accounts. These accounts are earning at a higher interest rate than the State Pool. Short term (less than one year) investments of General Fund reserves are made based on our cash flow forecast for operating funds and are timed to mature when monies will be needed to meet obligations of the City. Longer-term investments have been purchased in order to increase the average portfolio yield through US Bank. These investments are part of what is considered the "core" portfolio.

The weighted average yield for outstanding investments March 31, 2017 for all funds (exclusive of the Trust and Agency and Capital Improvement Economic Development Funds) was 1.10% which compares to the yield on outstanding investments at December 31, 2016 of 0.70%. The State Investment Pool yield for March 31, 2017 was 0.61%. Page F-6 includes a graph of our combined investment yields and the LGIP over the past twelve months. At year end due to tax collection the bank balances are higher than normal and the interest yield slightly lower due to the amount of funds collected at the banks in the lower yielding accounts.

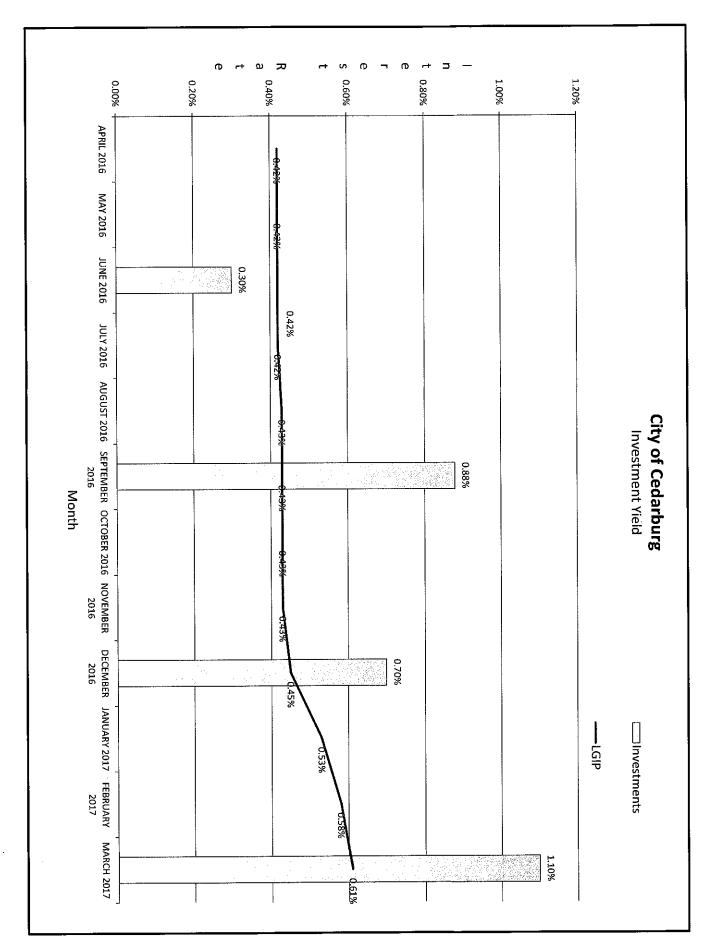
Rates have started to increase at the State Pool which is also the local banks' benchmark for the City's interest bearing accounts. In December 2015 the State Pool interest rate was only 0.19% and has only increased since.

- General Liability Insurance
- Auto Physical Damage Insurance
- Property Insurance
- Excess Liability Insurance
- Employment Practices Insurance
- Workers' Compensation Insurance
- Boiler & Machinery Insurance

Revenues include interest income, charges to other funds for their premiums, dividends and insurance recoveries.

The interest income and change in market value revenues totaled \$3,724.56 to date.

The CVMIC dividend was received in March.

Insurance recoveries to date totaled \$701.80 for Jake's medical bills from his 2016 injury.

Transfers from other funds were for the annual premiums and were charged out in full in January. The transfer from Trust & Agency will be corrected in the second quarter and moved into the General Fund amount for the Senior Van insurance premium.

Insurance premiums were paid in full in January.

At the end of the first quarter there were no claim expenditures.

Debt Service Fund First Quarter Financial Report March 31, 2017

The Debt Service Fund is used to account for the payment of principal and interest on debt obligations of the City.

Revenues include the tax levy, interest revenue and police impact fees. For the year \$1,284,280 was received from property taxes and \$199.27 from interest revenue. The Build America Bond reimbursement and police impact fees were also received; \$4,931.64 and \$1,888.84 respectively.

The transfer from Capital Improvements is from the Library building project residual funds to help pay down the debt and will be completed later in the year.

The expenditures for the year include the 2017 debt principal and interest payments. Payments are in March and September. Total expended in principal and interest payments at the end of the quarter were \$1,535,905.72.
