CITY OF CEDARBURG PUBLIC MEETING POLICY DURING COVID-19

The City of Cedarburg will begin utilizing zoom, an online meeting tool, to conduct City meetings. This includes all public meetings. We are cancelling all non-essential meetings and limiting agenda items but there are items that do require decisions to be made so that projects throughout the City can continue or get completed in a timely manner. We will continue to adhere to open meeting laws as set forth by the State of Wisconsin.

Most recently the Wisconsin Department of Justice issued an advisory on March 16, 2020, addressing this issue and stating that: "Governmental bodies typically can meet their open meetings obligations, while practicing social distancing to help protect public health, by conducting meetings via telephone conference calls if the public is provided with an effective way to monitor such calls (such as public distribution, at least 24 hours in advance, of dial-in information for a conference call)." The advisory emphasizes that "When an open meeting is held by teleconference or video conference, the public must have a means of monitoring the meeting. DOJ concludes that, under the present circumstances, a governmental body will typically be able to meet this obligation by providing the public with information (in accordance with notice requirements) for joining the meeting remotely, even if there is no central location at which the public can convene for the meeting.

DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE ACTION ON PROCLAMATION RECOGNIZING EDUCATION AND SHARING DAY

This Proclamation was presented to recognize that a quality education is one of the significant foundations for the continuing success of our Community, State and Country and to advocate for an equitable and value-based education for all.

Motion made by Council Member Thome, seconded by Council Member Burkart, to adopt a Proclamation recognizing Education and Sharing Day. Motion carried without a negative vote with Council Member Simpson excused.

DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE ACTION ON ARBOR DAY PROCLAMATION

This Proclamation was presented to recognize the first observation of Arbor Day in 1872 with the planting of more than a million trees in Nebraska, to recognize their benefits, and to plant trees to gladden the heart and promote the well-being of this and future generations.

Motion made by Council Member Burkart, seconded by Council Member Thome, to adopt a Proclamation for Arbor Day. Motion carried without a negative vote with Council Member Simpson excused.

DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE ACTION ON ORDINANCE NO. 2022-10 ANNEXING 41.03 ACRES AT 6660 SUSAN LANE IN THE TOWN OF CEDARBURG TO THE CITY OF CEDARBURG

Planner Censky reminded the Council that they provided positive feedback to the applicant last September and November for this side-by-side residential project and that feedback was echoed by the Plan Commission, as well. The applicant then used the feedback as the basis for pursuing annexation. To gain further support for the project, the applicant removed two buildings at the north end of the wooded area and shifted the road away from the northwest corner to better protect those woods. The project now consists of 35 side-by-side ranch style building (70 units), down from their original proposal of 37 buildings (74 units). It is now proposed at a density of 1.75 units per gross acre, 2.0 units per net acre, exclusive of the quarry.

Planner Censky continued that tonight's request is to approve annexing the property into the City. Section 13-1-40(f), City Zoning Code, requires that newly annexed areas be placed in the RS-1 Single-Family Zoning District until an ordinance is created for permanent zoning. Ultimately, the applicant will return to pursue rezoning the property to the Rd-1 Two-Family District with the Planned Unit Development PUD overlay District. The applicant was before the Plan Commission and Common Council several times, and the Plan Commission recommended approval by unanimous vote on March 7, 2022.

Motion made by Council Member Arnett, seconded by Council Member Thome, to adopt Ordinance No. 2022-10 annexing 41.03 acres at 6660 Susan Lane in the town of Cedarburg to the City of Cedarburg. Motion carried on a roll call vote with Council Members Burkart, Verhaalen, Thome, Lythjohan, Bublitz, and Arnett voting aye and Council Member Simpson excused.

DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE ACTION ON RESOLUTION NO. 2022-11 AUTHORIZING STAFF TO APPLY FOR A DEPARTMENT OF NATURAL RESOURCES RUNOFF MANAGEMENT GRANT

Director of Engineering and Public Works Wieser explained that part of the application process to receive an Urban Non-Point Source and Stormwater Management Construction Grant; the DNR requires passage of a resolution to appoint the authorized representative for filing applications. AECOM is assisting staff with the grant application. The grant would be used to modify the Willowbrooke Pond to provide more efficient water quality treatment.

COMMON COUNCIL April 11, 2022

Motion made by Council Member Burkart, seconded by Council Member Thome, to adopt Resolution No. 2022-11 authorizing staff to apply for a Department of Natural Resources Runoff Management grant. Motion carried without a negative vote with Council Member Simpson excused.

DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE ACTION ON APPROVAL FOR A CERTIFIED SURVEY MAP FOR A MINOR ADJUSTMENT TO OUTLOT 9 OF THE GLEN AT CEDAR CREEK SUBDIVISION

Planner Censky explained that the applicant is requesting approval of his Certified Survey Map, which will serve to adjust the limits of outlot 9 in the Glen at Cedar Creek subdivision by removing the narrow strip of the outlot located between Lots 51 and 52. The purpose of the narrow portion of the outlot was for the private use by homeowners within this subdivision for pedestrian access; however, a pathway was never installed to field verify its location and discourage trespassing onto adjacent properties. Since there is another access point to outlot 9, this narrow access is unnecessary. Accordingly, with the recording of the CSM, the ownership of that narrow strip of land will be transferred to the adjacent Lots 51 and 52 on an equal basis. This was unanimously recommended by the Plan Commission on April 4, 2022.

Motion made by Council Member Thome, seconded by Council Member Arnett, to approve a Certified Survey Map for a minor adjustment to Outlot 9 of the Glen at Cedar Creek Subdivision. Motion carried without a negative vote with Council Member Simpson excused.

DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE ACTION ON AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR THE CEDARBURG LEAD SERVICE REPLACEMENT PROGRAM

Director of Engineering and Public Works Director Wieser explained that the City was awarded \$600,000 in Safe Drinking Water Loan Program funds through the DNR. Cedarburg Light & Water along with RA Smith advertised and received bids for the Cedarburg Lead Service Replacement Program. This contract entails the replacement of 118 lead water services from the right-of-way to the house and focuses on the northeast quadrant of the City (Bridge Road, Highwood Drive, Riveredge Drive, Jefferson Avenue and Mequon Avenue). Six bids were received with the low bid being submitted by MRJ, Inc. Cedarburg Light & Water verified that MRJ has done this work in the past and can successfully complete a project of this size. MRJ's bid of \$505,862.50 was below the Engineer's estimate and is within budget. Cedarburg Light & Water would like authorization to add an additional 20 lead service replacements (location to be determined) to fully utilize the \$600,000 awarded by the DNR.

Motion made by Council Member Burkart, seconded by Council Member Thome, to award the contract for the Cedarburg Lead Service Replacement program to MRJ, Inc. along with the authorization to add 20 additional lead service replacements in an amount not to exceed \$600,000. Motion carried without a negative vote with Council Member Simpson excused.

The Common Council voted by ballot which resulted in four votes for Council Member Thome and three votes for Council Member Burkart. Council Member Thome was elected Common Council Representative to the Plan Commission.

DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE ACTION ON RESOLUTION NO 2022-12 CREATING TAX INCREMENTAL DISTRICT NO 7, APPROVING ITS PROJECT PLAN AND ESTABLISHING ITS BOUNDARIES

Todd Taves of Ehlers Inc. provided a summary of how financing works with a Tax Incremental District. The purpose of creating the district is to redevelop the property. The maximum life is 27 years; however, the estimated close time is twenty (20) years. In order to create the Tax Incremental District, the parcel must be found to be no less than 50% blighted. The expected value to be added to the City by January 1, 2028, is approximately \$49M. The Developer Agreement would be set up as a 'Pay as you go'' system thereby providing protection to the City taxpayers. A rate of return analysis was conducted from the Developer's standpoint. Metrics were calculated without Tax Incremental Finance (TIF) assistance and resulted in a rate of return of 3.83%. The calculations with TIF assistance resulted in a rate of return of 8.62%.

A discussion ensued regarding a Developers Agreement. There will be a list of protections for City taxpayers that could potentially be added to the agreement.

Elizabeth Brennen – W62 N355 Hanover Avenue – addressed the Council with concerns about the number of TID's currently in the City. She also believes that City residents would rather have more affordable housing which sparked a discussion among the Council Members. Council Members Arnett and Burkart opined that the price of housing is driven by supply and demand.

Council Member Arnett further offered that this project has a large variety of housing options and fits well in the Smart Growth site. He also explained the Developer stands to make below-market returns while the City will see an increase in Impact Fees of over \$1M. It was his opinion that any legal battles concerning Mercury Marine would be lengthy and expensive. Council Member Burkart expressed concerns with current taxpayers having to fund the environmental cleanup.

A motion was made by Council Member Arnett, seconded by Council Member Bublitz, to approve Resolution No. 2022-12 creating Tax Incremental District No. 7, approving its Project Plan and establishing its boundaries. Motion carried on a roll call vote with Council Members Verhaalen, Forbes, Arnett, Thome, Bublitz, and Simpson voting in favor and Council Member Burkart voting against.

DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE ACTION ON 2022 REQUEST FROM THE ROTARY FOR MOBILE FOOD VENDORS FOR THE 2022 ROTARY RIDE EVENT

A motion was made by Council Member Verhaalen, seconded by Council Member Burkart, to approve the mobile food vendor request from the Rotary for the 2022 Rotary Ride event. Motion carried without a negative vote with Council Member Thome abstaining.

DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE ACTION ON REQUEST TO LEASE ZARLING PROPERTY TO WILLIAM AND TREVOR JANESHEK TO AID IN COMPLIANCE WITH THE CITY'S ADAPTIVE MANAGEMENT PLAN

Water Recycling Superintendent Grulkowski explained the request from William and Trevor Janeshek to lease the City-owned property which was the prior Zarling property. The Janeshek's plan is to correct the eroded areas and plant a soybean crop and winter wheat. These plantings would aid in the City's Adaptive Management Plan regarding phosphorus levels.

A motion was made by Council Member Bublitz, seconded by Council Member Simpson, to approve the lease between the City of Cedarburg and William & Trevor Janeshek for the Zarling property to aid in compliance with the City's Adaptive Management Plan. Motion carried without a negative vote.

DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE ACTION ON DESIGNATION OF CITY'S OFFICIAL NEWSPAPER FOR ENSUING YEAR

A motion was made by Council Member Verhaalen, seconded by Council Member Burkart designating the *News Graphic* as the City's official newspaper for the year 2022. Motion carried without a negative vote.

DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE ACTION ON MAYOR O'KEEFE'S APPOINTMENTS TO VARIOUS BOARDS, COMMITTEES, AND COMMISSIONS

TITLE: Discussion and possible action on Ordinance 2022-12 amending Section 13-1-54(a) of the Zoning Code to permit Tattoo businesses as a conditional use in the B-2 Community Business District

ISSUE SUMMARY:

At their March 7th meeting, the Plan Commission considered a request to add a *Tattoo and Body Piercing* use to the list of uses permitted in the B-1, Neighborhood Business District, B-2 Community Business District, and the B-3 Central Business District. Staff notes that this use is currently not listed as either a principal use or conditional use in any of our business districts and therefore, unless it is listed, the use will not be allowed in the city. While the applicant requests this use be added to all three business districts, she targeted the former pizza restaurant at W63N540 Hanover Avenue in the B-3 District as the site she was pursuing.

The B-3 Central Business District covers the entire downtown area, and, according to the City Zoning Code Section 13-1-55(a), is intended to provide for the preservation of Cedarburg's historic downtown and the orderly appropriate regulations to ensure the compatibility of the diverse uses typical of the downtown area without inhibiting the potential for maximum development of commercial, cultural, entertainment, and other urban activities which contribute to its role as the heart of the City. This area contains a mix of retail shops, offices, restaurants, cultural, entertainment, and residential uses.

The B-2 Community Business District is located along Washington Avenue from Evergreen Boulevard south to Pioneer Road, a small area along the east side of north Washington Avenue and north of Cambridge Avenue, and at the intersection of Bridge Street and Columbia Road. This District, per City Zoning Code Section 13-1-54(a), is intended to provide for the orderly and attractive grouping at appropriate locations of retails stores, shops, offices, and service establishments serving the daily needs of the surrounding local community area. The size and location of such districts shall be based upon evidence of justifiable community need, of adequate customer potential, of satisfactory relationship to the traffic circulation system, and other related facilities and of potential contribution to the economic welfare of the community.

The B-1 Neighborhood Business District is detailed in the City Zoning Code, and per Section 13-1-53(a), is established to provide for individual or small groups of retail and service establishments serving the day-today needs of the general public located in areas near residential neighborhoods.

After a lengthy discussion, the Plan Commission determined that this use was not appropriate in the B-3 and B-1 Districts but would be compatible with the uses in the B-2 Community Business District.

BOARD, COMMISSION OR COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION: At their March 7, 2022 meeting, the Plan Commission reviewed this request and recommended adding Tattoo Businesses to the list of conditional uses in the B-2 Community Business District.

RECOMMENDATION OF ZONING TEXT AMENDMENT FOR B-1, B-2 AND B-3 BUSINESS DISTRICTS TO INCLUDE TATTOO AND BODY PIERCING AS A PERMITTED OR CONDITIONAL USE – INK WORX EMPORIUM/TESSA LANG

Planner Censky advised Commissioners that Petitioner Tessa Lang submitted an application to add *Tattoo and Body Piercing* to the list of uses in the B-1 Neighborhood Business District, B-2 Community Business District, and the B-3 Central Business District. Planner Censky noted that this use is currently not listed in any of the districts in the City, and wanted to clarify the intent of each of these districts, as follows:

The B-1 Neighborhood Business District is detailed in the City Zoning Code, and per Section 13-1-53(a), is established to provide for individual or small groups of retail and service establishments serving the day-to-day needs of the general public located in areas near residential neighborhoods.

The B-2 Community Business District is located along Washington Avenue from Evergreen Boulevard south to Pioneer Road, a small area along the east side of north Washington Avenue and north of Cambridge Avenue, and at the intersection of Bridge Street and Columbia Road. This District, per City Zoning Code Section 13-1-54(a), is intended to provide for the orderly and attractive grouping at appropriate locations of retails stores, shops, offices, and service establishments serving the daily needs of the surrounding local community area. The size and location of such districts shall be based upon evidence of justifiable community need, of adequate customer potential, of satisfactory relationship to the traffic circulation system, and other related facilities and of potential contribution to the economic welfare of the community.

The B-3 Central Business District covers the entire downtown area, and, according to the City Zoning Code Section 13-1-55(a), is intended to provide for the preservation of Cedarburg's historic downtown and the orderly appropriate regulations to ensure the compatibility of the diverse uses typical of the downtown area without inhibiting the potential for maximum development of commercial, cultural, entertainment, and other urban activities which contribute to its role as the heart of the City. This area contains a mix of retail shops, offices, restaurants, cultural, entertainment, and residential uses.

After review of the proposal by City Staff, Planner Censky ascertained that this type of use serves the needs of the general community, rather than the historic or nearby neighborhoods, and is therefore more compatible with uses in the B-2 District. He reminded Commissioners that by listing it as a conditional use, conditions can be put in place to reduce the impact of the use on this District. Recommendations from the Plan Commission at this meeting will be forwarded to the Common Council for public hearing and final decision.

Petitioner Lang was in attendance and advised Commissioners that, although her amendment request was for all three of the aforementioned business districts, she is specifically looking to set up her business in the former dining area of the building at W63N540 Hanover Avenue, located in the B-3 District. She explained that even though this site is off the main drag, she found it appealing because it is centrally located in an area that features high walkability with festivals and visitors. She feels that since this site is not highly visible from Washington Avenue, it would be considered less "in your face" to those that might not want to see it. In response to questions from Commissioners, Petitioner Lang assured them that minor children are not allowed inside without a parent or guardian, and a counter will be placed in the reception area of the business to restrict entry. She described her business as being strait-laced and completely anti-drug, assuring Commissioners that the artists are family-oriented Cedarburg people, and their goal is to put out good work.

The majority of Commissioners agreed that the use was better suited to the B-2 District, as opposed to downtown, and felt that, although the more sequestered location off of Hanover Avenue seemed ideal, these types of spaces in the downtown area are limited, reasoning that if other requests for tattoo shops come in for that District, they might not be able to deny them if they are in a more visible location. They also agreed with Planner Censky that adding tattoos as a conditional use allows the most amount of guidance for these establishments.

As part of her request, Petitioner Lang would like the opportunity to purchase the only license to operate a tattoo shop in the City. Commissioners were unsure of the legality of that request, and concluded they would need to consult with the City Attorney.

Since Petitioner Lang confirmed that she has no immediate plans of adding body piercing to her offerings, Commissioners agreed that only tattoo businesses are being recommended at this time.

Action:

A motion was made by Council Member Thome, seconded by Commissioner Voltz, to add tattoo businesses as a Conditional Use in the B-2 Community Business District. Motion carried without a negative vote with Vice Chairperson Kinzel excused.

REQUEST SITE/ARCHITECTURAL CHANGES TO THE APPROVED PLAN FOR COMMERCIAL PROPERTY LOCATED AT W62N535 WASHINGTON AVENUE – CEDARBURG LAND & CATTLE LLC

During their June 7, 2021 meeting, Plan Commissioners approved Petitioner Greg Zimmerschied's request to downsize his original plans for the commercial building proposed for the northwest corner of Washington Avenue and Mill Street. This request was approved on the condition that only footing and foundation permits would be issued until the Petitioner submits and receives approval of his detailed exterior lighting, landscaping and site grading plans.

Petitioner Zimmerschied has once again made changes to the plan; specifically, moving the open stairwell to the roof-top deck from the south elevation to the west elevation, and adding a second set of stairs to the inside of the restaurant via a small penthouse addition.

ORDINANCE NO. 2022-12

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 13-1-54(d) OF CITY OF CEDARBURG CODE OF ZONING ORDINANCES RELATING TO CONDITIONAL USES IN THE B-2 COMMUNITY BUSINESS DISTRICT

The Common Council of the City of Cedarburg do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 13-1-54(d) of the City Code of the City of Cedarburg is hereby amended to include as follows:

SEC. 13-1-54(d) Conditional Uses

(31) Tattoo Businesses

SECTION 2. SEVERABILITY. The several sections of this ordinance are declared to be severable. If any section or portion thereof shall be declared by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, unlawful or unenforceable, such decision shall apply only to the specific section or portion thereof directly specified in the decision, and shall not affect the validity of any other provisions, sections or portions thereof of the ordinance. The remainder of the ordinance shall remain in full force and effect. Any other ordinances whose terms are in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed as to those terms that conflict.

SECTION 3. EFFECTIVE DATE. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication as provided by law.

TITLE: Annual Review and Certification of Code of Ethics

In recognition of these goals, there is established a code of ethics for all City of Cedarburg officials and employees. This code of ethics establishes guidelines for ethical standards of conduct for all such officials and employees. Each public official and employee shall review provisions of this code between May 1 and May 31 of each year and certify to the City Clerk by June 15 that such annual review has been undertaken.

CHAPTER 5 ETHICS CODE

Sec. 2-5-1 Declaration of policy.

The proper operation of democratic government requires that public officials and employees be independent, impartial and responsible to the people; that government decisions and policy be made in proper channels of the governmental structure; that public office is not to be used for personal gain; and that the public have confidence in the integrity of its government. In recognition of these goals, there is established in this chapter a code of ethics for all City of Cedarburg officials and employees whether elected or appointed, paid or unpaid, including members of council as well as boards, committees and commissions of the city (city agencies). The purpose of this ethics code is to establish guidelines for ethical standards of conduct for all such officials and employees by setting forth those acts or actions that are incompatible with the best interests of the City of Cedarburg and by directing disclosure by such officials and employees of private financial or other interests in matters affecting the city.

(Ord. No. 2004-08)

Sec. 2-5-2 Responsibility of public office.

Public officials and employees are agents of public purpose and hold office for the benefit of the public. They are bound to uphold the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution of this State and carry out impartially the laws of the nation, state and municipality, to observe in their official acts the highest standards of morality and to discharge faithfully the duties of their office regardless of personal considerations, recognizing that the public interest must be their prime concern.

Sec. 2-5-3 Dedicated service.

- (a) Officials and employees should adhere to the rules of work, professionalism and performance established as the standard for their positions by the appropriate authority.
- (b) Officials and employees should not exceed their authority or breach the law or ask others to do so, and they should work in full cooperation with other public officials and employees unless prohibited from so doing by law or by officially recognized confidentiality of their work.

(Ord. No. 2004-08)

Sec. 2-5-4 Fair and equal treatment.

- (a) Use of public property. No official or employee shall request or permit the unauthorized use of city-owned vehicles, equipment, materials or property for personal convenience or profit.
- (b) Fundraising. With the exception of fundraising for purposes of raising money for city departmental programming, equipment, or capital projects, which may occur subject to council approval and all provisions of this Code and the State Statutes, the following shall be prohibited:

- (1) No official or employee shall request or permit the use of city resources, city time or city equipment for the purpose of fundraising.
- (2) No official or employee shall use his or her position, authority or influence, whether possessed or anticipated, to represent themselves as a city official or employee for private or public fundraising.
- (b) *Obligations to citizens.* No official or employee shall grant any special consideration, treatment or advantage to any citizen beyond that which is available to every other citizen.

(Ord. No. 2004-08; Ord. No. 2015-13)

Sec. 2-5-5 Conflict of interest.

- (a) Financial and personal interest prohibited. No official or employee, whether paid or unpaid, shall engage in any business or transaction or shall act in regard to financial or other personal interest, direct or indirect, which is incompatible with the proper discharge of official duties in the public interest contrary to the provisions of this chapter or which would tend to impair independence of or action in the performance of official duties.
- (b) Definitions.
 - (1) *Financial interest*. Any interest which shall yield, directly or indirectly, a monetary or other material benefit to the officer or employee or to any person employing or retaining the services of the officer or employee.
 - (2) *Personal interest.* Any interest arising from blood or marriage relationships or from close business or political associations, whether or not any financial interest is involved.
 - (3) *Person.* Any individual or legal entity.
- (c) Specific conflicts enumerated.
 - (1) Incompatible employment. No official or employee shall engage in or accept private employment or render service for private interest when such employment or service is incompatible with the proper discharge of official duties or would tend to impair independence of judgment or action in the performance of official duties, unless otherwise permitted by law.
 - (2) Disclosure of confidential information. No official or employee shall, without proper legal authorization, disclose confidential information concerning the property, government or affairs of the City, nor shall such information be used to advance the financial or other private interests of the official or employee or others.
 - (3) Gifts and favors.
 - No public official or employee may use his or her public office to "obtain financial gain" or "anything of value" for the private benefit of himself or herself, for his or her immediate family, or for an organization with which he or she is associated.
 - b. No person may directly or indirectly offer or give "anything of value" to a local public official or employee if it could reasonably be expected to affect that official's vote, official action or judgment, or if it could be construed as a reward for any official action or inaction on the part of the local public official or employee. No local public official or employee may accept "anything of value" tendered under such circumstances. "Anything of value" is defined as "money or property, favor, service, payment, advance, forbearance, loan or promise of future employee is not to accept hospitality if, after consideration of the surrounding circumstances, it could reasonably be concluded that such hospitality would not be extended were it not for the fact that the guest, or

a member of the guest's immediate family, was a City official or employee. This includes any discount on the price of admission, parking, or use of a box at a stadium that is tax exempt from general property taxes. Participation in celebrations, grand openings, open houses, informational meetings and similar events are excluded from this prohibition. This paragraph further shall not be construed to prevent candidates for elective office from accepting hospitality from citizens for the purpose of supporting the candidate's campaign.

- c. No local public official or employee may take any official action that affects a matter in which the public official or employee, a member of his or her immediate family, or an organization with which the official or employee is associated has a substantial financial interest.
- d. No local public official or employee may use his or her office or position in any way that produces or assists in producing a substantial benefit, either directly or indirectly, for the official or employee, any members of his or her immediate family, or an organization with which the official or employee is associated.
- (4) Representing private interests before city agencies or courts. No officer or employee shall appear on behalf of any private person (other than him or herself, his or her spouse or minor children) before any city agency. However, members of the common council may appear before city agencies on behalf of constituents in the course of their duties as representatives of the electorate or in the performance of public or civic obligations.
- (d) Contracts with the city. No city officer or employee who, in his capacity as such officer or employee, participates in the making of a contract in which he has a private pecuniary interest, direct or indirect, or performs in regard to that contract with some function requiring the exercise of discretion on his part shall enter into any contract with the city unless it is within the confines of section 946.13.
- (e) Disclosure of interest in legislation.
 - (1) Any member of the common council who has a financial interest or personal interest in any proposed legislation before the common council shall disclose on the records of the common council or the ethics board created by this chapter the nature and extent of such interest.
 - (2) Any other official or employee who has a financial interest or personal interest in any proposed legislative action of the common council or who serves on a board or committee, shall disclose the nature and extent of such interest.
 - (3) If there is a conflict of interest for any official or employee, he or she must refrain from participating in any way including discussion, deliberations or action on the item.

(Ord. No. 2004-08)

Sec. 2-5-6 Advisory opinion.

Any questions as to the interpretation of any provisions of this code of ethics chapter shall be referred to the personnel committee serving as the ethics board or the city attorney. The fact that a person seeks an advisory opinion and abides by the material facts as stated, is evidence of intent to comply with the ethics code.

Sec. 2-5-7 Jurisdiction and application.

(a) The personnel committee shall have administrative jurisdiction over this code of ethics chapter and shall be deemed the ethics board pursuant to Wis. Stats. § 19.59(3)(d) for that purpose. An individual may request an

advisory opinion on the propriety of any matter to which he or she is or may become a party. However, the personnel committee has complete discretion as to whether to issue such an opinion. All requests and advisory opinions to the ethics board must be in writing.

- (b) The personnel committee may make recommendations with respect to amendments to this code of ethics chapter.
- (c) Upon the sworn complaint of any person alleging facts which, if true, would constitute improper conduct under the provisions of this chapter, the personnel committee shall conduct an investigation of the facts of the complaint; if the investigation indicates there may be a reasonable basis for the complaint justifying further investigation, the committee shall conduct a public hearing in accordance with the common law requirements of due process, including notice, an opportunity to be heard, an opportunity to cross-examine witnesses and to present testimony and other evidence in support of the accused's position and an opportunity to be represented by counsel or other representatives at the expense of the accused. The committee shall make written findings of fact and issue a written decision concerning the propriety of the conduct of the subject official or employee and shall refer the matter to the common council for final disposition.
- (d) In the event a member of the personnel committee is allegedly involved in an ethics code violation, the mayor, subject to the confirmation of the common council, shall appoint another council member to temporarily replace the member of the committee who is under investigation.

Sec. 2-5-8 Sanctions.

A determination that an official's or employee's actions constitute improper conduct under the provisions of this chapter may constitute a cause of suspension, removal from office or employment or other action permitted by law.

Sec. 2-5-9 Distribution of ethics code.

- (a) The city clerk shall cause a copy of this code of ethics to be distributed to every public official and employee of the City of Cedarburg within 30 days after enactment of this chapter. Each public official and employee elected, appointed or engaged thereafter shall be furnished a copy before entering upon his duties.
- (b) Each public official, the mayor, the chairman of each board, commission or committee and, through the city administrator, the head of each department shall, between May 1 and May 31 each year, review the provisions of this Code with his fellow council, board, commission, committee members or subordinates as the case may be and certify to the city clerk by June 15 that such annual review had been undertaken. A copy of this ethics code chapter shall be continuously posted on each department bulletin board wherever situated.

TITLE: Discussion and possible action on Façade Grant Approvals

ISSUE SUMMARY: The first round of façade grant applications was received by the City prior to April 1, 2022. The grant committee met to review the applications and evaluated whether they met the criteria as established by the grant program. A total of nine (9) applications were received out of which three (3) directly met the criteria and three (3) met the criteria with specific guidelines provided by the grant committee. The three (3) that the committee recommends for receiving the grant are Leap of Faith for awning repair (\$700), The Burg for front facing window replacement (\$5000), and Brandywine for painting the exterior of the building (\$5000). The three (3) approved with additional requirements are Wyndrose Jewelry for siding repair (\$5000), Gustav Building for façade color restoration (\$5000), and Remax for masonry cleaning (\$3250). Wyndrose Jewelry would be required to follow the landmarks and plan commission directive of only replacing the siding that is in need of repair. They would be required to utilize the same material as used on the building currently. Gustav Building would be required to restore the building to the original color or masonry. This would be determined by the City Planner with final approval by the landmarks and plan commission. Remax would receive funds for restoring/cleaning the masonry on their building and replacement of cedar shakes.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION: Staff recommends the approval of the six (6) grant applications that meet the façade grant guidelines and as approved by the committee.

BOARD, COMMISSION OR COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION: Façade Improvement Grant Committee recommends the approval of six (6) grants as described in the issue summary.

TITLE: Discussion and possible action of lawn maintenance Zur Ruhe Cemetery Lawn

ISSUE SUMMARY: In late April our current lawn service for Zur Ruhe Cemetery informed us that they will no longer be able to provide the service for us. We have since reached out to several lawn service companies and looked at the possibility of hiring part-time seasonal staff. Based on how our applications have come in for summer seasonal help for other areas of the City the best option for us is to continue to contract for the service. Our current budget is \$23,500 and the new lowest proposal is \$1800 per cut. It typically requires up to 24 cuts per season. This totals \$43,200. We could choose to do less cuts but this could result in an increase in complaints and a poorly maintained cemetery. We could contract for this amount and utilize cemetery fund balance in 2022 and then budget for the increase for 2023. Immanuel Cemetery is still maintained by a seasonal staff member but increases in wages are required to maintain this position. The additional cost for 2023 for this will include evaluating adding another full-time staff to public works with the primary function of the position being the maintenance of cemetery properties.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION: Staff is seeking approval to contract for Zur Ruhe Cemetery lawn service by utilizing cemetery fund balance in 2022.

What you need to know about No-Mow May, the beeboosting trend sweeping Wisconsin

More communities are encouraging residents to put away their lawnmowers for next month to help pollinator populations grow

Two years ago, Appleton became the first city in the U.S. to adopt "No-Mow May," an initiative designed to boost the population of bees and other pollinators.

The idea is to give homeowners the option of letting their lawns get a bit overgrown for a few weeks to ensure that bees that are coming out of hibernation have plenty of options for the nectar and pollen they need.

The initiative, which is optional everywhere it's been implemented, requires cities to temporarily waive enforcement of ordinances that require homeowners to maintain their lawns.

In Appleton in 2020, No-Mow May was met with success, and other cities including Wausau, Oshkosh, Fort Atkinson and Stevens Point adopted the idea the following year.

And like dandelions on an unmown lawn, this year the idea has spread even farther. No-Mow May will be observed in De Pere, Wisconsin Rapids, La Crosse and other Wisconsin communities, as well as more distant places such as Ann Arbor, Michigan; Bangor, Maine; and New York's Hudson Valley.

What's the point of No-Mow May?

"Bees, and insects in general, are in a bit of a slump right now," said Israel Del Toro, a biology professor at Appleton's Lawrence University.

Studies have shown steep declines in wild bee populations in the 21st century. It's a serious enough problem that the United Nations characterizes it as a threat to the global food supply.

Del Toro, who encountered the concept of a No-Mow May from an environmentalist group in the United Kingdom, was the driving force behind Appleton's pioneering initiative. There are many factors that are hurting bee populations, he said, including climate change and irresponsible uses of pesticides and herbicides.

But in his view, the biggest stressor is habitat loss.

No-Mow May ensures that bees and other pollinators have plentiful food sources as they come out of hibernation. Del Toro has also worked with the city of Appleton and Lawrence University to establish places in parks and public spaces that could be havens for native plants to support pollinators all summer long.

It's also worth noting that the pollinators most affected are not the bees most people know. There are more than 500 species of bees, and unlike honey bees or bumblebees, most of them don't live in colonies.

"They're solitary little organisms," Del Toro said, and they do "the vast majority of pollinating in our urban ecosystems and in our agricultural ecosystems."

Does No-Mow May actually make a difference?

The evidence that No-Mow May works to boost local pollinator populations is striking.

Del Toro's research in Appleton's first year of the program with fellow Lawrence University professor Relena Ribbons found a fivefold increase in the number of pollinators and a threefold increase in pollinator species diversity in the spaces. Del Toro said they expected to see populations increase, but that was a "staggering difference."

What if I love mowing my lawn, or just can't stand the grass looking messy?

Not everyone likes a shaggy lawn. In Appleton, the first year of No-Mow May did coincide with an increase in complaints to the city.

This year, Ruth Ludwig, a member of the Superior City Council, brought forward a No-Mow May resolution there; the council will vote on it on Tuesday. Ludwig is a master gardener and loves watching the bees find flowers in her yard. But even in her own household, not everyone is completely sold on No-Mow May.

"My husband is one of those," she said. "He likes getting all the weeds out of the lawn. For him, it is therapeutic; he'll spend an afternoon pulling the weeds. In the spring, I do have to fight with him: 'Keep those dandelions. Let them grow, so it feeds the bees.'"

Del Toro said there is plenty of room for compromise. People can plant native flowers or allow growth only in parts of their yards. They can set up bee hotels, designed as habitats for solitary species like the leafcutter bee. And they can simply reduce their own use of pesticides, herbicides and fertilizers that can play a role in harming bee populations.

"By all means, if it's really driving you crazy, and it's really hurting you to watch those flowers grow in your yard, go ahead and mow," Del Toro said. "There are plenty of other ways for you to get involved and participate."

My community doesn't have No-Mow May. How can I help the bees?

Bee City USA, an initiative of the Xerces Society for Invertebrate Conservation, offers advice for people who want to support bees without running afoul of local ordinances. One is to "maintain a mowed buffer" that separates your lawn from your garden.

"Maintaining a tidy mowed edge also makes a busy natural planting look less overwhelming, and makes these spaces look intentional rather than neglectful," the nonprofit writes.

Bee City USA also recommends engaging your local city council to see whether an optional No-Mow May program might work in your community.

For Del Toro, the broader goal is to make people aware that each of us can find ways to help bees.

"It's much more than just not mowing," Del Toro said. "It's also thinking actively about pollinator conservation, and all the little habits we can get rid of that maybe are hurting pollinators."

Purpose. This section is adopted due to the unique nature of the problems associated with lawns, grasses and noxious weeds being allowed to grow to excessive length in the City of Cedarburg.

Public nuisance declared. The common council finds that lawns, grasses and noxious weeds on lots or parcels of land which exceed eight inches in length adversely affect the public health and safety of the public in that they tend to emit pollen and other discomforting bits of plants, constitute a fire hazard and a safety hazard in that debris can be hidden in the grass, interferes with the public convenience and adversely affects property values of other land within the city. For that reason, any lawn, grass or weed on a lot or other parcel of land which exceeds eight inches in length is hereby declared to be a public nuisance. An exception to the height requirement will be allowed for property located in designated floodplain areas, drainageways and/or wetland areas or where the lawn, grass or weed is part of a natural lawn approved pursuant to <u>Section 8-1-6</u> above.

Nuisances prohibited. No person, firm or corporation shall permit any public nuisance as defined in subsection (b) above to remain on any premises owned or controlled by him within the city.

Inspection. The Weed Commissioner or his designee shall inspect or cause to be inspected all premises and places within the City to determine whether any public nuisance as defined in Subsection (b) above exists.

Abatement of nuisance.

If the weed commissioner shall determine with reasonable certainty that any public nuisance as defined in subsection (b) above exists, he shall immediately cause written notice to be served that the city proposes to have the lot grass or lawn cut so as to conform with this section and section 8-1-5.

The notice shall be served at least seven days prior to the date of the city's date of action to have the grass or lawn cut and shall be mailed or served on the owner of the lot or parcel of land or, if he is not known and there is a tenant occupying the property, then to the tenant, of

Due process hearing. If the owner believes that his grasses or weeds are not a nuisance, he may request a hearing before the common council. The request for said hearing must be made in writing to the city clerk's office within the seven days set forth in the weed commissioner's notice. Upon application for the hearing, the property owner must deposit a \$25.00 bond. If a decision is rendered in the property owner's favor, the \$25.00 will be returned to the property owner. If the property owner fails to appear for the hearing or if the decision is rendered against the property owner, the deposit shall be forfeited and applied to the cost of city personnel abating the nuisance, if necessary. When the owner of the property requests a hearing, a hearing by the common council shall be held within 14 days from the date of the owner's request. The city will not mow the property in question until such time as the council holds the hearing. At the hearing, the owner may appear in person or by his attorney, may present witnesses in his own behalf and may cross-examine witnesses presented by the city as well as subpoena witnesses for his own case. At the close of the hearing, the common council shall make its determination in writing specifying its findings, facts, and conclusions. If the common council determines that a public nuisance did exist, the council shall order the weed commissioner to mow the property in question unless the property has been mowed by the owner within 48 hours of the common council's decision. If the owner does not abate the nuisance within the described 48 hours, the weed commissioner shall cause the same nuisance to be abated and cost in excess of the forfeited fee assessed accordingly.



An Ordinance Correcting a Scrivener's Error With Annexation of 6660 Susan Lane Stone Lake Development, Inc.

The Common Council of the City of Cedarburg, Wisconsin, hereby ordains as follows:

SECTION 1. Territory Annexed. In accordance with Section 66.0217(2) of the Wisconsin Statutes and the Petition for Direct Annexation filed with the City Clerk of the City of Cedarburg, Wisconsin, signed by all owners of all the real property in the territory and all electors residing in the territory, the following described territory in the Town of Cedarburg, Ozaukee County, Wisconsin, is annexed to the City of Cedarburg, Wisconsin.

SECTION 2. Effect of Annexation. From and after the date of this ordinance, the territory described in Section 1 shall be a part of the City of Cedarburg for any and all purposes provided by law, and all persons coming or residing within such territory shall be subject to all ordinances, rules and regulations governing the City of Cedarburg.

SECTION 3. Temporary Zoning Classification. (a) The territory annexed to the City of

Cedarburg by this ordinance is temporarily zoned as follows, pursuant to Sec. 66.0217(8) of the Wisconsin Statutes: RS- I Single Family Residential District; (b) The Plan Commission is directed to prepare an amendment to the zoning ordinance setting forth permanent classifications and regulations for the zoning of the annexed area.

SECTION 4. Aldermanic District Designation. Section 2-1-3 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Cedarburg is hereby amended to incorporate this annexation. The territory described in Section 1 of this ordinance is hereby made a part of Ward 7, Aldermanic District 7 of the City of Cedarburg, as described in Section 2-1-3 of the City of Cedarburg Code of Ordinances, subject to the ordinances, rules and regulations of the City governing aldermanic districts, and subject to the County Board amending the supervisory district map to move this parcel from County Supervisory District 11 representing the Town of Cedarburg to County Supervisory District 16 representing the City of Cedarburg.

SECTION 5. Town Taxes. The City agrees to pay annually to the Town of Cedarburg, for five years, an amount equal to the amount of property taxes that the Town levied on the annexed territory, as shown by the tax roll, in the year in which the annexation is final.

SECTION 6. Severability. If any provision of this ordinance is invalid or unconstitutional, or if the application of this ordinance to any person or circumstances is invalid or unconstitutional, such invalidity or unconstitutionality shall not affect the other provisions or applications of this ordinance, which can be given effect without the invalid or unconstitutional provision or application.

SECTION 6. Effective Date. This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage and publication as provided by law.

Smart Growth Area #2 on Western Ave has been identified as a future redevelopment area and as such qualifies for this grant. We have applied for the grant as of April 1, 2022. As the WEDC evaluates the grant request we have been asked to provide a Memorandum of Understanding between the City and the Developer relating to the Developers Agreement to specifically outline the terms of the grant funding.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION: Staff recommends that we approve the MOU.

This Memorandum of Understanding ("MOU") is made and entered into as of this _____ day of _____, 2022, by and between the City of Cedarburg, a Wisconsin municipal corporation ("City") and P2 Development Company LLC/Robert Bach ("Recipient").

RECITALS

WHEREAS, Recipient is developing a project with 160 rental apartment units, 44 twoand three- bedroom rental townhomes, and 26 for sale "pocket homes" averaging 2500 sq. ft.; and

WHEREAS, Recipient is partnering with City to develop the Fox Run project in accordance with Recipient's development plans; and

WHEREAS, the parties hereto have agreed that Recipient shall serve as contract administrator and fiscal agent for the completion of the Fox Run project; and

WHEREAS, City has applied for and received confirmation that it will receive up to \$250,000 in grant funds to assist with the Recipient project from the Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation ("WEDC"); and

WHEREAS, City's receipt of such funding from WEDC requires a local match of 75%, which shall be more than satisfied through potential TIF funding of the project; and

WHEREAS, the WEDC grant funds and local match must be expended prior to ______ of 20_____, such that time is of the essence; and

WHEREAS, the parties desire to enter into this MOU to clarify their respective roles and responsibilities for grant reporting compliance and completion of the Fox Run project;

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the terms and provisions contained herein and for other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged by the parties hereto, it is agreed as follows:

PROVISIONS

- 1. In furtherance of this MOU, Recipient shall:
 - a. Provide to City paid itemized invoices for eligible expenses with proof of payment for reimbursement purposes for its \$250,000 portion of work, as required by WEDC.
 - b. Provide to City semi-annual performance reports during the construction phase of the project, with a final report due upon completion of construction, as required by WEDC.
 - c. Indemnify City in the event of any default of the Fox Run_project which may entitle WEDC to a return of any grant funds expended.
 - d. Guarantee that City shall not be responsible for any other financial obligations of Recipient relating to the Fox Run project, which shall be funded other than by City's \$250,000 contribution.
 - e. Upon commercially reasonable notice by City, provide City's Finance Department, or any party each so names, access to project records during the life of the project and for a period of at least three (3) years thereafter, for audit purposes.
- 2. In furtherance of this MOU, City shall:
 - a. Provide in-kind support to Recipient as needed with respect to the Fox Run project, including, but not limited to, serving as part of a contract management team.
 - b. Submit semi-annual reports to WEDC, as prepared by Recipient, to ensure compliance with the requirements of the WEDC grant program.
 - c. Provide payment in the amount of \$250,000 to Recipient, upon receipt of invoice, after at least \$750,000 of matching funds have been incurred and paid.
 - d. Provide documentation, as reasonably requested by Recipient, to assist in complying with the terms and conditions of other grant awards relating to the Fox Run project for which City's \$250,000 contribution constitutes matching funds.
 - e. Ensure WEDC-acknowledgement is included in the final Fox Run project documents.
 - f. Upon commercially reasonable notice by Recipient, provide Recipient, or any party each so names, access to project financial records during the life of the project and for a period of at least three (3) years thereafter, for audit purposes.
- 3. City has the authority to enter into this MOU pursuant to the authorizing Resolution passed by the City Council on May 9, 2022.
- 4. Recipient has the authority to enter into this MOU pursuant to ownership of P2 Development.

5. This MOU may be amended at any time by mutual consent of the parties. Amendments shall be in writing and shall become effective only after execution by duly authorized representatives of the parties.







MEETING DATE: May 9, 2022

TITLE: Discussion and possible action on Outdoor Alcohol Beverage License application for The Art of Joy business at W63 N664 Washington Avenue

ISSUE SUMMARY: The applicant is requesting an Outdoor Alcohol Beverage License to serve alcohol beverages outside on their downtown business site at W63N664 Washington Avenue. While most of this site is already fenced in by a decorative wood fence, they propose to install a series of new wood planters, with rope barriers between, to enclose the open patio at the northwest corner of the site. These planters measure 24" tall X 60" long X 24" deep.

Coupled with the Outdoor Alcohol Beverage license, the applicant is requesting various ancillary changes to this outdoor use. These changes are being proposed because their occupancy permit for use of the building is being delayed due to a backlog in plan review at the State level. Accordingly, the applicant is hoping to commence with her outdoor operation while waiting for the necessary state approval to occupy the building. Specifically, the applicant is proposing the use of a temporary portable food/beverage trailer to be located on the gravel area directly north of their wood fence and to install temporary portable toilets in the rear yard adjacent to the outbuilding. The intent is to use these facilities until she receives state approval to occupy the building which she expects will be sometime mid to late summer and then move them off site.

BOARD, COMMISSION OR COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION: At its April 28th meeting, the Landmarks Commission reviewed this request and voted approval subject to the service trailer and portable toilets being removed at time of occupancy permit. It was agreed the applicant will have time to work with staff on this. The Plan Commission reviewed this request last Monday and voted to approve the Outdoor Alcohol Beverage License subject to them operating under the terms of city code for such activity (i.e. outdoor activity ends no later than 10:00pm).






Existing Fence Line - North of main building



LANDMARKS COMMISSION April 28, 2022

A regular meeting of the Landmarks Commission, City of Cedarburg, Wisconsin, was held Thursday, April 28, 2022 at Cedarburg City Hall, W63N645 Washington Avenue, lower level, Room 1.

The meeting was called to order by Chairperson Judy Jepson at 7:00 p.m.

Roll Call: Present – Chairperson Judy Jepson, Tomi Fay Forbes, Chris Smith, Elizabeth Krimmel

STATEMENT OF PUBLIC NOTICE

Chairperson Jepson acknowledged that the agenda for this meeting was posted and distributed in compliance with the Wisconsin Open Meetings Law.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Motion made by Commissioner Smith, seconded by Chairperson Jepson, to approve the minutes of the March 24, 2022 meeting. Motion carried without a negative vote with Commissioners Kubala and Pape excused.

COMMENTS AND SUGGESTIONS FROM CITIZENS - None

REGULAR BUSINESS

<u>Consider Approval of New Color Scheme and Replacement of the Mansard Roof on their</u> <u>Non-Contributing Building Located at W61N508-10 Washington Avenue; and Action</u> <u>Thereon</u>

Petitioners Mike and Cindi Purnell represented Cedarburg Mercantile. The Petitioners wish to resurface the roof section that extends across the façade of the building between the first and second floors. Here called a mansard, Commissioner Forbes maintains this is more properly called a pent roof. Commissioner Kubala, in a previous conversation, suggested a shake stained like copper, or a copper roof, and mentioned the option of standing seam copper. After considering cedar shakes, the Petitioners have elected to pursue a copper standing seam roof and have located a business in Delafield who will install it.

Action:

Commissioner Krimmel made a motion to approve the installation of a standing seam copper roof. Commissioner Smith seconded the motion. Motion carried without a negative vote with Commissioners Kubala and Pape excused.

<u>Consider Approval for Installation of a Temporary Fence Associated with the Request for</u> <u>an Outdoor Alcohol Beverage License for the Stagecoach Inn Building Located at</u> W61N520 Washington Avenue; and Action Thereon

Item withdrawn by Petitioner.

Consider Approval for ADA Access Ramp, New Color Scheme, Fencing, Temporary Portable Bar/Food Service and Portable Toilets Associated with their Request for an Outdoor Alcohol Beverage License for the Building Located at W63N664 Washington Avenue, Including New Sign Plan Approval; and Action Thereon

Petitioners Stephanie Hayes, Mary Creten and Architect Peter Damsgaard represented the Art of Joy.

Sign Plan

The proposed sign has a deep teal background and light writing. The existing brackets and lighting will be used. The previous sign was swinging, which is not Code compliant, per Building Inspector Mike Baier. The new sign must be fixed.

Fencing/Barricade

The existing fencing will be repaired. The proposed planters have been approved at other sites in the Historic District and will serve as a barrier between the sidewalk and the seating area for the outdoor alcohol service. The planters will be left in place or stored during the winter.

Color Scheme

In June 2003, the trim was painted a dark green. The Petitioners are asking to repaint the trim in a color comparable to Sherwin Williams' historic paint color SW 829.

ADA Access Ramp

The proposed ramp will be made of concrete with a rise of 6 to 8-inches, and will have a metal handrail painted in a dark color. Commissioner Smith praised the petitioners for making the building ADA accessible.

Action:

Commissioner Smith made a motion to approve the sign with hangers that are immobilized so it does not swing, the fencing repair and planters as proposed, the proposed paint color, and the proposed ADA access ramp. Commissioner Krimmel seconded the motion. Motion carried without a negative vote with Commissioners Kubala and Pape excused.

The occupancy permit for Art of Joy is bogged down at the State due to a permit backlog. The Petitioners are hoping they can obtain occupancy for outdoor activities by June 1, 2022, and occupancy for the interior of their building in mid-August. Meanwhile, they would like to open their business for the summer.

Temporary Portable Bar/Food Service

The Petitioners have purchased an old camping trailer they will have converted into an outdoor stand to sell merchandise, but can be securely locked at night. There will be no cooking inside the trailer. It will be located on the driveway which is a joint easement with the next property to the north. It is compliant with Code to park a trailer in the City from approximately May through October. Initially, the Petitioners are asking for approval for the trailer until they have an occupancy permit and can open their building. However, they did inquire about the possibility of keeping it in that location long-term, which would be a separate issue to be reviewed by both the Landmarks and Plan Commissions.

The Petitioners would also like to install "wedding venue style" portable toilets on site until they have their occupancy permit.

LANDMARKS COMMISSION April 28, 2022

Action:

Commissioner Krimmel made a motion to approve the temporary use of the service trailer and portable toilets in support of the Outdoor Alcohol Beverage License, subject to removal of both within a reasonable time frame upon receipt of the occupancy permit. Commissioner Smith seconded the motion. Motion carried without a negative vote with Commissioners Kubala and Pape excused.

<u>Consider Approval of the Replacement of Wood Overhead Doors with Metal Overhead</u> <u>Doors for Fire Department Station No. 3 Building Located at W61N619-21 Mequon</u> Avenue; and Action Thereon

Fire Chief Jeffrey Vahsholtz stated that the present doors are starting to rot and have no insulation. The Fire Department is working on a plan to upgrade the garage to more of a museum with display cabinets. The present doors permit viewers to look inside to see the old equipment. The intention is that the new doors will also have glass for exterior viewing and natural light. Chief Vahsholtz stated that Cedarburg Overhead Door gave him a quote of \$60,000 to \$80,000 to have wood doors built to replace the present doors. The north end of the fire station is considered a pivotal building. Planner Censky stated that if the doors are replaced with metal doors, it is possible that those who evaluate the Historic District from time to time could downgrade the building from pivotal to contributing if the doors were replaced. Commissioner Smith stated that the replacement of the doors with a metal door is logical, but it is not something the Landmarks Commission is permitted to agree to. He stated the City would be responsible for the cost of replacing the doors with wood doors. Planner Censky stated that Chief Vahsholtz can appeal to the Plan Commission, but that the charge incumbent on the Landmarks Commission is to preserve the downtown. The Fire Department made the same request in 1988, but was denied.

Action:

Commissioner Smith made a motion to deny the replacement of the wood overhead doors with metal doors on Fire Department Station No. 3, based on the pivotal status of the building. Commissioner Forbes seconded the motion. Motion carried without a negative vote with Commissioners Kubala and Pape excused.

ADJOURNMENT

A motion was made by Commissioner Smith, seconded by Commissioner Krimmel, to adjourn the meeting at 8:10 p.m. Motion carried without a negative vote with Commissioners Kubala and Pape excused.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 5-4-5(c) OF CITY OF CEDARBURG CODE OF ORDINANCES RELATING TO PERMITS FOR PRIVATE ALARM SYSTEMS

The Common Council of the City of Cedarburg do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 5-4-5(c) of the City Code of the City of Cedarburg is hereby repealed as follows:

SEC. 5-4-5 Permit for Private Alarm Systems.

(c) Direct police connection permit fee. A \$240.00 permit fee shall be paid to the chief of police at the time of filing said application for all business and residential alarm permits who want direct connection to the police department. The permit fee shall be based on a calendar year and pro-rated on a monthly basis. Said fee shall be billed annually by the city treasurer's office by January 30 of each year. Failure to make payment of the permit fee by March 1 of each year will result in the discontinuance of the alarm system permit.

SECTION 2. SEVERABILITY. The several sections of this ordinance are declared to be severable. If any section or portion thereof shall be declared by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, unlawful or unenforceable, such decision shall apply only to the specific section or portion thereof directly specified in the decision, and shall not affect the validity of any other provisions, sections or portions thereof of the ordinance. The remainder of the ordinance shall remain in full force and effect. Any other ordinances whose terms are in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed as to those terms that conflict.

SECTION 3. EFFECTIVE DATE. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication as provided by law.

The following information is provided to keep the Common Council and staff informed on some of the activities and events of the City. Points of clarification may be addressed during the City Administrator's Report portion of the agenda; however, if discussion of any of these items is necessary, placement on a future Council agenda should be directed.

Engineering & Public Works— The 2022 Street & Utility project is underway and they are working on relaying the sanitary sewer. The Sidewalk program started last week and will continue for a couple more weeks.

The Public Works crew is working on crack-filling, brush pick-up, and getting the pool ready for the season. The Forestry crew is working hard on spring planting. A volunteer project took place in Cedar Pointe last weekend and 50 trees were planted.

Parks, Recreation & Forestry— The Adult Softball and Youth Soccer programs began last week. Early Registration for swimming lessons were held in the Community Gym last week and resulted in 219 registrations. The pool will be open for pre-season registrations on Monday and Wednesday evenings 4—6 p.m., May 2 to May 25, 2022, for pass sales, pass renewals, and swim lesson registrations.

<u>**Treasurer**</u>— The Department is preparing for the annual audit that is scheduled for July. This is payroll week.

<u>Water Recycling Center</u>— The UV system installation was completed last week. The Coagulant program is 95% complete. Work is being done at the farm on Pioneer Road, as part of the Adaptive Management program.

<u>Police Department</u>—Third shift dispatch has been switched over to the County and is working well.

Light & Water—A preconstruction meeting was held last week for the private lead service replacement project. Work on the 120 lead replacements will be done by two crews, completing six replacements per day.

<u>Administrator</u>—The Health Insurance Committee met last week and plans to move ahead to present the State Insurance Plan to the Personnel Committee and Common Council for approval, prior to submitting the application.
